Coach Bob Coleman told the Chronicle this week he is resigning his position here to accept a job as athletic director and football coach at the Van Alstyne Schools in northeast Texas. This is a top bracket Class A school, in a highly industrial about 45 miles north of Dallas.

Coach Coleman said he had a good group of boys upon which to build, losing only two players off a team that lost two games last fall.

Coleman had an impressive record to show the people and Van Alstyne, Coach of the Year at Lubbock, and Regional Runnerup his second year at Jayton, after two losing years.

Mrs. Coleman will teach third grade. They plan to move about the middle of the summer, he said.

May Is Senior Citizen Month

May is National Senior Citizen Month with the emphasis on Safety. In Texas, falls are the leading cause of death for persons over 65 years of age. Motor vehicles rank second and fire third. How safe is your home?

Is rubbish clear from the attic, cellar, closets, yard, garage, and stairs? Do you keep flammable liquids in your home? They give off dangerous vapors and a spark could ignite a disastrous explosion. Keep only what is necessary and read labels. Some non inflammable liquids will do the job as well as flammable ones. Are they stored in safety containers?

Strong banisters or railings should be placed along each stairway, high enough to prevent such a person from toppling over them. Storage space needs to be easy to reach in areas where often used items are stored. Are night lights in the bedroom, bathroom areas and in the halls.

Is your bathroom safe for those older than 65 years? Have hand grippers installed in the bathtub and shower. Use non-slip rubber mats in the tub and shower and on the floor. Is just one night's supply of pills taken from the medicine chest and placed at bedside? Is a light located within easy bedside reach. The largest percent of accidents in senior citizens occur in the home. Make yours safe — and happy.

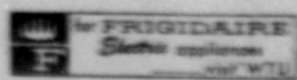
