In some places at present there are as many as two or three private lines running up one ditch.

In Tuesday night's meeting of the City Council they began a move to try to help remedy this situation.

The basic water rate was raised a dollar per month. Also measures were begun to cut down on delinquent accounts.

Also they plan to lay a few new lines over town to try to help ease up the situation. This will have to be done with borrowed money.

We are not acquainted with the financial condition of the city. But all agree it is not the very best. But we are glad to see, and hereby commend the council for taking a positive approach to the problem.

The ultimate goal of any municipal water system is to have it where every resident inside the city have plenty of water available.

We think this should be the goal here in Jayton.

NEW WATER RATE IS SET

Notes On Good Game Practices

Do you like to hunt and fish? Most of us do and it is always more enjoyable when the fish are big ones and the game is plentiful.

Our hunting and fishing can be improved by following a few suggestions. They are designed to help farmers and ranchers realize the importance of our wildlife.

Most all of the farms and ranches in the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District have natural areas for wild life.

These areas range in size from one acre to an entire farm or ranch.

Such places on a farm or ranch may include odd areas, shelter belts, fence rows, gulches, and creek borders.

Many conservation practices will provide wildlife's basic needs for food, cover and water. Providing these basic needs for wildlife will do much to increase their population.

There is an opportunity for such improvement on all classes of land. The word protection can be the answer for improvement of wild life areas. This may include fencing, fire lanes, lighter grazing from livestock, more water and controlled fishing and hunting.

Wildlife production is a part of the total farm or ranch production although many of us fail to recognize this important fact. The pounds or numbers harvested is primarily related to our management.

Fish ponds need management. Under fishing or no fishing is just as detrimental as over fishing.

Food is essential for all living things. To insure an adequate food supply, a fish pond should be fertilized regularly. This not only increases the food supply available but tends

You and Your Car

Keep Your Power Dry

White glove inspections are not strictly a military custom — your professional automotive service man knows the term well. It is his way of discovering the tell-tale seepage of oil, grease, gasoline or water from the engine and other working parts of your car.

He may not use an actual glove, for a clean rag or piece of linting does as well. After cleaning the mechanism in question, he will run the wheels around, or apply the brakes, as the case may be. Then he will pass the clean piece of material over suspect parts, and if the rag comes up oily, greasy or wet, he knows that vital automotive fluids are leaking, the forerunner of serious trouble.

Consider brakes, for example. Your trained mechanic should remove the wheels of your car twice a year, under normal driving conditions. If his "white glove inspection" reveals fluid seepage around the inside area of the wheels, it could indicate a brake cylinder leaking hydraulic brake fluid. This could result in sudden reduction of braking power — often disastrous at high speeds. The master brake cylinder should be checked for seepage, for if it fails, you may suffer complete loss of your brakes.

Testing for fluid seepage around the engine may show that engine lubricating oil is departing through a leaky gasket. If enough oil is lost, the friction of moving parts in a fast-running engine will generate unnatural heat, and as metal parts expand or warp, the engine can "seize up," leading to complete overhaul or replacement.

Loss of engine oil is especially a subject for preventive inspection, for many passenger cars do not carry an oil pressure or oil quantity gauge, as do sports and racing cars. Hence, undetected loss of oil at highway speeds can lead to the sudden, unpleasant surprise of a ruined engine and a layover "miles from nowhere."

Fortunately, there is actually an ounce of prevention available to prevent leaking fluids. The ounce comes in the form of a small tube of sealant, which the professional mechanic knows as Form-A-Gasket. In addition to sealing engine gaskets, he finds a hundred other applications for it, either for permanent or as an emergency stop-gap. Although Form-A-Gasket is a professional aid, like the medications in a doctor's office, many a wise motorist has made a point of learning its uses from the man who services the family car.

Our bird population is directly related to the food and cover which is available.

Quail numbers will increase if sufficient food and cover is present. Many of our weeds furnish food for quail. By not spraying or burning fence rows and odd areas we provide the needed food and cover for our quail population.

Areas may be planted millet, corn, rye or some of our hard-seeded grains to provide food during the winter months which is one of the most critical times in the life cycle of the quail population.

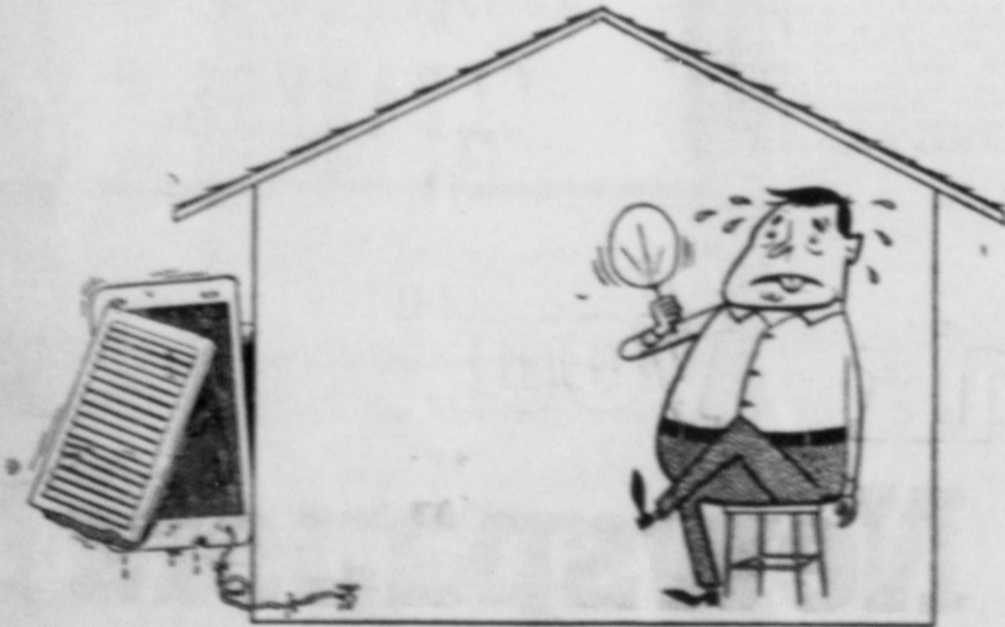

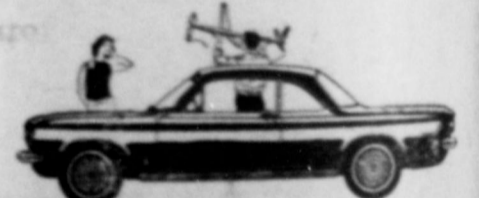
