the district next Tuesday night
Oct. 2 in the Girard School
Lunchroom at 7:30. All farm-
ers and ranchers interested in
conservation are urged to be
present for the meeting.

Bill Hatchett, agronomist of
the Spur Experiment Station
will be present to present some
results of work done at the
Spur station on conservation.

This informative discussion

After Hatchett's discussion
the election of supervisor will
be held. SCS district super-
visors are elected for 5 years.

The Duck Creek district has
5 zones. Zone 4 of the district

Fork Oil Field to FM 1328, FM
road 1328 and east to the
county line are within the zone
and are eligible to vote for
supervisor in the election.

County Agent Mark A. Geeslin says that latest research developments at the Texas Experimental Ranch will be presented to the public at a special field day on Thursday, Oct. 4 from 9 to 3.

William J. Dub Waldrip pictured above, is in charge of activities at the ranch which is located 10 miles north of Throckmorton on the Seymour Highway.

The morning program will be devoted to guided tours of pastures where important grazing management studies are under way. Visitors also will see the revolutionary "suspension" fence which enables cattlemen to cut fencing costs as much as 30 percent. The first 100 visitors from counties other than Throckmorton and Baylor will receive free tickets to the noon barbecue.

A number of A&M Specialists will be on the program.

Review Given of Library Books

The Chronicle has been asked to run the review below of the religious books on file in the Kent County Library.

The New Testament in Modern Times, translated by J. B. Phillips.

Day Christ Died, by Jim Bishop. A book about the dramatic day in the history of the world, the day on which Jesus of Nazareth died. It begins a 6 p. m. the opening of the Hebrew day with Jesus and ten of the Apostles coming through the pass between the Mount of Olives and the Mt. of Offense enroute to Jerusalem and the Last Supper. It closes at 4 p. m. of the following afternoon when Jesus was taken down from the cross.

The Greatest Story, Ever Told, by Fulton Oursler. This is the story of Jesus. It is a Chronology of events from the betrothal of Mary and Joseph to the days after the resurrection, and the episodes are taken from the four gospels. What is imaginative in the narrative is largely detail to fill in chinks left open in the bible accounts; nothing has been included that did not seem reasonable assumption from the

We did add self-adjusting brakes and a more fully aluminized muffler; interiors and outside trim are refined a bit, but the rest is pure Corvair with all the over-the-road goodness that implies. Oh yes, we changed the taillights so all those people you pass will know you're driving a '63.
