NOTES FROM THE COUNTY AGENT OFFICE

INSECTS ARE CAUSING DAMAGE TO SOME CROPS IN KENT COUNTY

Hot dry weather and light infestations of cotton insects continue to cause some damage to growing cotton. A good gentle rain would help to assure more fruit being set on cotton plants.

Slight damage has been done to cotton over the county by cotton insects. Light infestations of thrips and fleahoppers have been reported in all parts of the county. An isolated outbreak of darkling beetles has been reported in the Red Mud community. Damage from over-wintering boll weevils has caused some concern to farmers in the Girard community and northeast of Girard. Several farmers have reported damage from cerealeseed webworm.

Farmers are urged to watch their cotton and to follow recommended control practices on cotton insects. Guides for controlling cotton insects are available from the County Agent's office.

Six 4-H Club members have

received pigs in the 4-H Club Sears Swine Program. Club members receiving gilts are Bruce Boland, Elickey Luns, Dusty Smith, Ronnie Gregory, and Bruce Browning, with Doug Smith receiving the boar pig.

Gilts in the Sears program will be exhibited in the county Sears show in September and the first place gilt and the boar will be show at the District Show in Sweetwater on Sept. 22.

Kent County 4-H Club members are looking forward to the annual County 4-H Camp in Clairmont next Monday and Tuesday, July 16 and 17. Club members will participate in the following group activities: photography, recreation, electricity, and gift wrapping. The group will swim at the Spur pool on Monday night. The camp will be concluded on Tuesday night with parents over at the 4-H Center for supper and a night program.

JAYTON FFA GROUP TO ATTEND STATE MEETING UNDER NEW ADVISOR

Four members of the Jayton Future Farmers of America Chapter, will attend the State FFA Convention in Fort Worth, July 15-20, according to Cleburne Murdoch, president of the chapter. The three-day meeting of representatives of over 900 FFA chapters throughout the state will include the awarding of advanced degrees, scholarships and awards to outstanding members of the organization.

Members of the Jayton chapter attending the convention are Harold Murrell, Rex Chambliss, Woody Boyd, and Clarence Murdoch.

Rex Chambliss has been elected by chapter members as delegate of the Jayton chapter to the state convention. Harold Murrell will serve as alternate delegate.

Among the important business to be transacted at the convention will be the election of a state president from the ten state officer nominees who have been elected by members in the ten areas of the state. Voting delegates to the National FFA Convention in Kansas City in October will be elected. In addition, delegates will elect a speaker from the ten candidates elected by the areas and will select the top talent team in the state.

Nearly 500 members from the 13,000 membership of the organization will receive the state's award, the Lone Star Farmer Degree. The membership will confer Honorary Degrees on adults who have contributed in an outstanding way to the accomplishments of the organization. A Vesper Service will be conducted on Tuesday evening, preceding the convention sessions. Lyle Carpenter, Umeta, Colorado, immediate past president of Future Farmers of America and Ed Murphy of Nacogdoches are among the speakers to address the 3000 farm youth convened in the Hotel Texas ballroom in Fort Worth, July 18-20.

Tommy Wilson, Vocational Agriculture teacher, will accompany FFA members to the Fort Worth convention. Cleburne Murdoch awarded

Lone Star Farmer Degree. The presentation will be made at the convention in Fort Worth, Wilson said.

SCS Service Puts Out New Bulletin

A new publication designed to help city and suburban dwellers understand soil erosion problems on their lots, gardens and small farms, has just been released by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service. It is called "Soil Conservation At Home" and interprets the Service's experience in working with farmers and non-farm people.

A copy may be obtained from the local SCS office in the basement of the court house in Jayton, Doug Lowe, Work Unit Conservationist, said.

Doug Lowe, who is assigned by the SCS to assist the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District, said that the publication consists of 30 pages of suggestions on what the homemaker can do to reduce the amount of water runoff from his lot and cut down on soil erosion. It describes the ideal soil and how to know what kind of soil you have. There is a section on a conservation plan that includes safe disposal of water and shrub planting to encourage helpful wildlife, particularly birds.

The bulletin is illustrated with photographs showing contour gardening, miniature terraces, grass waterways and other conservation practices.

Local Draft Board Ahead of Schedule With Classification

The draft board in Jayton is one of 31 in Texas that has completed tagging nearly 250,000 Texans for possible use in rehabilitation work following any attack on the United States.

R. L. Coffman of Austin, Texas Employment Commission administrator, said the TEC and the Selective Service System are cooperation on the program.

Since December, 1960, draft board clerks catalogued registered men in 22 occupational grouping which were believed useful in post-attack work.

Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director said that in event of attack, the names would be made available to the TEC for recruitment to serve at needed points, but that draft boards would not have authority to assign men to any civilian job.

He estimated that 500,000 men will be catalogued by the time the survey has caught up with current draft board registration.

Among skills found and catalogued in the inventory are Orthopedic mechanics, various kinds of engineers and their aides various scientists and scientific technicians blasters and podermen heavy equipment operators stillmen and treaters, blazers and sawyers, glaziers and welders, shipfitters, radio operators, power equipment installers, firemen, and many others among the 22 occupational groupings.

The Kent Commissioners court met Monday in regular session, however no business of great importance came before them.

SCHOOL BOARD PASSES MEASURES EFFECTING THE TEACHERS AND SALARIES

The Jayton school board held its regular monthly meeting Tuesday night with all the members present except Ben Boland.

Among other things the trustees voted to elect Billy Wayne McMeans, as teacher and part time elementary principal. He is now teaching at Ira and is a native of Aspermont. His salary will be \$6238.63, or \$839.68 above the state schedule. It was stated.

Miss Nan Norris sent in her resignation, and it was accepted with regrets, it was stated.

The salary schedule was examined, and adjustments were made for teachers who have been in the system from 2 to 5 years. In the future their salaries will advance at the rate of \$200 per year rather than 100.00 per year.

The annual trip to the state convention by the FFA boys was discussed and money set aside to care for the expenses. Discussed and established policy relative to married students attending school.

Discussed the possibility of the county and school jointly building a heated swimming pool. Discussed the salaries of the auxiliary helpers at the school.

Jon Allen Kelley made a motion which carried that Jerold Stanley be given a \$15 per month raise, setting his salary at \$300 per month.

Also they discussed the matter of filling vacancies on the faculty, and the teaching situation in general.

MANY PEOPLE OVERLOOK THEIR SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS DUE THEM

About a million workers over 65 do not realize that they are eligible to receive social security benefits, according to Don Austin, social security field

representative for this county. These are mainly people who are still working and who think that they cannot get any benefits because they are making over \$1,200 a year. If the same ratio is true for this county as for the country, about 10 of that million live near here.

Are you one of these people? If so, you may be losing money as each month goes by.

To illustrate, Austin cited a claim recently filed by a man who has averaged \$1,800 in annual income since 1950. This computes to \$73.00 a month in social security payments. However, because he continued to work in his regular job after his 65th birthday, he thought he could not receive any payments. Actually, this man will get a total of \$526 in social security checks in 1962, even though he earns \$1,800 in wages.

If you are over 65, it is important that you inquire about this now. No payments can be made to you unless you apply for them. Delay may cost you money because no claim for social security can go back more than one year, even though earlier eligibility exists.

Write for leaflet 23c from the Social Security Office in Abilene. This leaflet contains a chart which shows how your earnings affect the amount of your payments. By simply getting in touch with him on his next trip to Jayton on Wednesday August 1 at the Court House, you may find an added source of income which you have earned through your work under social security, even if just 62, your earnings level might be in the range that would permit some payments to you.

AUSTIN, Texas, July 3.—The state quota for Texas draft boards in August calls for 194 men, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, announced Tuesday.

The state's August call of 194 compares with a quota of 188 for July and 2377 for one. The August call is the state's share of a national quota of 5,000 men, all for the Army. Colonel Schwartz also announced that local boards would send around 1,000 men for pre-induction physical and mental examinations.

Local board quotas for the August call already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards.

The August quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on August 1, with the exception of volunteers or delinquents, who may be younger.

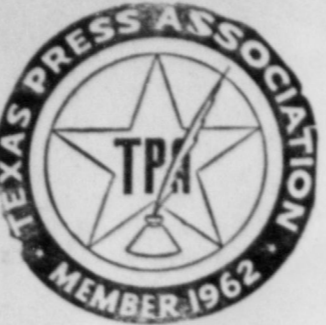

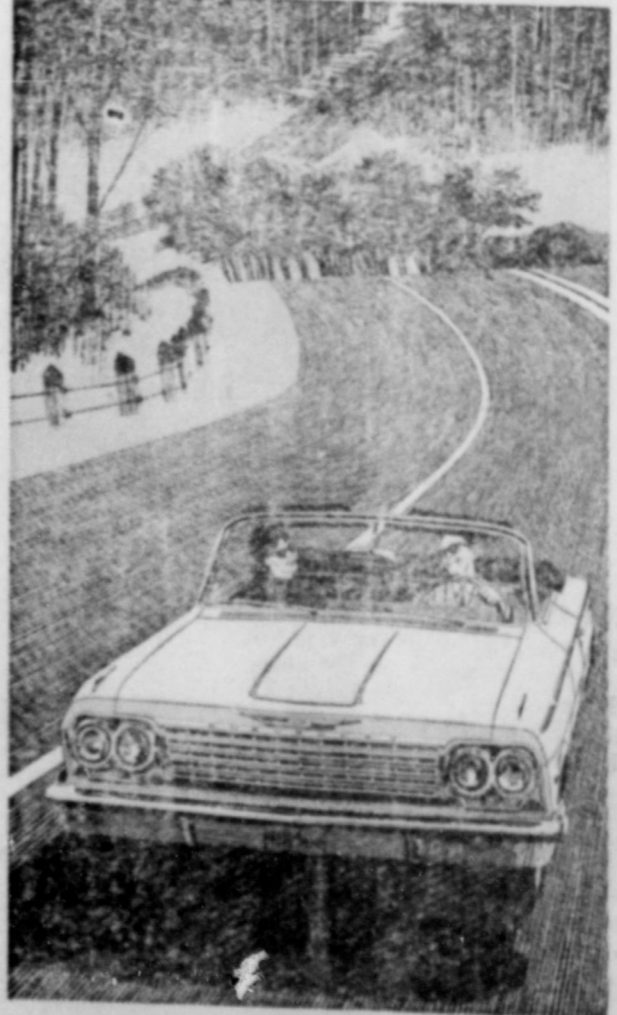
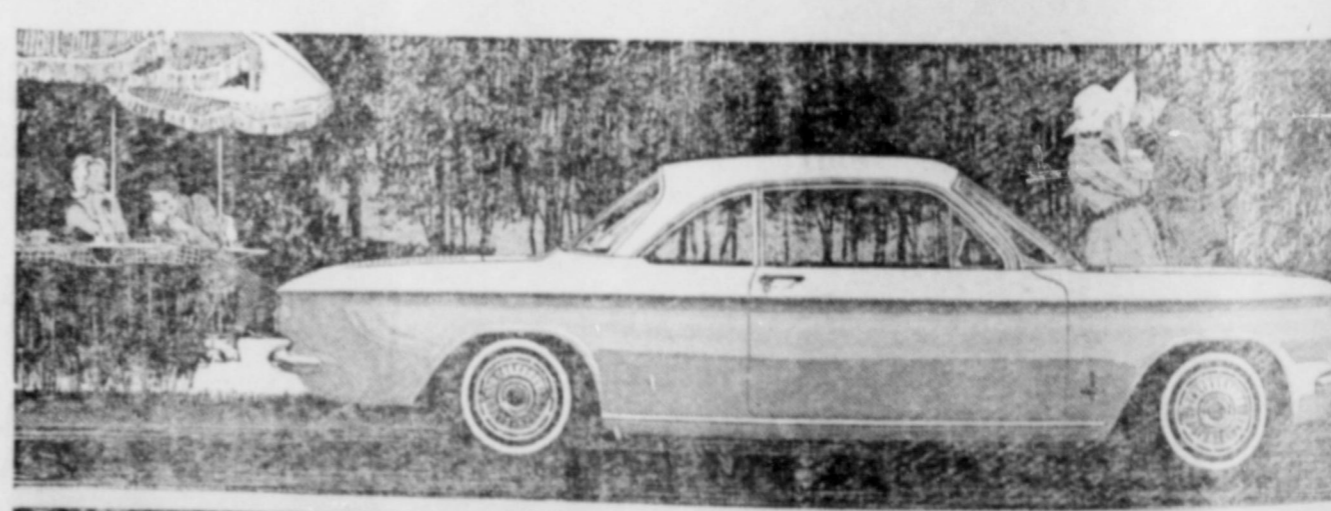
