



Joe stated that he doubted if this field of his would be worth harvesting. The extreme heat and dry weather coupled with the rains that followed caused a heavy grow. th of leaves. Insects have invaded mush of the cotton and many such acres are evi-

dent throughout the county. Income from cotton would be less this year than in the drought years of the early fifties if it was not for the price support program offered farmers through the Agricultural Act of 1965. This program will expire with the The cotton allotment for

Kent County is 19393 acres of which 14556 was planted this year. 12799 acres earned price support payments of \$0.1473 per pound times the normal yield. This gives cotton farmers in Kent County a payment of approximately \$514,647.00. This looks pretty good in the face of a short crop.


Gallagher is well-known in civic affairs, being active in volunteer work in many acres. He is active in the Lions Club of Jayton and serves as ex officio county school superintendent.





sell the property. Take this case: A woman sold her house, but continued to "hold over" her fire insurance. Sure enough, the house did burn down a few months later. But a court ruled that the woman could not collect on the policy.

"She suffered no loss," said the court, "because the property destroyed was not hers."

On the other hand, you may have an insurable interest in a piece of property even though you don't own it-and never did. For example:

A man took out fire insurance on a house he was occupying as a tenant under a four-year lease. When this house burned down, he demanded payment on his insurance policy-and a court upheld his claim. The judge said a leasehold, too, is a valuable property interest, an interest that fire insurance could protect.

But the tenant could collect only to the extent of his leasehold interest, not for the full value of the house. In short, fire insurance is supposed to let you come out even. is not supposed to let you make


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
