The rain that fell here early Thursday afternoon was certainly welcome. Here is hoping there will be others to follow this one ... sans the hail of course.

People are now beginning to get interested in politics. With the coming of warm weather, the candidates have also come out, and they are busy demonstrating their best charm and personality to the public and particularly those who have their names on the poll list.

Getting a free ride on the party ballot is the straw vote or public opinion poll on race track gambling and the doing way with the poll tax as a requirement to vote.

Personally, we are against all three of the special issues. It is our opinion that any type of gambling is morally unsound, and that race track gambling is not only morally unsound, but that it is also economically unsound.

Places that have race track gambling say that the local people put their money on the horses and let the grocer and the land lord and others they owe go without their pay.

There is nothing wrong with horse racing, as such, in so far as we know, but horse racing and gambling are inseparable.

In the Governor's race, last week the Dallas News endorsed Connally. Then the Texas Observer, a state-wide liberal Democrat paper had this to say about the matter:

"The News puts Connally on the record where every one now knows he wants to be and ought to be ... with the Dallas News crowd, the big lobby crowd, the labor flailing crowd, the keep-the-minority in their place crowd, the old Shivers crowd, the same old crowd that passes sales taxes and kills pipeline taxes, that kills migrant safety bills and industrial safety bills, juvenile parole bills and lobby control bills, and passes George Parkhouse bills and Ben Ramsey bills and Wardlow Lane bills.

"We will write brief foot note to this campaign when it is over, and it will read some thing like the statement a Connally worker in San Antonio told the Austin American a few days ago: 'I don't know a single Shivers man in this country who is not working for Connally.'"

I will make every effort to see each one of you before the primary May 5. Please keep me in mind.

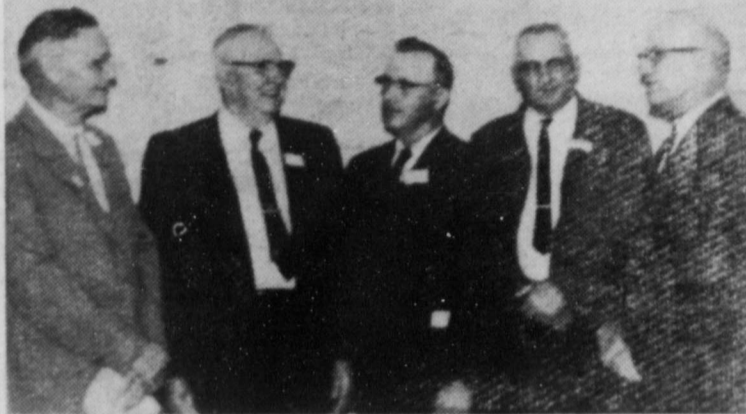

Purcell Writes Bill To Balance Debt

Congressman Graham Purcell of this district on April 19 introduced a bill in the House of Representatives which will provide that the national debt shall be reduced in size by one percent each year in addition to the annual interest payment on the debt.

Purcell's bill, the National Debt Recognition and Reduction Act of 1962 would set out a requirement of law that the budget for each fiscal year be not considered in balance with out the debt reduction figure being included as a budget item.

An emergency provision is added providing that it can be disregarded during periods of national emergency.

The bill will be referred to the House Ways and Means Committee for action, Purcell said.

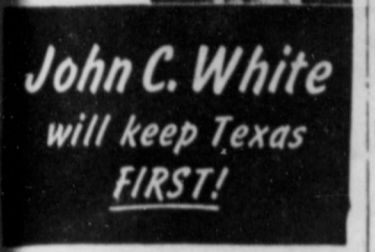

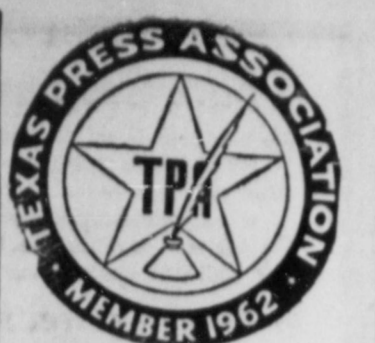

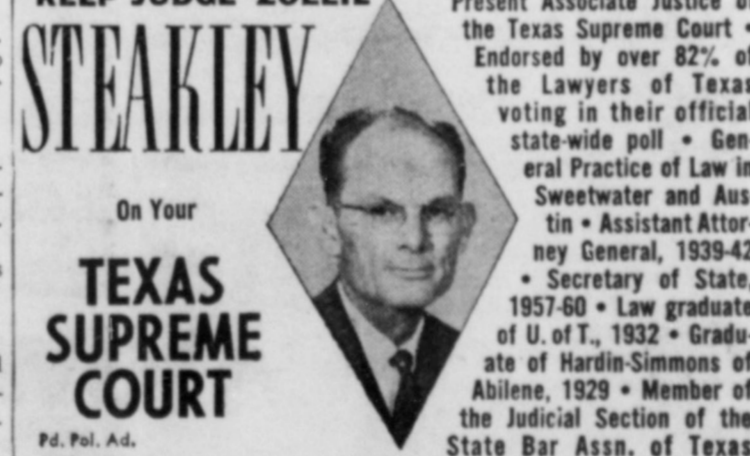
