## JAYBIRDS COAST PAST PETTIT FRIDAY NIGHT 40-0

The Jayton Jaybirds, in what amounted to no more than a good work out, outplayed the Pettit team 40 to 0 here Friday night before a large home coming crowd.

Harold Murrell took the opening kick at the 5 yard line and ran it back into the end zone to begin activities and by the end of the quarter they held a 28 to 0 lead.

Not once in the entire encounter did the visitors even make a penetration or threaten to score.

Jayton led in first downs 11 to 4, Pettit made a total of 24 yards on gain plays but they lost 30 on other plays, giving them a net of 54 yards. They attempted a total of 7 passes. Three of them fell into Jaybird hands. Two were completed for 13 yards gain.

Jayton had a whole brace of boys carrying the ball.

Bill Stanaland carried 3 times for 2, 4, and 40 yards.

Alan Dunlap picked up 14 yards, Granville Smith 19, Eddie Morales 24, Harold Murrell 7, Kenneth Davis 19, Gerald Murrell 7, William Smith 18, and Charley Murdoch 34.

The total team yardage was 207.

Jayton attempted 3 passes, completing 2 of them for 51 yards.

## New Funds Are Available For Rural Loans

An additional \$152 million has been made available for rural housing loans, Sec. of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced today.

This action makes a total of \$182 million available through the Farmers Home Administration for this type of credit during fiscal 1963.

These funds will help more than 20,000 rural families who do not now have adequate housing facilities to obtain credit to finance a new home or improve the home they already own, Freeman said.

Rural housing loans may be used to construct, modernize or repair homes and farm service buildings. They are available to farmers and residents of rural communities who cannot obtain credit from other sources, Freeman said.

With all due respect to Guff he may be right as that part of the article did not come from the minutes. It came from an old timer who stated that it was hear-say.

Anyway we will say it might have been a hackberry tree.

## Soil Residue Practice Is Best To Keep Land In Top Condition

Soil management is a very important phase of agriculture. It not only applies to cropland but rangeland as well.

It is important to all people who manage agricultural lands to maintain the productivity of the soil. Three factors that keep the soil productive include protecting the soil from wind and water erosion, protecting the soil from depletion of its fertility and maintaining the physical condition of the soil.

There are various ways of fulfilling these needs but one of the most important and practical is crop residue use.

It is termed as the use of plant residues left in cultivated fields by incorporating them in to the soil or leaving them on the surface during the year when critical erosion periods usually occur. These residues are produced from component of the soil and air.

Therefore if we continually take from our soil and do not return a portion of that which is produced back to the soil our soils tend to erode, run to gether and consequently become less productive. Our soil is like a bank account, if we continually take from it, we soon have no bank account or productive soil.

This single practice of crop residue use not only satisfies the three factors mentioned earlier of preventing erosion maintaining fertility and main taining a good physical condition in our soils but also reduces evaporation, increases infiltration, conserves moisture

and tends to maintain a more constant temperature this allowing plants to grow for a longer period during the year.

Some crop which are usually high residue producers are small grains, sorghums and soil improving crops such as Aurasian winter peas.

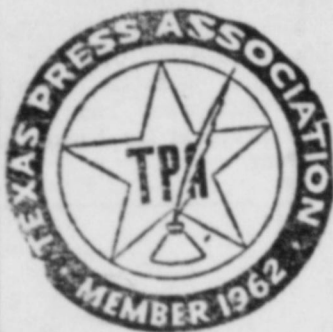
