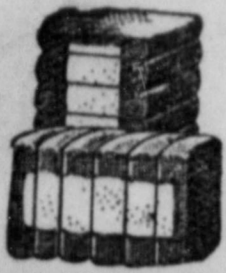

WORK TO BEGIN MONDAY ON '62 FOOTBALL CAMPAIGN

Inexperience Poses Biggest Problem

The Jayton Jaybirds, faced with the problem of replacing nine graduating seniors from last year's bi-district title team, begin preparation Monday night for the 1962 football campaign.

Speed may be the key word this year, since the loss of last season's high scorers Merle Smith and Cecil Hallum leaves the Jaybirds without the rugged ground game they have thrived on in the past.

The top veteran returnees are seniors Harold Murrell and Woody Byrd and junior Billy Stannaland. A flock of quick but small freshmen and sophomores will help.

Six teams from last year's nine-game slate are lined up again this year, with four others being added to the schedule.

For the first time in quite a few years, Jayton gridders will be starting from scratch, as far as a winning streak is concerned.

After marking up 10 wins in a row to run their streak to 36 games without a loss, the Jaybirds bowed in the final game of last year.

Three conference games will pit Jayton against Guthrie, Roaring Springs and Patton Springs the last three weeks of the schedule.

In non-league action, Jayton will host Smyer Sept. 7 in the season opener, and later Bula, Oklaunion and Pettit, Three Way, Garden City and Sterling City will be played away from home.

Homecoming will be Friday, Oct. 12, against Pettit.

They had quite a lengthy discussion regarding the road department personnel, and whether the number should be increased or decreased, with some "personalities" entering into the discussion.

They voted to borrow from the First National Bank in Aspermont \$20,000.00 to tide the county over on a couple of its funds until the tax money begins to come in.

They tabled until October a petition calling for an election to vote bonds and assess a tax for the building of a County hospital.

One oil company has shown an interest in Kent County School land royalties in Dawson and Martin Counties, so an order was issued to take care of the legal matters in this regard.

Also they voted to pay the current bills.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12 proposing an Amendment to Section 40 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees, providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State, prescribing the form of ballot, providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

Section 1. That Section 40 of Article III of the State Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 40. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of the county or political subdivision as in its judgment is necessary or required, and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the submission of such insurance to the counties or political subdivisions of this State and for the payment of the cost, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November A.D. 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
