He was certainly a living example of the truth of the old proverb, that a man at a typewriter is more powerful than a man with a gun.

He probably never saw the inside of a Journalism class, but he was one of the great writers of West Texas in his own style, and before he retired a few years ago he was known as "the dean of West Texas editors."

Back in the late 30s when we were just a couple of kids we had a little paper at Meadow, and I got well acquainted with this old grizzled editor. He seemed to kinda take a special pleasure of keeping me in line, and just about every time I wrote an editorial he took me to task, and we usually had a verbal fued going for months at a time, and we argued on everything from local politics to capital punishment. I don't think I ever did actually win an argument with him, but I kept giving him everything I had. He was the kind of fellow that he didn't like you if you wouldn't fuss with him.

In those days money was hard to come by, and I was always glad to pick up a few dollars. Almost invariably on Thursday afternoon about four o'clock the phone would ring and as I answered he would yell almost loud enough to be heard the 12 miles without a phone "Say, Richards are you about through. How about coming down; and help us for awhile?" And I always did when I could because he paid good.

And, when we would get to talking, he would laugh with a big guffaw and say, "Boy, you had better get ready, for I am going to really tear you apart piece by piece in my column next week." And sure enough he would do it.

One of his prime targets was Charles A. Guy of the Lubbock paper, and he always

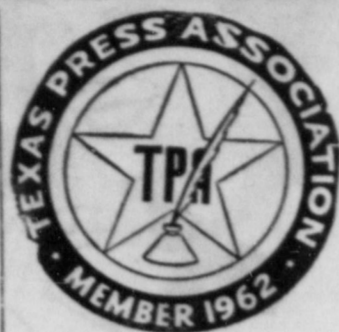

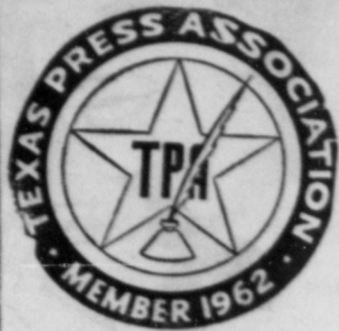
