The elections are now over and Texas has elected another governor.

This race was a peculiar one in fact that affairs of the state never did become real issues in the campaign.

The most important issue in the campaign was Connally's closeness to VP Johnson and the New Frontier.

This being the issue, there is no other conclusion to draw except that Texans Tuesday gave a wide vote of confidence to the president and the vice president, and the Democratic party as a whole.

Not in modern history before Tuesday has the party in power even been able to hold its own during off year elections much less gain strength. This year the Demos picked up 4 seats in the Senate and held its own in the Congress.

One of the real blows in the campaign was Nixon's defeat in California. He had to win this one to stay alive politically, but he lost by a wide margin. In a sour grapes swan song he made a bitter attack the newspapers and accused them of unfair reporting.

Just about all the Republicans who got snowed under showed very poor form as losers. None of them came forward when it was apparent they had lost and shelled the corn down like good sports.

And Jack Cox was in this group too.

Every person trying to decide whether or not to run for public office should ask him self this question "If I get beat, will I be able to take it?" If he is not sure, he better just stay out.

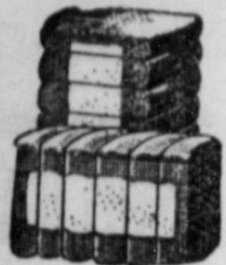

Jaybirds Edge Roaring Springs

It took the final play in the first half before the Jaybirds could take the lead in their game here with Roaring Springs Friday night.

Early in the game the visitors scored and held the lead almost the entire half. On the final play the Jaybirds went out ahead.

Jayton scored 6 in the first quarter, 14 in the second, and 8 each in the final two quarters.

The visitors made 14 in the first and 8 in the final making

the score 36 to 22.

The first downs were 7 each. Roaring Springs took the opening kickoff at the goal and ran it back to the 21. A good 30 yard pass set them up and then Ronny Davis ran over from the three for the first score of the game. The conversion attempt failed.

Jayton took the kick off at the 10 and moved back to the 32.

Stanaland got of a nice 45 yard run to the 3 yard line and then on the next play

there was a fumble and the visitors covered.

Roaring Springs were really enthused, but got off 3 plays with only 5 yards gain and kicked to the 30. Byrd took the ball and brought it back to the Roaring 18.

Stanaland made 15 and then Murrell made the remaining 3 to tie the game. On an effort to pick up the 2 to put them out ahead the visitors tightened their defense and it did not work.

The visitors took the kick at

the 10 and on first down Don Tardy went all the way for another TD and Davis added the 2 points giving them a 14 to 6 lead.

Jayton took the kick at the 10 and moved up to the 25 as the first quarter ended.

The Jaybirds met a stiff wall as three down produced only 2 yards and they punted to midfield with a high kick that was almost blocked.

Roaring Springs running from midfield ran three downs for no gain, and then had no luck on a fourth down pass effort, thus giving the Jaybirds the ball at midfield.

From here the Jayton fortunes were smiling.

Stanaland ran for 15 gain and then Murrell passed to Kyle for 25 and a TD and the Jaybirds had an opportunity to tie it up with the extra 2 points but this effort failed.

Roaring took the kick at the 15 and moved up to the 30. In three downs they only gained 3 yards and on a 4th down pass attempt, it was intercepted by Jayton's Bill Stanaland at the Roaring Springs 32.

With very little time on the clock the Jaybirds made a desperate bid, and the final play, that was put together in a big rush without going into a huddle. Murrell put one in the grasping hands of Woody Byrd at the 5 and he stepped over for the TD that put them out ahead just as the time ran out, and then Stanaland went across on the extra points play that gave Jayton the 20 to 14 half time lead.

After the half the home team took the kickoff at the 5 and up to the 17. On second down they had a pass intercepted.

But Roaring Springs were not to be outdone in the goof department so they fumbled on first down and Jayton took possession on their own 15.

Stanaland shook loose around left end, aided by a nice block from Murrell as he went around, went the distance the 65 yards for a TD and then Smith passed to Byrd for the 2 points giving the Birds a 28-14 lead at this point.

Roaring Springs took the kick at the 10 and moved to the 26. Again Stanaland picked off one of their passes at the Roaring 25.

And so here the Jaybirds returned the previous favor by fumbling on first down and the visitors took over at the 24.

Roaring Springs ran four downs for 9 gain and lost possession as the third quarter ended.

Murrell passed to Stanaland for 23 gain and then Smith drove through in a quick opening play for the 3 and another TD. Stanaland went into the end zone on the conversion attempt but there was a 15 yard penalty. So Murrell passed to Byrd from the 18 and the 2 points went into the book.

Well behind now, the visitors were not quitting. They put together a 20 yard pass and a 12 yard run for another TD and then added the 2 points to make up the final 36-22 score.

There was a couple of exchanges of the ball and the game ended.

This was definitely the hard hitting and best ball club to encounter the Jaybirds on the home field this year.

Connally And The Democrats Win

Democrat John Connally has won a decisive victory over his erstwhile opponent Jack Cox. Latest posted figures gave Connally a total of 781,563 votes to 661,126 for Cox. Also elected was Preston Smith of Lubbock as Lt. Governor and Waggoner Carr of

Lubbock as States Attorney. And Joe Pool of Dallas was elected Congressman at large. The official Kent County vote was as follows: For Governor, Connally 348, Cox 102, Carswell 1. For Lt. Governor, Smith 391, Hayes 72.

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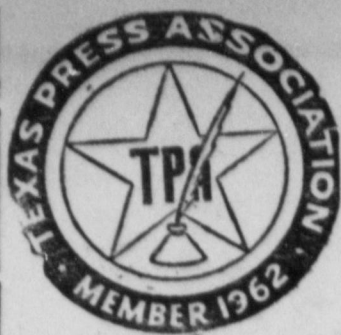

SCS MAKES TEST WITH BUFFALO GRASS

For a number of years the Range Conservationists have made intensive studies to determine the relationship between various degrees of leaf removal and root development on native grasses. It has been found that too much top removal results in a decreased root system. The reduction in number of roots developed, as well as length of the root system occurs even before it is apparent in the size or vigor of the plant.

Any reduction in the number of roots of the grass plant reduces the number of "pipelines" that transport water and minerals from the soil to the plant.

If the root system becomes short as result of excessive removal of top growth, the plant cannot pump water from the deep moisture which is necessary during periods of drought. When this occurs the plant goes dormant or may even die due to the lack of a water supply.

It has been found that about 50% by weight of the yearly growth of a grass plant can be grazed without serious damage to the root system.

Stubble height can be used to some extent in determining when a plant is properly used. However, due to changing climatic conditions, grass production varies considerably from year to year and stubble height alone cannot be used as a measuring stick for determining proper range use.

The accompanying photos show the effect of various degrees of clippings, used to stimulate grazing, or buffalo grass which is also known as mesquite grass in this area.

In March 1958 three plants of Buffalo grass were transplanted to metal barrels about four feet deep. Plants were of equal size and each received the same amount of water throughout the year. Clippings were made as show under the photo. In November plants were removed from the barrels. Soil was carefully washed from the roots and photographs made. The study was made by Soil Conservation Service Technicians at Iowa Park.

On all rangeland, there are one or two "key" grasses that can tell you when the range is being grazed properly. These are the high producers, the most used by livestock. They are your best grasses, so keep an eye on them. Proper use of key grasses result in range improvement and more

had no adverse effect on the root system. Plant on right is overused to the extent that the grass would not survive prolonged dry periods and would be replaced by inferior plants.
