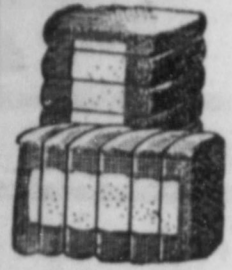

## TEXAS HIGHWAY DEPT. TO HOLD OPEN HOUSE TODAY

How does the Texas Highway Department use tiny glass beads to make your driving safer? Why do highway engineers cut circular holes in brand new highways? These are only two of the many fascinating aspects of highway engineering and maintenance that local citizens may explore on Friday, May 25.

On that day the Highway Department will hold Open House at the maintenance warehouse of Kent County as a part of National Highway Week May 20-26 announced Dale Moore, maintenance construction foreman of Kent County.

Any interested resident of the area may visit the maintenance warehouse in Jayton during the hours of 8 am to 5 pm and observe the daily functions of the public agency that is responsible for the care of approximately 132 miles in the county.

Moore said the open house

will show the public how the highway department operates on a normal day.

"I would like to extend a cordial invitation to the citizens of this area to visit our open house" Moore said.

"Your neighbors who work for the Highway Department would like to show you thru our facilities and demonstrate a few of the many tests and operations we conduct daily to care for the highways."

Visitors to the open house will see examples of the way radio communications and the various machinery and equipment used to maintain the existing roads in smooth riding condition and pleasing appearance.

Mayor Thos. P. Johnston has issued a proclamation declaring that May 20-26 will be observed as National Highway Week in Jayton and urges that special attention be directed to the needs of our highway system.

## Notes About The Kent County Nursing Home

The Kent County Commissioners Court leased the Kent County Nursing Home to Mr. and Mrs. Pike Nichols of Spur on May 4. Mr. and Mrs. Nichols plan to move to Jayton in the near future to assume personal management of the home, opening date has not been set due to a delay in receiving all furnishings for the home. They hope to be open for business by July 1 at the latest.

The Kent County Commissioners Court will not exercise control over the actual home operation. While it is specified in the agreement that Kent County residents will have preference, Mr. and Mrs. Nichols will have responsibility for operating the home, establishing the entrance requirements, rates of pay, etc. All applications for entrance to the home will be made direct to Mr. and Mrs. Nichols and not to the Commissioners Court.

A person cannot receive Old Age Assistance funds if he resides in a public institution. According to State Public Welfare Act of 1941, and Federal Social Security Act (Titles I, X, and XIV), a public institution is defined as an institution providing shelter, custody or care, and over which a governmental unit exercises administrative control or assists in policy formulation, or participates in deficits or profits. For these reasons and in order that the Old Age Assistance people might have the privilege of residing in the home without jeopardizing their grant of assistance, the home was leased outright to Mr. and Mrs. Nichols.

As one of the terms of the agreement, the new operators plan to meet all state health requirements and to qualify for the Medical Vendor Payment program for Old Age Assistance recipients which went into effect on January 1, 1962.

The charge rate will be in accordance with the type of nursing care required by the patient and the ceilings which have been set for the Medical Vendor program. Each person desiring to enter the home will make his own arrangements with the nursing home operator. There can be no blanket pay rate due to the difference in types of care required by the individual patients.

Mr. and Mrs. Nichols plan to give maximum service at all times. They pledge adequate nursing personnel, pleasant surroundings, and all of their best efforts to make the residents of the home happy and comfortable. They solicit the cooperation of the Kent County residents.

Requests for recipes have come to the home demonstration office so it was decided to give everyone an opportunity to make some of these dishes at home. Recipes for some of the foods are given below:

#### SKILLET CHEESE BREAD

Mrs. Hugh Turner, Girard  
Half cup shortening  
2 beaten eggs  
1 cup milk  
3 cups biscuit mix  
2 cups (half lb) grated cheddar cheese  
2tblsp poppy seed  
2 tsp dried minced onion  
Melt shortening in skillet. To the biscuit mix add eggs, milk and melted shortening, cheese, poppy seed and onion. Mix only until dry ingredients are moistened. Line skillet with a double layer of waxed paper and spread dough in a skillet. Bake at 300 F. for 25 minutes. Turn out of skillet, loosening bread from edges of skillet with spatula. Cut and serve. This makes 2 to 16 servings. Good! yum! yum!

## MOLECULE MODIFYING PRODUCES NEW DRUGS

Washington — A rocket fuel has been turned into a potent drug for treating tuberculosis, and then into an anti-depression agent for use for the mentally ill.

A penicillin preservative has been changed successfully into a tranquilizer, a muscle relaxing agent and a drug for high blood pressure.

A female hormone has been changed into a general anesthetic for surgery.

The Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association reports these accomplishments by prescription drug industry research scientists over the last twenty years as typical results of a process sometimes called molecular modification.

Nobody has ever seen a molecule, but industry chemists are continually tinkering with them. They are pulling apart these invisible particles of matter, eliminating one atom, or groups of atoms, substituting others, and re-assembling them into better drugs.

Molecular modification enables pharmaceutical chemists to tailor-make medicines for specific attacks upon specific diseases, or to produce a whole series of drugs which among them exhibit the range of medicinal properties that the physician requires to treat each patient as a unique individual.

They have transformed a sulfa drug into an oral anti-diabetic agent. They have modified an antibiotic so that, in the body, it separates into no less than seven different antibiotics, all active.

These are only a few of the routes into the conquest of disease.

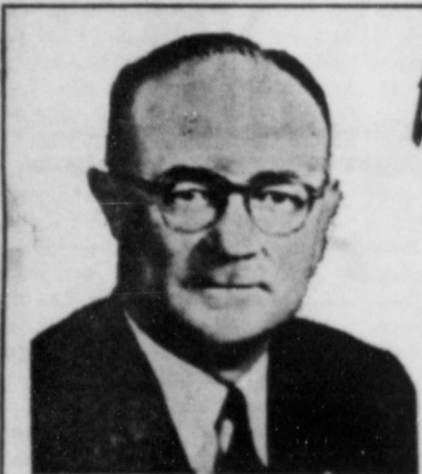

### TREMENDOUS TRIFLES THE WAGER THAT STARTED THE MOVIES

No one could have foreseen the connection between a WAGER and the MOTION PICTURE industry. . . . Seems like a trivial thing? That's just the point! SO MANY IMPORTANT THINGS HAVE STARTED IN SUCH IN SIGNIFICANT WAYS! But—the story:

The incident happened in Sacramento in the year 1877. Two famous sportsmen of the day fell upon a discussion of a sport they both loved: horse-racing. One of these was Leland Stanford (of whom the famed university is today named) and the other was a noted sportsman of the day. The point of the discussion seemed to be whether all four legs of a horse left the ground at the same time during a run, a gallop or canter. You must remember that this was before the days of advanced photography and it was difficult to prove what today seems simple, indeed! Feeling became keener as the sportsmen differed, irresponsibly, on this point. It ended in a wager of some five thousand dollars. And then it was necessary to devise ways and means of complete proof.

It was finally determined to utilize the talents of a noted photographer of the day, Edward Muybridge of New York, and the solution of the problem was placed entirely with him.

Muybridge ingeniously devised a battery of sixteen cameras, placed within a foot of each other along the course to be traversed by a champion race horse of the day. To each of these camera's shutters a string was attached that would be tripped by the horse's legs as he ran, galloped, cantered across the prescribed course. In this way, he would be photographed in sixteen different positions.

Now, the story ends in two ways: it definitely established the fact that all four legs of a horse DO leave the ground, thereby earning the wagered sum for his sponsor. But far more important was the incidental and accidental result. . . .

Thomas A. Edison was the most important inventor of the day. His interests had led him into many and varied fields. But it was never in the direction of photography.

One day Edison chanced upon the series of pictures that had been prepared by Muybridge in settlement of the wager. In a flash, he saw in it the central idea of continuous motion: if these intervals between the movements could be made shorter, there would be a more realistic effect of continuous motion.

That was all that was necessary for the fertile and inventive mind of the Wizard of Menlo Park. It was the beginning of a long series of experiments in the field of continuous motion. It was the beginning of Edison's interest in which his name is imperishably linked.

### TREMENDOUS TRIFLES THREE PISTOL SHOTS STARTED A WORLD WAR

When a twenty-year-old Serbian high school youth fired three shots into the Imperial car of Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria, he little dreamed his act would plunge the great powers of the world into a deadly struggle.

The Archduke, nephew to the emperor and heir to the Austrian throne, had been warned of the danger to his life if he visited the little province of Bosnia which had been under Austrian control since the Congress of Berlin in 1878. Bosnia and Herzegovina, both predominantly Serbian, had been wrested from the Turks in the Russo-Turkish War of 1875-76, in which Serbia won its independence from Turkey. However, the big powers didn't see fit to give the provinces to Serbia, but gave military control to Austria as a special of war for her neutrality in the conflict.

The Serbs had never bowed to Teuton authority. They longed for a united Serbia. Archduke Ferdinand meant to deal with the revolts with an iron fist, and his Imperial visit to Bosnia was to proffer friendship before the military took over.

On June 28, 1914, the Archduke, accompanied by his wife, rode down the Appel Quay in Sarajevo in Bosnia. Soldiers lined the thoroughfare and behind them a cordon of police. Special agents moved through the stoic crowd. The destination of the Imperial car was the Town Hall where there were to be some speeches.

A bomb was thrown at the Imperial car before reaching the Hall. The Archduke fended it off, the bomb exploding behind the car. At the Town Hall a shortened version of friendship took place. The Archduke asserted himself to the mayor.

The procession retraced the route. Another bomb dropped beside the Imperial car, failing to explode. Then a youth in the crowd appeared brandishing a pistol. He fired three rapid shots into the car, killing the Archduke and his wife.

War was inevitable. Russia growled and Germany marched. The other great powers were drawn into the conflict, and a world struggle was on.

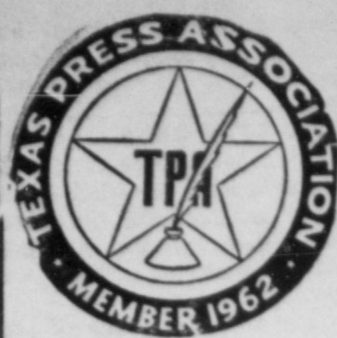

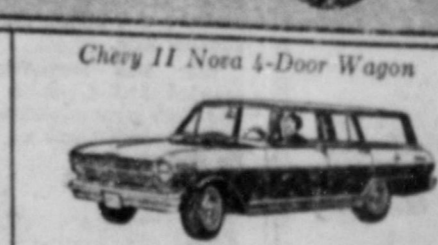
