He had an abstract office in Jayton and from 1929 to 1939 was the county and district clerk in Kent County.

Service was Monday at 2 p. m. at the Methodist Church in Jayton with the Rev. Ray Elmore, pastor of the church, officiating assisted by the Rev. Irvin Looney. Interment was in Jayton Cemetery.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Helois Cathey; one daughter, Mrs. Mararet Crowson of Midland; two brothers, Buck Cathey of Dallas and Lee Cathey of Oklahoma City; two sisters, Mrs. Ruth Horton and Mrs. Ethel Mayfield, both of Amarillo; three grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Fire Damages Paper Office

Fire, of undetermined origin, swept through the Jayton Chronicle office, Wednesday afternoon of last week, causing an estimated \$1,500 damage. Only the quick work of the Jayton Volunteer Fire Department saved the entire building and contents being destroyed.

At about 6 p. m. Wednesday Mrs. Richards drove by the office, before going to Stamford to take copy for the paper, and Larry, the 9-year old son noticed there was a fire in the building. The firemen were summoned, and soon had the fire extinguished.

A. E. Richards, the publisher of the paper returned from the hospital Tuesday, and appraised the damage. "None of my printing machinery is damaged," he said. The fire evidently began at the entrance of a lean-to at the back of the main building. The walls in this building were badly burned. Some boxes of printing supplies were burned, and there was some paper damaged by water. Also the building was badly smoked. The damages were fully covered by insurance he said.

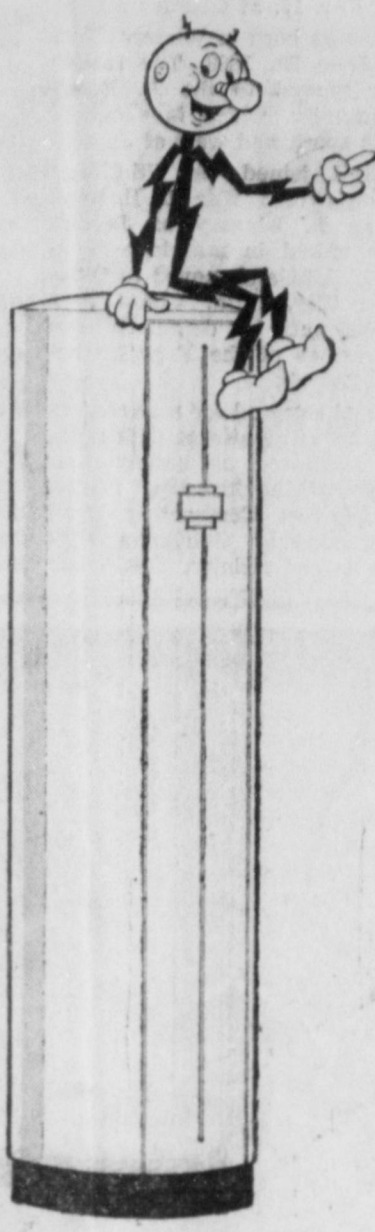

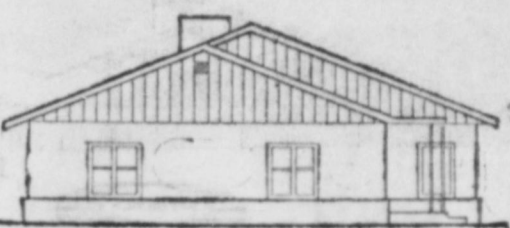

Replicas of Three Spacecraft Will Tour the Nation

Three Project Mercury manned spacecraft-replicas of the famous "Freedom 7," "Liberty Bell 7," and "Friendship 7," which carried America's first astronauts into space—will tour the country for U. S. Savings Bonds during the Treasury's Freedom Bond Drive in May and June. The public will be invited to examine at close range the entire spacecraft, including the interior of the capsule.
