Rebuilding Year Faces Jayton Gridders

Coming from a coach who has made a habit of winning football games here, Wilford "Sonny" Arthur's outlook for his 1962 edition isn't very bright.

Until Wellman derailed his Jaybird outfit 14-12 in the regional eight-man championship game last year, Jayton had put together a string of 36 games without a loss, stretching over four seasons.

But one of the most optimistic things Arthur can come up with this year is a hope that the Wellman loss doesn't start a streak in the wrong direction.

For only three of the 19 reporting this year for his team are lettermen, and replacing six starters lost last year by graduation may be one of the biggest tasks Arthur's had in front of him in the 10 years he's been at the coaching helm at Jayton.

"We've got a bunch of inexperienced kids this time, and the road ahead of us is awful long. I just don't know if we can make it in govt fashion or not," laments Arthur.

"Anytime you have to depend on freshmen and sophomores you're in trouble, and that's where we're sittin' this year. Any kind of key injury will really set us back."

With only two seniors and three juniors on the squad, he doesn't have a whole lot of choice. The upperclassmen will fill five of the eight positions, but the other three will have to come from the 19 sophomores and 4 freshmen he has lost.

Key veteran is fullback Harold Murrell, who has been hampered in early drills with a pulled leg muscle. Three other prospective starters, sophomore end William Ray Smith and freshman ends Eddie Morales and Gerald Murrell, have been slowed by ailing knees and backs.

Older of the two Murrell brothers, Harold is the best bet for post-season recognition this year. The three-year letterman scored 75 points and passed for 20 more last year, and Arthur makes no secret of the fact he's relying on the 6-4, 200-lb. senior again this season.

The other two lettermen are Woody Byrd, a 160-lb. senior halfback, and Billy Stanaland, a 170-lb. junior vying with him for the halfback slot.

The Jaybirds will have left in the line this year to partly offset lack of experience. It comes mainly with two sophomores, 215-lb. Donnie Rinker and 185-lb. Mark "Red" Taylor, both of whom are alternating both of guard and center. And between guard and center, "Uh-uh. Slow, slow," Arthur threw in with a wry grin.

"Stanaland and Judy (Kenny, sophomore quarterback candidate) are runnin' about neck and neck in the races," he said, "and they should give us a lot of go-up-and-go in the backfield."

For the district race, Arthur puts the tab on Roaring Springs, with Patton Springs also a top contender. Oklahoma locks the biggest non-union lock to overcome. About his chances, the Jayton defender said if everything developed pretty good he "might come out with a 5-5 season."

And if things don't develop? "Well, we just hope we don't get humiliated," he said, but got the smile on his face indicated he didn't think it would be quite that bad.

A preview of this year's Jayton grid campaign may be seen at 8 p.m. today at Jaybird Field when the Jaybirds contest a group of exes and outsiders in a scrimmage under game-type conditions. There is no admission fee.

Full Slate Of Teachers Ready To Go

The Jayton Schools will open doors for the new term on Tuesday morning, Sept. 4 at 8:45 o'clock, states Supt. Chas O. Champion.

Lunch will be served at the school and the buses will run on schedule. Champion said Tuesday that he had a full slate of teachers including the Spanish teacher. And Spanish will be offered in the intermediate grades as well as in the high school. In the grades it will be in a simple, conversational form, and for short class periods.

There will be a total of 22 teachers or professional employees of the school this term.

At a recent meeting of the board of education Supt. Champion told them "We do not have an 'average' teacher in the system. Every member of the faculty is above average."

TV Booster Station Gets Green Light

Local persons who are working on the TV pickup station to be built here, were happy that the Federal Agency that controls such activities, the FCC has granted permission for such activities. Plans are to erect a huge antenna atop the city water tower to pick up channels 11 and 13 from Lubbock. And then to rebroadcast the signal with 1 watt of power. It is supposed to give a good clear signal up to about 10 miles out around Jayton.

This is a cooperative program supported by donations. Channel 11 permit is final, but channel 13 is being held up because of a technicality in filling the application, and it should come through within a few days. It is not known just how long it will take to get this program into operation, but it shouldn't take too long. It is hoped this will greatly add to the reception in this immediate area.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

MEANS PUT IN USE TO RAISE MORE ON FEWER ACRES

Farmers of this area are producing more on fewer acres than ever before.

And it's all the result of a new trend of planning ahead, wisely, in order to make each enterprise pay.

In realization of the trend, more and more farmers are catching on to the idea and importance of proper planning.

In the past, great strides in production have been made, but the big question involved is "How much has it cost us?" You know it's possible to get a bigger production by taking all from the land and putting nothing back.

"The man with a plan" is a recent motto of the successful farmer or rancher. The plan is very basic and simple and has been stressed throughout the nation, and not entirely by soil conservation districts.

Soil conservation districts were created for the sole purpose of helping farmers and ranchers apply money-making soil conservation practices on their land.

It works something like this basic concept: using each acre within its capacity and treating it according to its needs.

Many times, often through ignorance, land owners misuse their land by trying to make it produce something which it is not capable of producing.

An example of this might be trying to raise cotton on a steep hill with shallow soil.

Some farmers may think that sounds rather stupid, but there are still many farmers who farm land which should never have been broken out to cropland.

The Soil Conservation Service, working through the local Duck Creek Soil Conservation District, has personnel to assist landowners plan each acre within its capability. The average conservation farmer earns \$3000 more per

year than the average non-conservation farmer. It's something to think about.


