The big battle now raging in Mississippi between the federal judicial and executive branches of the government, and the State of Mississippi and a lot of people concerned. And most people view it with mixed emotions.

Most people agree with the thought that we must obey the law whether or not we like it. But this being true many of us have a lot of admiration for Governor Barnett and his fortitude in holding on to states right as long as possible - even though he knew all along it was a lost cause.

The most of us have no sympathy for Edwin Walker. He dabbled in something that did not directly concern him.

But its appalling to think the way he has been treated.

Federal marshalls, who were in Mississippi under the pretense of protecting civil rights and the individual American liberties, regardless of the individual, have completely ignored his rights.

It is getting to be a common occurrence, especially in federal courts to set unreasonable bail as was done to Walker. This in itself is a violation of the Constitution.

Walker's attorneys have very rightly said that he is a political prisoner.

This is a poor time to elite some basic truth, it seems, but a good question to ask, would be one asked long ago "Shall we do evil that good may come?"

Most everyone involved in the Ole Miss dispute seem to be directed, not by what is good or right but by what they can get by with. Or, get there the fastest with the mostest, as the old expression goes.

Each side is blaming the other with being the cause of the rioting and bloodshed. It is a pretty good guess that all concerned were excited and a bit set on doing things their way.

When one of them points his finger at the other and says "What you did was wrong" it is quite likely that he is telling the truth.

Our thought, concerning both parties, is, is it worth it?

Is it worth it to the people of Mississippi to have all this commotion? When they were fighting a lost cause from the beginning.

On the other hand, is it actually worth all the cost and is it worth all the public demonst just to prove that any one individual can enter any college?

It makes a mockery out of the principle of civil liberty, when, in enforcing the liberties of one person, federal personnel will step in and in doing this trample down the rights of thousands of residents of the State of Mississippi.

Yes, we need to examine our system of values.

Many, many times in the past few years our chief executive, under both parties, has backed down, because he did not think the good to be accomplished was worth the risk, and sat by and watched freedom trampled into the ground. And then, in the face of this, we see them call out the Army, both Eisenhower and Kennedy have done it, to accomplish nothing really, except to prove a point that was proved more than a hundred years ago, and that is that the north has the power to brutally inflict upon the south anything that it wants to, and can take down their throats

Morrison Is SCS Supervisor

J. B. Morrison, jr. was reelected as supervisor of Zone 4 of the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District in an election held at the Girard school lunch room last Tuesday night. His office for five years will represent the land owners on the five man board of the Soil Conservation District.

William Hatchett, agronomist of the Spur Experiment Station presented a program on conservation work at the station. He gave data on the work of bench levelling dry land areas on the station and on adding cotton burrs to the soil.

"Leveling of clay loam soils on terraced land with less than 1 percent slope under dry land conditions markedly increased yields of cotton on the rolling plains" the station report shows.

Hatchett reported that the addition of cotton burrs to the soil increased yield from 156 pounds to 2412 lbs increased the moisture penetration from 17 inches to 42 inches into the soil, and reduced the runoff from 3.4 inch to 1.05 inch where burrs were applied.

Personnel from the county agent office, vocational agricultural departments and SCS participated in the meeting.

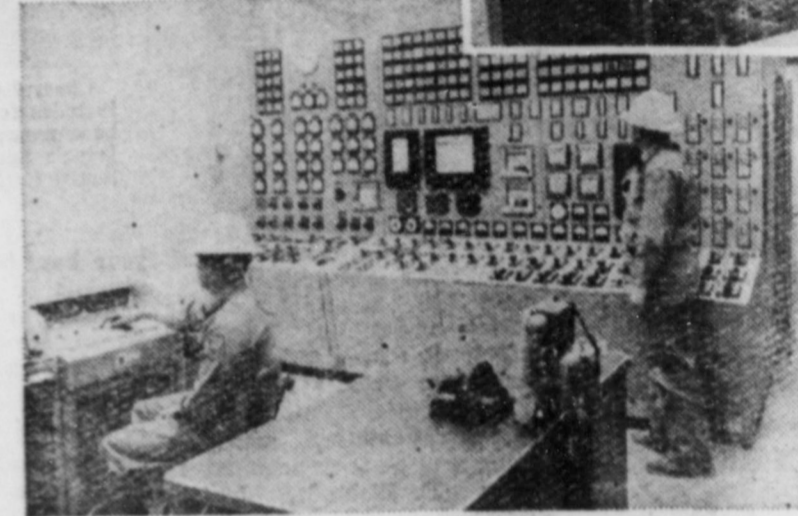


CONTROL ROOM W.T.U. OAK CREEK PLANT

ELECTRONIC SCANNING SYSTEM
