This Week -- IN JAYTON



Just about no one, these days doubts that we will soon be landing one or more men on the surface of the moon. And it could well be before the end of this year. Right now this is not the real problem. The big problem they are working to get the answer to, is getting them off the moon.

Dead Line Near To Get Auto License Tags

Motorist have until Midnight next Tuesday (April 1) to get their license plates and get them on their vehicles. There can be no extension of the deadline since it is set by law. In 1970, vehicle owners will be mailed a special pre-prepared registration form, which eliminates most of the time-consuming typing by the registration clerk. Motorists will need only to bring the form to the county tax office or registration station, pay the fee and have the form validated with new license numbers.

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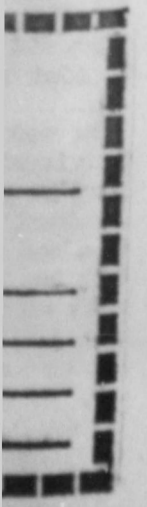
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GIRARD Pot Shots

Notes From The County HD Agent

Do you need to lose weight? The only way to take in your belt or slip into those spring slacks is to EAT LESS and EXERCISE MORE. But remember, all your huffing and puffing, rolling and rocking won't do any good without the inescapable exercise of turning your back on food and repeating "No!" To develop an effective weight-reduction plan, first determine how much you should weigh. If you are more than 10 pounds overweight, see your doctor. Count your calories! Most people leading moderately active lives need 15 calories per pound to maintain desired weight. Eat less to lose weight. If you are well above your desired weight, cut down the calorie intake, but not necessarily amount of food. Eat more low calorie food and shun gravies, creamed dishes, rich desserts, and fried foods. Eat slowly and load up on fillers - carrot sticks, leafy vegetables, radishes, consommés, and fresh fruits. It is important to balance your diet and vary your menus. Everyone needs protein, carbohydrates, fats vitamins, and minerals in his daily diet. Without them, your body can't function efficiently and you may be endangering your health. Select foods from the 4 food groups: Milk - milk, cheese, ice cream; Meat - beef, veal, lamb, pork, poultry, fish, eggs; Vegetables - Fruit; and Bread - Cereal - whole grain, enriched. You also need some fats or oil, but in all these foods moderation is the key word.

Dedication and determination are the mainstays of your diet. The only "secret" to weight reduction and control is in adhering to sound nutrition and intelligent dietary habits. Once you've achieved the "new you," eat and drink what you like, but in moderation and keep your eye on the scale.

Bones are an excellent guide to identifying tenderness of cuts of beef and how to cook them. T-bone, rib bone, pin bone, flat bone, and wedge bone indicate relatively tender beef. The round bone, arm bone, and blade bone indicate less tender cuts. There will be more on meats April 30 at the Jayton School Cafeteria.

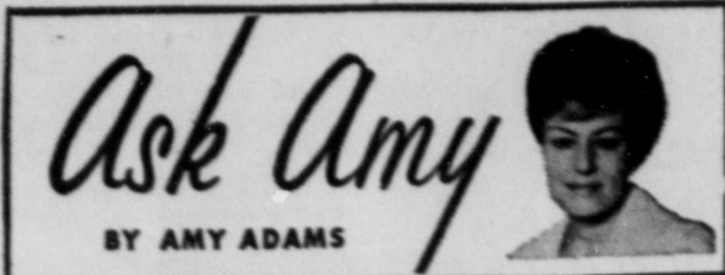

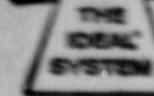
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
