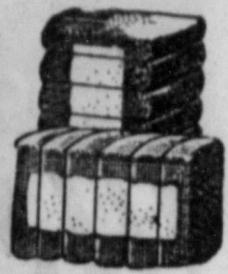

Kent County Oil Activity On The Increase

As far as the oil picture is concerned in Kent County, all eyes have been turned to the extreme south east portion, where there is now considerable activity.

C. L. Norsworthy Jr. of Dallas will drill the No. 1 M. E. Puryear as a 4600 foot wildcat to test the Noodle Creek zone in that area.

The explorer is 5 1/2 miles to the northwest of the most recently staked north and north west outpost to the rapidly expanding field.

It is also two miles south of a 7404 foot failure and two miles south west of a 6973 foot duster.

It spots 660 feet from south and west lines of Section 361 H&TC survey.

Also in that area Socony Mobil Oil Company Inc. has staked locations for five outposts to the Rough Draw or Noodle Creek field. All five are scheduled to 4200 feet.

The No. 9 W. I. Branch was staked as 1 1/2 mile north out post 1800 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of Section 324, Block 2 H&TC survey.

The No. 23 Jackson & Jackson was staked 1 1-4 mile to north outpost to production 1930 feet from north and east lines of Section 325 Block 2 H&TC survey.

Operator's No. 24 Jackson & Jackson is a 3-4 mile north out post and was staked 1288 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of Section 325 Block 2 H&TC survey.

One mile north of the field the No. 26 Jackson & Jackson was staked 2397 feet from the north and 1045 feet from the west lines of Section 325 in Block 2 H&TC survey.

The fifth project No. 28 Jackson & Jackson was staked 1 3-4 miles north of production 616 feet from south and 890 feet from west lines of Section 332, Block 2 H&TC survey.

Kent Boys Getting FFA and 4-H Calves Ready for Spring Show

Kent County 4-H Club and FFA members are fitting about 32 steers for the annual livestock show to be held early in March. Calves are drylot steers fad from October 1 to show date.

An added award will be made this year for the animal with the best rate of gain.

The animals will be weighed the first week in each month. Calf weights varied from 333 pounds to 852 pounds in the

October weighing.

New System Cuts Two Days From House Painting

There is no longer any need for America's 7,900,000 do-it-yourself house painters to worry about oil and water not mixing, according to the Florida paint research center, the Mary Carter Research Laboratory, maintained by the paint company of that name.

Scientists there have developed a new system which eliminates the need for an oil base primer in painting new wood with new latex paints.

The research was conducted in order to produce a water-thinnable primer to eliminate long, inconvenient waiting periods between priming and painting. The result, called Rol-ese, is the first and only completely water-thinnable primer and only primer that can be painted over in nearly two days — from home painting jobs, since the new product dries ready for a final coat in from four to six hours, rather than the 48 hours required with oil base primers.

Considered a major breakthrough in do-it-yourself painting, the new method permits a giant step forward in application of new latex paints now being heralded across country.

In addition to the drastic reduction in time between priming and painting, the Rol-ese system enables its users to paint on damp surfaces and in adverse weather conditions, a thing which is totally unfeasible with oil base primed paints.

The Mary Carter Paint Co., whose scientists developed the product, will market Rol-ese nationally through its more than 600 retail stores. It is available in six new colors — spring yellow, aquamarine, sandalwood, tawny beige, fairway green, and cherry blossom, as well as in white and light tint base, with custom tinting available.

Retail price for the paint as for the Rol-ese primer, will be under nine dollars per gallon. Like paint and primer will be sold on the basis of a gallon free with every gallon purchased.

Congressman Purcell Of Great Help To Kent County Group

The U. S. Congressman for this district, is the Hon. Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls. He has served in this capacity only a short time, having been elected at a special election in the spring of this year to replace Earl Bakard who resigned to take a private position.

Cong. Purcell has been our representative in the Congress only a few months, however he has been very helpful to Kent County in our efforts for progress.

The first citizen to call at his office from this general area was Willie Simmons from Claremont, to present him a survey made by the U. S. Study Commission with regard to establishing a dam creating a lake on Duck Creek. Cong. Purcell has made a substantial effort in getting this project included in a bill for the next Congress. The progress he has made in this respect has been reported periodically to the Kent County Development Corp. It is anticipated that a portion, if not all, the cost of such a dam would be a government grant for public works.

Furthermore he has personally taken up with Luther Hodges, Secretary of Commerce, a member of the President's Cabinet, the Kent County Development Corporation's application for Kent Co. to be designated as a Redevelopment Area under Public Law 87-27 and Sec. Hodges is seriously considering this application at the present.

This designation as an ARA county would entitle us to possible grants for public facilities such as water works, pipelines, sewer systems and the right to apply for government loans at a cheap rate of interest.

The efforts made by Cong. Purcell in regard to the ARA designation is primarily for help and aid to complete plans for the establishment of a copper tubing mill in Kent County to be known as the Texas Copper & Manufacturing Corp. and also for the future growth and welfare of Kent County.

The Kent County Development Corp. wants to express publicly its thanks to Congressman Purcell for his aid, advice and counsel with respect to the facts mentioned above.

Lincoln Lord is one of those handsome likeable and prepossessing men, who, today are heading so many of the organizations and institutions that control our lives. He has shaped his whole career to the belief, so widely held, that "getting along with people" is the most important thing in the world.

Outwardly, it has worked. He has gone up from one big job to another, the president of five different companies during the past ten years, until, as the story opens, he finds himself suddenly forced to re-observe his whole image of

success.

His detractors claim he is nothing but a front man with no real ability except the talent to sell himself: a brain picker who profits from other men's ideas; a phony who gets by only because of the magic of his personality.

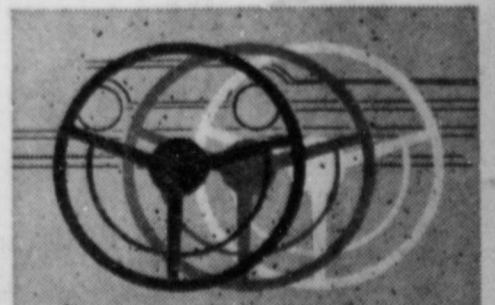

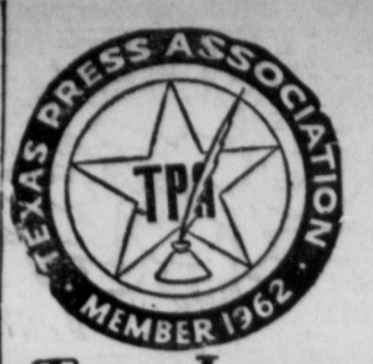
