## J. D. Patterson Gets The SCS Annual Award

J. D. Patterson has been selected as the Outstanding Conservationist in the Duck Creek Soil and Water Conservation District by its board of Supervisors.

Mr. Patterson was presented the award for being the top conservationist at the Jayton Lions Club meeting by George Love. J. D. has done an outstanding job of improving and applying conservation work on his ranch east of Jayton.

Because of the increase in brush, the decrease in grass production and the need for better grazing distribution, it was decided that an intensive conservation program was needed. To accomplish this, the ranch was entered into a Great Plains Conservation Program in 1966.

To date, Mr. Patterson has controlled brush by aerial spraying 4000 acres of mesquite and 600 acres of shinnery. He has also seeded 600 acres of rangeland to desirable grasses. 3000 acres of brush control and 160 acres of range seeding is planned to be completed by 1970.

Not only does he practice conservation on the ranch, but he talks it, encourage others to take care of the future by taking care of the things we have today. He is continuing to search for better methods to solve the conservation problem which is at hand.

Your local Soil Conservation Service personnel, Ed Parton - District Conservationist, George W. Love - Soil Conservationist and Carroll Johnson, Engineering Technician can help you decide on the conservation practices which will benefit you and the generations to follow.

## MEATS PROGRAM AT SCHOOL CAFETERIA THURSDAY, APRIL 10

Is the short plate a tough or tender cut of beef? How do you cook lamb? How do you cut a carcass?

To find out, attend the Meats Program at the Jayton School Cafeteria, 2 p. m., April 10th. The program, sponsored by the Kent County Agricultural Extension Service, will be conducted by Dr. Frank Orts, Mrs. Linda Caton, and Mrs. Jonnie Beasley.

Dr. Orts will show how to cut meat and discuss grades of meat. He is a native of Gonzales and holds his BS, MS, and PhD degrees from Texas A and M University in animal husbandry and meats. He was named to his present position of Meats Specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in 1963. Dr. Orts worked as Assistant County Agricultural Agent for Matagorda County from 1955-1957, then in San Saba County a year before returning to Texas A and M University to do graduate work.

Orts served as supervisor for the Meats Laboratory at A and M from 1959-1962 and general manager of the meat processing division of a commercial concern in Dallas prior to his present Extension assignment.

As Meats Specialist, Orts provides leadership for the Extension Service's educational programs for both youth and adults. He works with County Extension Agents of the state and with groups and organizations interested in subject matter areas related to his work. His headquarters are on A and M campus in the Animal Science Department.

Mrs. Linda Caton and Mrs. Jonnie Beasley, Home Economists for West Texas Utilities in Abilene, will discuss proper cooking of tough meat and tender meat.

Mrs. Caton is a May 1968 graduate of Abilene Christian College with a BS degree in Home Economics. She and her husband live near Abilene where Mr. Caton is engaged in farming.

Mrs. Beasley is a graduate of North Texas State University with a BS degree in Home Economics. In 1964, she was Home Economist for Community Public Service Company in Alamo, New Mexico. She also taught Home Economics four years in the El Paso Public School system. Upon moving to Abilene this year, she began her work with West Texas Utilities Company. Mr. Beasley teaches Physical Science at Madison Jr. High School in Abilene.

## Notes From The County HD Agent

For a well planned, economical shopping trip, make a shopping list. Look for meats, fruits and vegetables which might be good values at the market.

At meat counters look for the chuck roasts and steaks, ground beef, round steaks and boneless stew meat. Pork values include picnics, ham portions, end cut loin roasts and chops, shoulder roasts and the steaks and some brands of bacon.

Grade A large size eggs continue to offer the best combination of quality and economy for your egg money. Fresh fruits and vegetables in best supply at the most economical prices include grapefruit, oranges, bananas, pineapples, apples, potatoes, carrots, cabbage, dry onions, turnips, collards, mustard greens, eggplant, green onions and radishes.

Other food items on this month "plentiful" list include turkey, prunes, canned and frozen green beans and sweet corn, onions, rice, dry beans, peanuts and also peanut products. At present pinto beans are in best supply but others include pinks, black-eyes and baby lime beans.

Before you buy that deluxe sewing machine with the fancy gadgets ask "Do I really intend to do a lot of decorating? Is the extra cost worth it? Consider a less expensive machine that zig zags but does not do fancy decorative stitching for several reasons.

The machine's price can be a strong deterrent. A majority of them list at \$300 or more.

Secondly, you may never get around to doing all the embroidery that these machines permit.

The majority of sewing time is spent on routine construction and repair not on decoration.

Finally, most deluxe models of machines are so mechanically complex that it takes a thorough knowledge of the instruction manual and a great amount of practice to get the best use of them. Generally, the more complex the machine, the more likely the need of repairs.

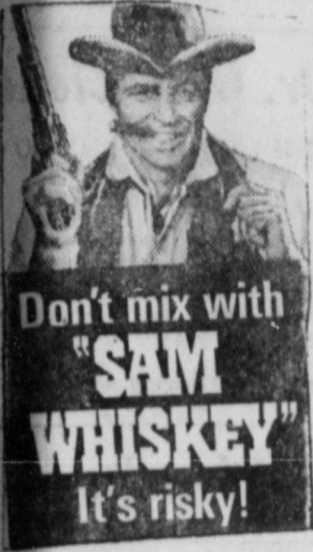

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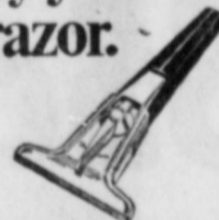

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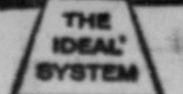
