

Are you plagued by skunks? One way to get rid of them is simply to catch them. Here is a simple, tricky, safe way to catch a skunk.

1. Place garbage can near area where skunks create disturbance. Keep lid nearby

2. Place I" x 6", or I" x 8". board on lip of can, resting other end on ground. Do not make angle steep - a long board is best. 3 Place bait, such as sardines.




