AUXILIARY SCHOOL HELP GIVEN RAISES IN SALARIES

At a meeting of the Jayton School board last Thursday night, several items of business were transacted, Supr. Chas. O. Champion informs the Chronicle.

These included: Miss Cheyne the lunch room supervisor was given a raise of \$50 per month, setting her salary at \$225.00.

Other lunch room personnel, Mrs. Johnson, Mrs. Cox and Mrs. Fuller were given \$40.00 raises putting their salaries at \$160.00.

The board voted to employ Dr. Arthur R. Maneille as game physician at all football games at home, and to pay

him a fee of \$25.00 per game. All physical education students including girls basketball will need to have a physical examination. Champion said and these examinations will be given by the school nurse under the direction of Dr. Bob Alexander.

In addition to paying the bills the board decided against the bond going to the Three Way Football game due to the extreme distance, and the fact that they would be so late getting home.

The school has transferred its depository to the Kent Co. State Bank in Jayton.

GREAT PLAINS PROGRAM NOW AVAILABLE TO LOCAL FARMERS AND RANCHERS

The Great Plains Conservation program was put into effect by law in 1957. There are ten states included under the program. Within these ten states there are certain counties which are designated for cost share assistance. Kent County is one of these designated counties.

At the present time, there are 29 active Great Plains Conservation Program contracts in Kent County. These contracts cover 109,591 acres. Each of these acres is receiving ingredients according to the basic conservation needs.

This acreage represents 32% of the total land area in Kent County. There are many more acres which need this basic conservation treatment.

The basic purpose for carrying out this needed conservation is to make a more stable condition in our county by maintaining our natural resources, soil and water.

Cost share provided under this program is to assist you, as a land owner to carry out an organized plan of operation which will minimize erosion, hazards and maintain or improve the productivity of the soils.

The program is designed to assist you in solving difficult and long term land use changes. It provides cost share assistance for needed conservation practices over a long period of time, up to 10 years.

In Kent County, cost share assistance is available for brush control, cross fences, live stock water facilities, terraces, waterways, and range seeding which are needed to achieve a complete conservation plan on an operating unit.

You as a land owner or operator are eligible to participate in this voluntary program by making application.

The Duck Creek district urges all land owners who have a need for this program to contact the local personnel of the Soil Conservation Service.

They will be happy to provide any technical assistance necessary to assist you in designing a complete conservation plan for your farm or ranch.

Notes From Co. Agent Deadline Near To File Claim for Gas Tax Refund

Refund on federal gasoline tax must be made on or before Oct. 1. Forms are available from the County Agent to claim the refund.

The refund will be given on gasoline bought during the time of July 1, 1961 to June 30, 1962 at the rate of 4c per gallon.

Any farm operator or tenant may apply for refund on gasoline used in farming purposes.

Complete information and the forms are available from the county agent.

SUNDAY SET FOR ORAL POLIO VACCINES FOR KENT COUNTY PEOPLE

Sunday has been set up as Kent County day to give the Oral Polio Vaccine.

The County and the School are sponsoring this jointly.

Judge D. J. Young informed the Chronicle that the SOS program, as it is known, will be given from the court house.

Dr. A. R. Maneille, and the school nurse Mrs. Hal Dean Cave, will be administering the program.

Hours for the taking of the immunization have been set for 1 to 5 in the evening.

Judge Young said that a fee of 25c per person will be charged, but if a person has no money, he will not be refused.

Mayor Thos. P. Johnston, who has been interested in this program, and worked to help get it set up, urges all, old and young to take the medicine.

He said if they think they are too old to take polio, they still have the danger of being carriers.

Anyone who wants to is invited to take this oral defense against polio, but especially all residents of Kent County.

Favor says, Vetch and Austrian winter peas also nurse crop of rye, oats or barley. Cost share of rye and vetch is 2.20 per acre for Austrian Winter peas in regular rows 1.11 per acre.

Sandy land is especially adapted to rye and vetch while blank rows between cotton is suitable for Austrian peas.

Come by the SCS office and let us explain how you can save your soil and build up fertility at the same time, states Favor.

"Students will be considered for scholastic deferment, and will in all probability be given the deferment if they're full time students and are making passing grades," he said.

"Of course there is no such thing as a blanket deferment for students," he said, "Local boards grant deferments on the basis of their best judgment based on their regulatory powers and the individual merit of each case."

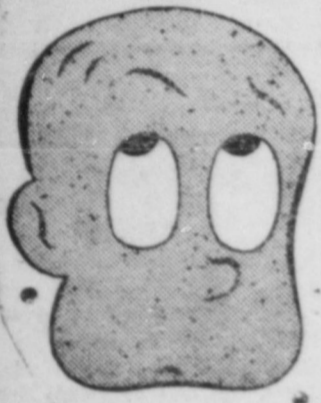

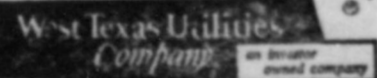

**Care Needed In Buying Clothes**

Family Clothing is one of our special needs and requires planning and skill in order to have each family member suitably and comfortably clothed. The vast amount of materials used in ready to wear clothing necessitates a knowledge on the part of the consumer in order to make the best purchase for a persons needs, states Mrs. Agnes Marrs, County Home Demonstration Agent.

The cost of clothing includes more than just the cost of the garment or article of clothing. Methods of keeping garments ready to wear are included in the cost of clothing. Garments which have to be sent to a professional cleaner each time they require cleaning may cost more even though the initial cost is less than garments that can be laundered at home.

Care of clothing involves as much of the home makers' time as the actual construction of the garment, many times. An adequate wardrobe for any member of the family provides clothing for the various activities of that person.

Some people require more different garments because of their vocations than others. School children, says Mrs. Marrs, require more different garments to provide adequate clothing for various activities, such as classroom, sports activities, church, work at home, parties or best dress wear, rain wear etc.

Only by careful planning can most families provide all the clothing to meet the needs of each member of the family. This planning includes taking stock of all the clothing on hand, listing the various activities for which different types of clothing are needed, taking into account the amount of money which can be provided for each family member, the planning for suitable accessories, selecting articles to go well together as to color and design, and finally selecting articles of clothing which will fit into the present wardrobe.

Very few people are able to go to town to the stores and purchase a complete new outfit for each season of the year so it is important that the present wardrobe taken into consideration when purchasing clothing and accessories.

This planning requires knowledge on the part of the consumer, says Mrs. Marrs, as to types of fabrics available and how they will wear, and respond to laundering or cleaning, and how they will handle in
