But late in January plans began to fit together, and on Thursday, April 5th it actually happened - a bank charter was approved for Jayton.

Many had considered getting a bank as the impossible, but because a few hard working men refused to give up, and because a former Kent County boy resolved to lose faith in the old home town - the seemingly impossible has become a reality.

Now, the payoff time is just around the corner. If you are one of those who pledged to buy stock, it will soon be time to start getting the money together.

We have only been residents of Jayton less than two years but in that time we have seen a lot of progress take place. Things look much more promising for a live wire community than they did in April 1960 when we drove into Jayton prospecting, and finally agreed to trade for the Chronicle.

Many nice, new homes have been built, and we, this week started construction on one of our own. A new post office is under construction; a new 40-patient, 190,000.00 Old Folks home is being built. One major highway project is just about completed and a new strip of FM road will be starting soon.

And now the new bank, to be housed in a new building especially planned for its own needs. This will give the backbone for a solid program of growth and expansion.

In the past, money with which to build has been difficult if not impossible to get or to borrow. Already it has begun to loosen up. A number of types of housing loans have been announced in the last few months. We predict that before too long the big lenders and the long term financiers are going to be making new bids for business here.

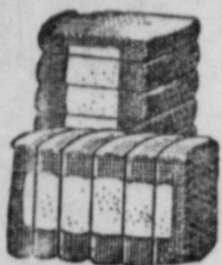
Before you can have any kind of planned growth it takes money available for those purposes. When the money is available, some one will be there to use it.

The culmination of several years of work, planning and hoping were all climaxed in jubilant victory Thursday morning when the Texas Banking Commission voted unanimously to grant a charter for the Kent County State Bank in Jayton.

Present for the hearing and vote by the Commission were Hobert Lewis, Charles Lewis, Tom Fowler and Bill Jones.

There was no opposition to the application and it went off in routine order, Tom Fowler reported in a telephone call back home.

The Commission also recommended that the bank go ahead in their original plans and build a new, modern air conditioned building to open in.

Charles Lewis, according to plans will be manager of the bank. He will be a vice president. Laster Williams will be the cashier. The plans are for both of them to move to Jayton as soon as it is practical. Hobert Lewis of Spur will be the president.

Local men on the board of directors will be Tom Fowler, Tom Johnston and Bill Jones. It will be an independent bank with no connections with any other banking institution, the Chronicle is informed.

The next step will be to get the capital stock paid for and delivered. Also to work out all the details toward getting the physical gear together and organized.

Within 90 to 120 days it should be ready to open.

Kent Screw Worm Funds \$2400.00 This Week

Kent County's livestock producers have raised more than \$2400 for the screw worm control program reports M. V. Jay secretary treasurer of the local committee. This amount will be used with donations from throughout the state to help control the costly screw worm in Texas.

The county screw worm committee met Tuesday night in the county agent's office to review progress made in the screw worm program.

J. B. Morrison jr. the chairman presided.

Other committee members present included Jay, Buster Chisum from Precinct 1, Nig Wyatt from Precinct 2, Manuel Davis from Precinct 3 and L. O. Mayer from Precinct 4 along with the county agent.

The committee plans to contact livestock producers and give everyone an opportunity to invest in this control program.

Sterile male flies are being released at the rate of 10 million daily in the control zones. These male flies have been exposed to 800 roentgens of radiation in specially constructed laboratories. Screwworm larvae in the lab consume over 40 tons of raw meat and blood a week.

Morrison reports the committee will meet again in two weeks April 17 at 7:30 in the county agent's office.

WOMAN HAS HER PLACE IN SPACE AGE WORLD

Space nutrition has many interesting aspects.

Women need not feel left out of the space exploration picture. They had an able representative in Miss Beatrice Finkelstein of Wright Patterson Air Force Base the research nutritionist who packed Colonel John Glenn's sunch box for his three orbit trip in outer space.

A pioneer in the science of space feeding, Miss Finkelstein didn't prepare an ordinary lunch for Col. Glenn. Beef, vegetables and apple sauce from coapsible squeeze tubes were the menu for the day.

One of Glenn's planned duties on his 81,000 mile trip was testing his ability to eat under conditions of space travel. He had his lunch while over Kano, Nigeria, during his first orbit.

In honor of Miss Finkelstein and her part in putting America's first man in orbit she was presented an honorary life membership in the American

Home Economics Association according to Dr. Dorothy Lyle the president.

The home economist has been pioneering in space nutrition for the past five years at the Aero Space Medical Research Laboratories.

One of the most important parts of her research is developing high protein, low residue diets for the 72 hour, pre-flight periods before astronauts launch off.

Miss Finkelstein's tests have suggested that, in space food may be one of Man's important links with the familiar reality of earth. She has developed spaghetti and meat balls, mashed potatoes, peaches, and other foods in the same type of squeeze tubes that Glenn used on his trip.

The home economist is presently planning to test a feeding program for three men on a simulated 14 day space mission. A native of New York City and a Hunter College graduate, Miss Finkelstein has been working with the Air Force 10 years.

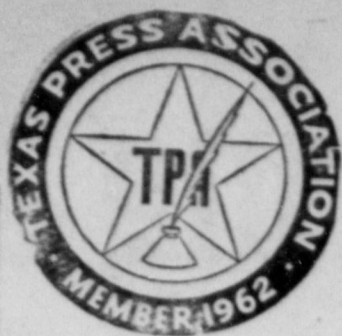

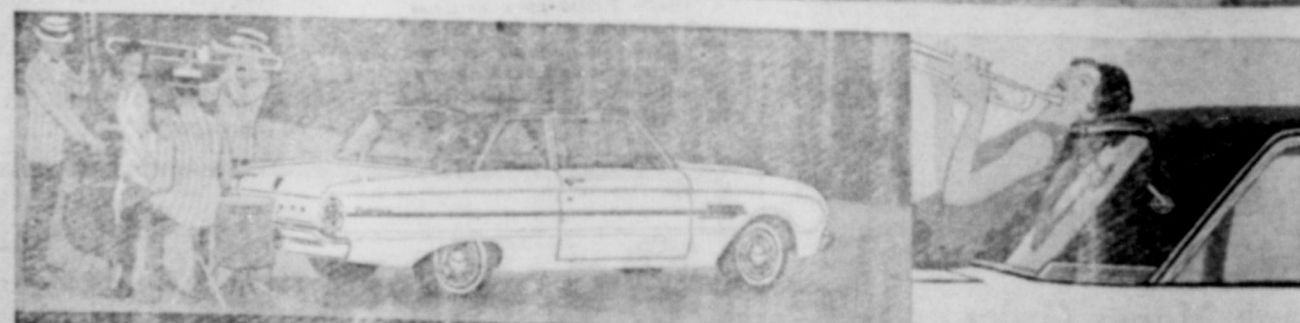
