4H Stock Show Starts Today

The annual Kent County Stock Show gets under way at the 4-H Club Center in Clairemont today.

Swine and lambs will be judged tonight, states County Agent Mark A. Geeslin. Beef calves will be judged beginning at 9:00 Saturday morning. Following the beef judging Quarter Horses will be judged just before noon on Saturday.

Billy Earl Roach of Snyder will place the animals in the swine, lamb and beef classes. E. W. Cade Jr. will judge the horse class. Bruce Griffith of Crosbyton will classify the lambs and judge showmanship.

Members of the Kent County 4H Clubs will have the concession stand during Friday and Saturday morning. A barbecue lunch will be served at Saturday noon, Geeslin said.

The top 50 percent of each market class will sell at auction after lunch. Order of sale will be market hogs, lambs and calves.

The following library budget was approved: Supplies \$40.00, card files \$40.00, book binding \$75.00, book bank \$119.50, freight \$15.00. Adult books \$700.00 and children books \$400.00. A total budget of \$1,389.50.

Also the court voted to advertise for bids for a pickup for the county road department, and to pay the regular monthly bills.

1969 Signup Is Going Good

Signup in the 1969 farm programs is going at a good rate. To date 138 farms have signed to participate in the 1969 Cotton program. For the first time there will be no diverted acres under this program. A producer may plant all of his allotment, however he earns Price Support payments on only his domestic allotment (65 per cent of the regular farm allotment). He must certify his final cotton acreage by August 1. This must be an accurate figure.

The feed grain and wheat program sign-up is 50 per cent complete. To date 128 farms have signed to participate. A producer may divert 50 per cent of his feed grain base and plant 50 per cent. He will be paid for 35 per cent of the amount diverted and a price support payment on the 50 per cent planted. Small farms of 25 acres or less may divert for payment all of their allotment and plant no feed grain.

Sign-up for both programs continues through March 21, 1969.

Dr. William M. McLaury, 84, long time area doctor died at 2:55 p. m. Sunday in the Stamford hospital.

Funeral was held at 2 p. m. Tuesday in the Jayton Methodist Church with the pastor the Rev. Tommy Ewing officiating.

Burial was in the Clairemont Cemetery with Littlepage Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

He was born Oct. 15, 1884 in the Moran community. He married Nellie Smith of Snyder on Sept. 28, 1910.

He completed studies at the University of Tennessee Medical school in April 1909 and began practice at Clairemont. He moved to Jayton in 1917 and practiced there until retiring in 1945. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge, Scottish Rites, York Rite, Shriners and the Methodist Church.

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In Other Words...

The last time this column appeared, we noted that Tech's Gene Gibson was apparently on his way out. Saturday night after Tech's loss to the Aggies, President Graver Murray announced Gibson's contract would not be renewed when it expires May 31.

Evidently the board of Directors are going to let Gibson stay until his term expires and Gibson has said he was not going to resign before then. This could cause some trouble in the next three months.

After the next three games, until the end of the season, Gibson's main job will be recruiting the best boys he can get so that his successor will have a good team and thus justify the firing of Gibson. Gibson may well do a fine job of recruiting, but it's doubtful that he doesn't hold some resentment toward the board.

The best action would seem to be that of buying the remainder of Gibson's contract and let Charlie Lynch coach the rest of the season. Then Tech could start a good recruiting program and also save Gibson a lot of humiliation.

For a good while the sports writers have been good to Gibson and not criticized him very often. Here lately they really let him have it. His name has been headlines in the Lubbock paper almost every day for the past few weeks. Now this writer is certainly not a Gene Gibson fan, but I can't understand the way the daily press treats him.

Nevertheless, not all in Lubbock are in favor of giving the "Gibber" the ax. During Saturday night's game, some students were shouting in chorus, "Let's Keep Gibson."

Students didn't limit themselves to just shouting though. The start of the game was delayed twelve minutes so that ice and eggs could be tossed off the floor after students had bombarded the court following the announcement of the Aggie starting lineup.

It was rumored though that the students were mad at the Farmers because a Baylor player was reportedly beaten by Aggie's in the recent Aggie-Baylor game. The real cause came later though when Aggie Coach Shelby Metcalf requested the referee that all Tech students be made to leave the coliseum

before the finish of the game.

With 34 seconds left on the clock and Aggie ahead 7-0, a jump ball was called at mid court between two guards, a five-foot-ten-inch for Tech and a six-foot-one inch for Aggie. The ref threw the ball too high and a re-jump was called. On the first jump the Aggie had slipped at his way down and appeared injured. Metcalf immediately ran out and told the referee his man was too hurt to jump and would need to be substituted. Metcalf then sent in a seven foot player for the re-jump. Gibson then came off his seat and the students began to do their thing. The referee said everything was legal and proper and the game was to continue.

The Aggies of course controlled the tip and began to stall. This one incident was a smart move by Metcalf (surprisingly for an Aggie) and any SWC coach would probably do the same under the same conditions, even though it might be considered "dirty pool." Had Gibson done the same thing under the same circumstances, the students would have loved it. Gibson doesn't complain about this as much as what happened 21 seconds later. A Tech guard made a jump shot with just 3 seconds left and it appeared Tech had won the game. But the ref said he had taken too many steps and voided the shot, giving Aggie the ball. Well, maybe Tech'll beat them next year.

(Note: This column was written Monday night and Tuesday morning. President Murray announced Gibson would be released March 4 and the remainder of his contract paid off.)

Notes From The Co. HD Agent

We are being bombarded with so-called washing miracles - laundry products supercharged with enzymes. Are these more effective than detergents?

Research proves enzyme products get rid of many stubborn stains, but the housewife may be able to achieve the same results at half the cost.

The idea of soaking clothes before laundering to make your wash significantly cleaner is not new. Presoaking with detergent does as good a job as most of the stains as does presoaking, tests have shown.

In the tests there was some "very slight difference" between two enzyme products and a detergent in removing blood and gravy stains, with the enzyme doing slightly better. But all three removed egg stains completely in 30 minutes of soaking and spaghetti sauce overnight. All three removed a good part of grass, syrup, coffee and tea stains overnight. None did very well with mustard stains.

Housewives should first try presoaking in a solution made up of whatever laundry detergent they now use. It may perform surprisingly well - and at half the cost of an enzyme product.

Promoing the new enzyme products is expected to boost the total budget for laundry products from \$70 million in the last 12 months to \$100 million in the next 12 months.

New items on the market this spring include a new refrigerator that features instant chilled water and ice cubes which come from a dispenser outside the door. One merely presses a pitcher or glass against a cradle for ice and water.

Your dog may want to take revenge on his people paws with people crackers - bit-sized crackers shaped like mailmen, milkmen, burglars, and dog catchers. Clean hair is a must to be attractive and neat. Did you realize that roller curlers, especially the kind with brushes can get all soil and dirt right back into clean hair. Fill the washbasin with soapy water and give the curlers a cleaning now and then right along with your comb and brush. Don't forget to clean the comb in your purse, too.

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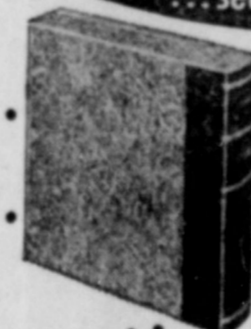
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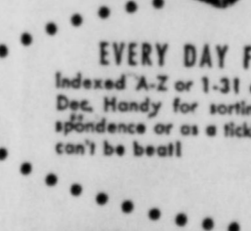
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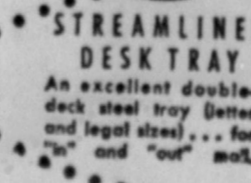
