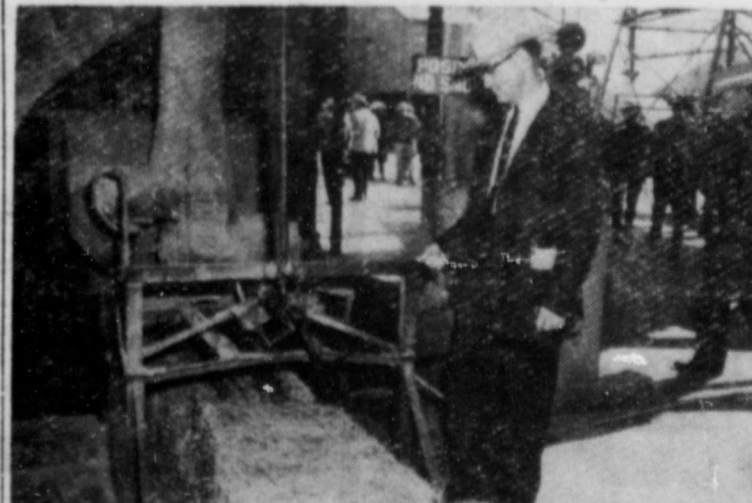

"Since we attended the stock show, we were so far behind and I'm sure editor Richards understands, that we didn't have a chance to prepare a proper editorial page last week. Therefore we will have to continue our debate in this week's issue.

"Last week Editor Richards reviewed the fire for being caught without a tall light in the Spur City limits. He went on to say all Kent County people driving in Spur to check their tall lights before they enter. Now, this is just what the City Council was aiming for - in my opinion. End of Texas Spur Editorial.

We are not going to question Editor Harrison's ability or integrity, but we feel that we must question his methods just a bit.

It is considered to be a very poor form of journalism to make indirect quotations, and to "tell in your words" what a person has said, rather than to give a direct quotation, and especially when you have it right in front of you. I am sure if you had given your readers exactly my comments, they would have a different view than they got from your hashed over version of what we said.

You will notice that every time we have let our readers have a direct quotation of your editorials, (Of course space in our paper is not as valuable as is yours.)

Now, let's look at your comments:

First I am sorry that I did not get to attend the Fat Stock Show and that my boys did not get to shake hands with Bonanza's prize star "Hoss." I'll have to be contented with the fact that my son who is the sports editor of the Texas Tech Toreador got his picture shown on television last year shaking hands with some base ball player called Mickey Mantle, who ever that is. I think he plays with a second rate group they call the Bronx Bombers.

Next, we sympathize with you because you did not have time to prepare a "proper editorial page." In fact we have never in our lifetime had such a thing. Of course in a town as big as Spur you need a proper editorial page, and more especially if you are crusading for good law enforcement. You can't win a press association

award without it. And we sympathize with you on being behind. The same week we gave you one third of our front page, on Tuesday we had split two pages of type out in the middle of the floor, and had to do it all over. And we got the paper printed Friday morning just as the sun came up.

About the car lights. I can recall being stopped at least 5 times to be notified about defective lights. . . . Once by radar, twice by the Highway patrol, once in the city of Azle that has the reputation of being tough. And not yet have I been fined.

The Texas Highway Patrol, which is considered to be the standard for good traffic enforcement has a policy of courteously notifying people of such things. Please verify this with the Patrolmen who office just around the corner from you.

You can believe this or not but it is true. In May when our car was less than a month old, I was in Oklahoma City, and "showing it off" we walked all around it and examined all the lights in every burning position. Later in the afternoon we started home. A few miles out of Wichita Falls a patrolman stopped me and told me I had a head light out. Well, I had to walk around and take a look before I believed it. Again, we agree with you that neither the people of Kent County or Dickens are perfect. But the only difference we are trying to IMPROVE the situation in: Kent County.

About your statement that "we hope the Jayton business men didn't fall for that line about the Jayton Chronicle not soliciting advertising in Spur."

You here implied something that was not said. The exact statement was "When I am in Spur I am not out out soliciting advertising." This was in answer to your query as to why we spent so much time in Spur. That statement was true. I have never asked a single Spur merchant for advertising. I will buy you a new suit of clothes if you can prove it is

not true. We do have a lady who on various occasions does try to pick up a little business for the Chronicle on a commission basis.

Here is something that you surmised. You said that "The Texas Spur had grown so popular with the Jayton editor HE had a special runner bring a copy on Thursday so HE could get it a day early. We're flattered." That's not quite right. Here is the way it happened. We didn't plan to make this public, but since you try to put it on us, here is the way it was. One of the Texas Spur employees was so proud of their editor's great masterpiece that a copy was pulled off the pile back of the press after the "first run" had been made, and before the final issue was out, carried it to a second party, evidently to brag on what the boss had done. The second party gave it to a third party, who gave it to fourth party, who gave it to the editor of the Chronicle. If you don't believe this, we still have the copy which is white on the

back side. Your invitation to eat steaks in Spur sounds like a Whimpy invitation . . . you know "You come over to my house for a duck dinner and you furnish the duck." I'll buy you steaks at Bell's in Spur on one condition and that is that I be allowed to bring along pictures of my two wonderful little grand daughters and that you will take plenty of time to look at them. Finally, your closing remarks gives you away. You close out with a code line from the police radio. Maybe that's what your trouble is, you have been

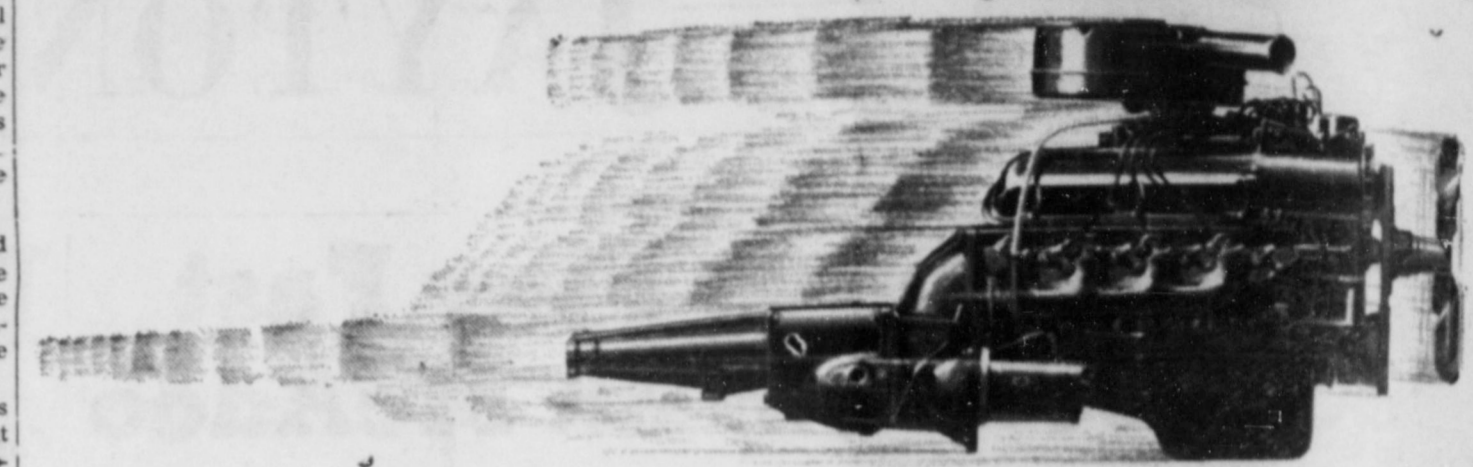
around the cops so much that you have started thinking and writing like one.
