## TV Booster Units Operating

Workmen Thursday completed the erection and mounting of the new television booster station in Jayton.

Antennas and rebroadcasting sets have been mounted on top of the city water tower. The signals of Channels -11 and 13, Lubbock will be received and then rebroadcast.

Channel 11 will go out on channel 5 and channel 13 will go out on 7.

A test was run on channel 13 Wednesday night. It did good except there was interference

from channel 7 in Lawton, Okla. The technician in charge of the program says it may be necessary to get your set tuned for channels 5 and 7, especially if your set has been in the repair shop since you have had it.

He said if you get a slated look on your set it will be from channel 7, Lawton coming in on the same channel. In this case you may have to lower your antenna to where it will not come in.

The fund still is in need of money for this project. Men in charge of the fund ask that anyone who uses this facility, it will be appreciated if you will give \$15 or any amount you can to its support.

Turn your antenna toward the Jayton city water tower, and tune in either channel 5 or 7 on your set and see how you get along. It is supposed to go out with a strong signal 8 to 10 miles to the west and north and 5 to 6 miles to the east and south.

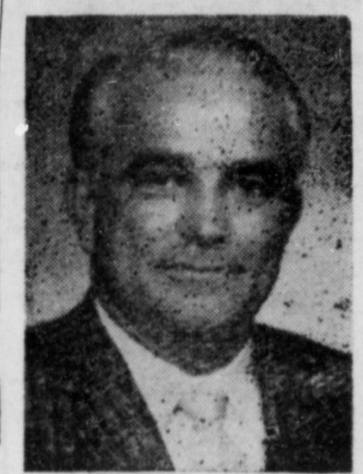
Tom Love was the man who climbed the water tower, and then the three cornered antenna tower to erect the new equipment. It seems there were not too many people wanting his job.

## COVER CROP CAN MEAN MUCH TO YOUR FARM LAND

The recent rains over the area have given opportunity for the planting of crops for cover. A good cover crop planted now in those skip rows or those directed acres will keep it from blowing next spring or winter. Some good cover crops to plant are, oats, barley, wheat, vetch and Austrian winter peas. Any of them will do the job and you make your choice.

A growing crop on the land is a valuable conservation measure. It will first of all help to control soil blowing. Blowing dust makes our homes an unpleasant place to live in. And much of this can be overcome if we will cover the land. The blowing dust removes from the land valuable clay particles which is the key to the fertility of the soil to hold and store water for crop production, the ability of holding capacity of the soil to hold and store water for crop production, the ability of the soil to form stable clods that will resist wind erosion.

Keeping a cover on the land will help to get more water in the soil during periods of rainfall. This stored moisture may be used the following season. The cover crop also provides residue which helps to maintain soil in a good physical condition for valuable crop production. The soil and the rainfall that is stored in it are the greatest natural resources we have in this area. Every effort should be made to use them to their greatest benefit. There are some objections to the planting of a crop just for cover. It is an expense in

which there is usually no direct cash return to the farmer. It also uses valuable soil moisture that could be used for cash crop production. The first objection is true if the best results of cover are to be obtained. However some grazing of livestock and an occasional harvesting of small grain does no harm to the practice. The second objection is not as serious as it may appear. If tillage is necessary to control wind erosion, then all the moisture in the top 8 to 10 inches of the soil is lost anyway. If rainfall does occur runoff on the bare land is much greater. It is possible that the cover crop may increase the water intake to more than provide for its own growth.

To overcome some of this problem with small grain as a cover crop one may use sweep and undercut it just as plant crop starts to boot. This moisture consumption of the plant up to this point is small but makes a very sharp increase after it goes into the booting stage. Cover crops can be successfully used to help stabilize crop production if used with skill.

A cyclone seeder is available for seeding cover crops at the local Soil Conservation Service office in Jayton. This seeder is furnished by the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District free of charge to any farmer wanting to seed a cover crop. Cost share assistance is available for seeding approved cover crops under the ACP. Information regarding this may be obtained at the local ASCS office.

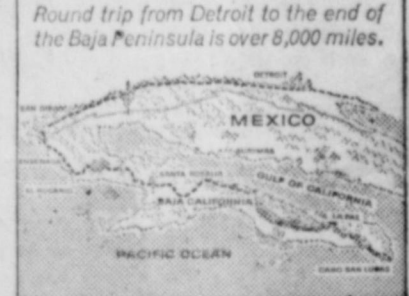

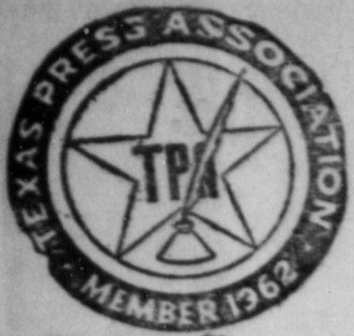

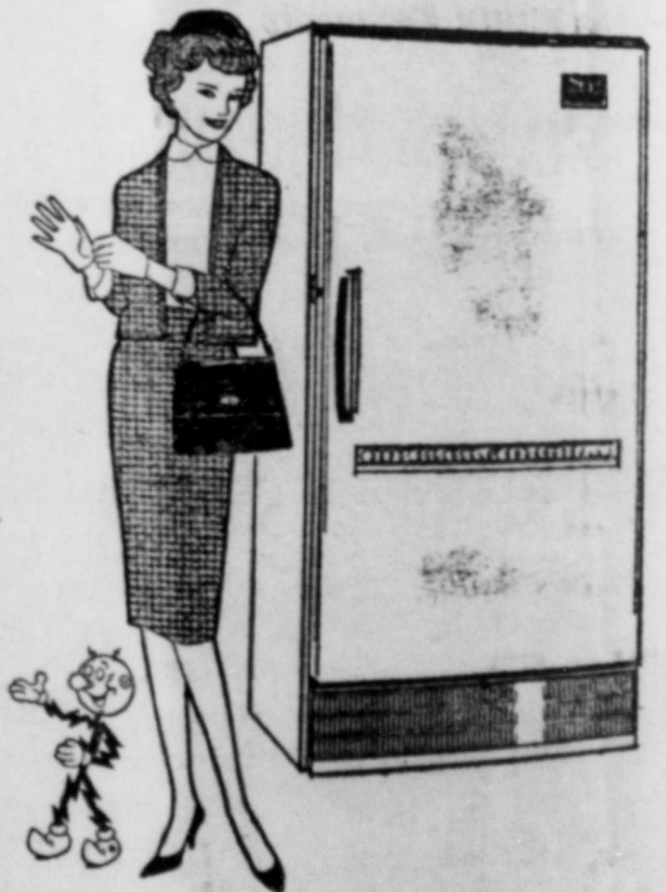
