It rained most of Sunday night and Monday morning and to 9 a. m. Monday, a week our gage showed more than five inches, so next week that it from the Free State of Kent.

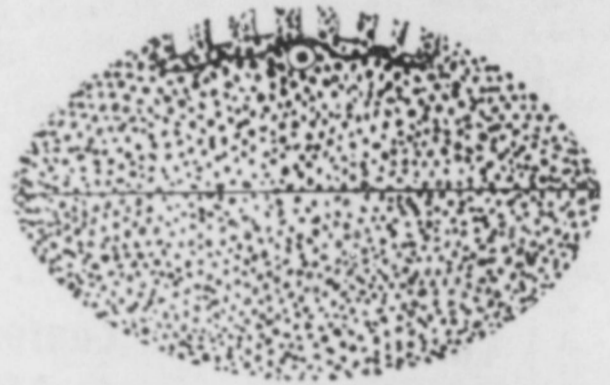

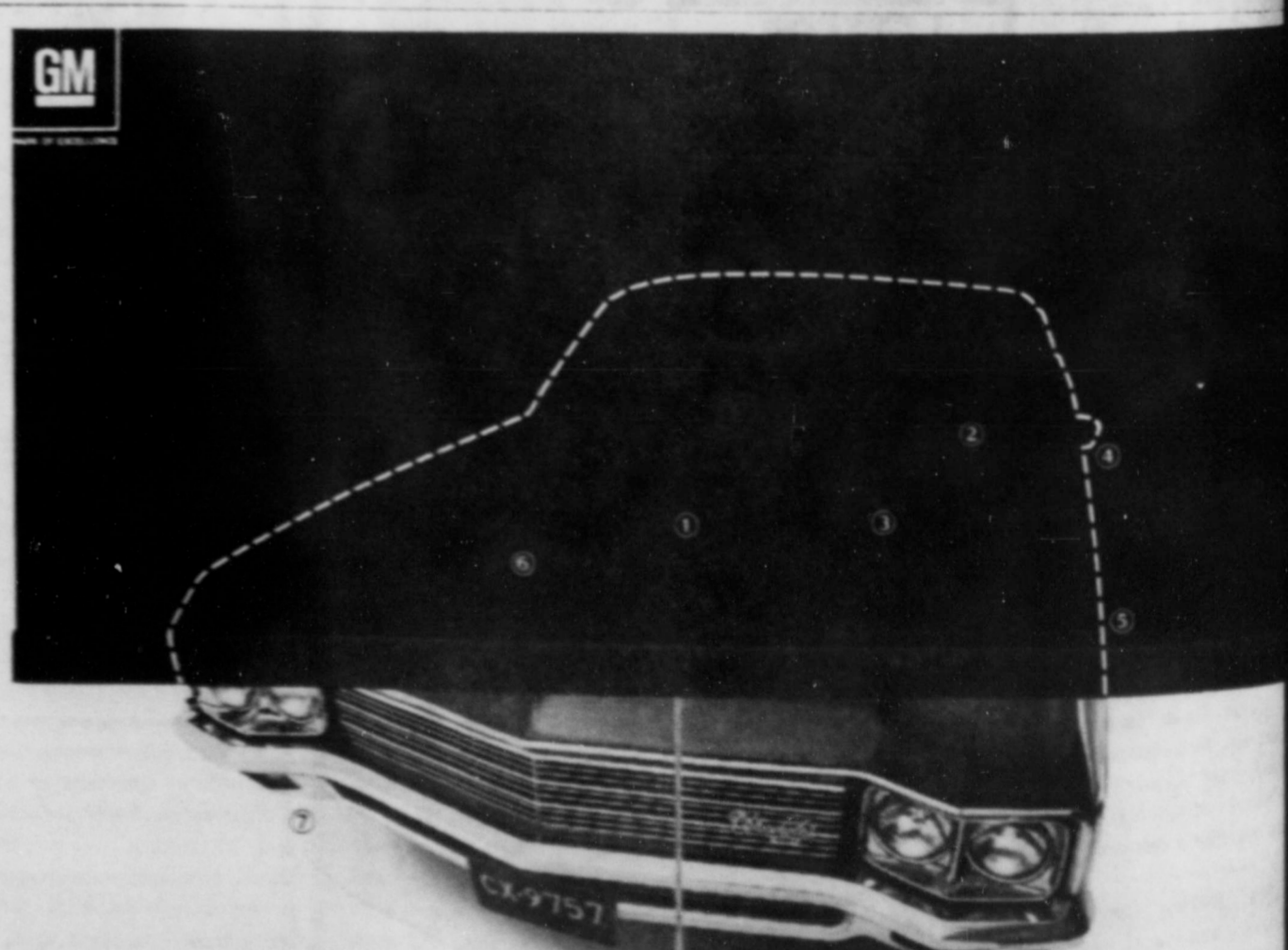

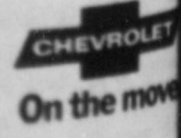

The child didn't know any better. Do you?

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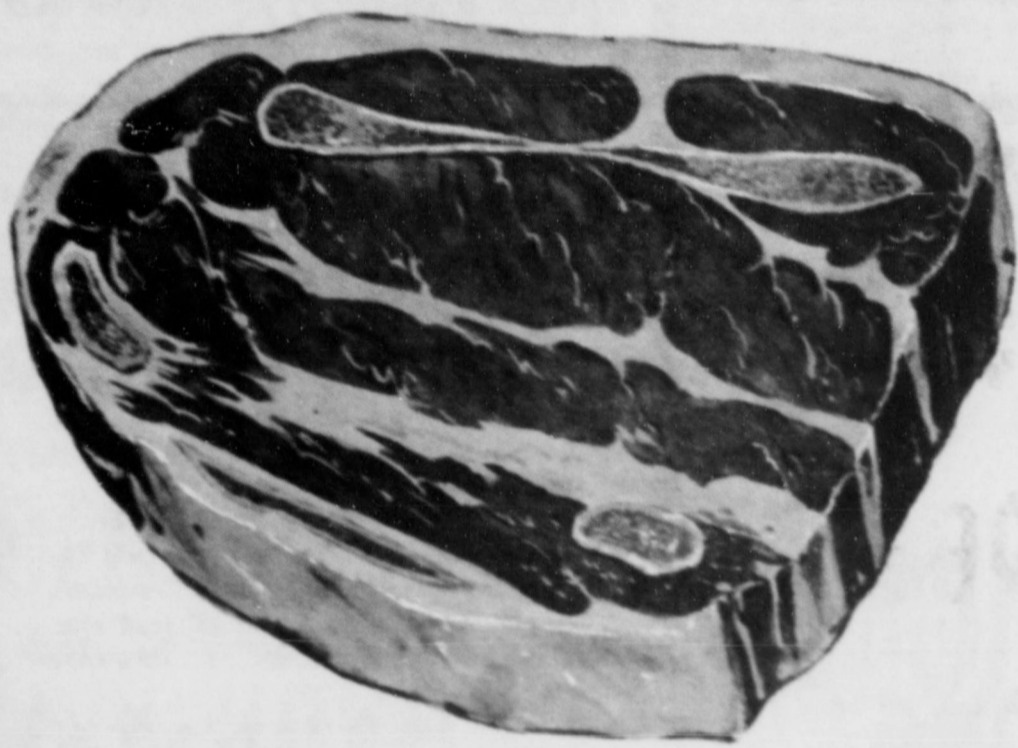

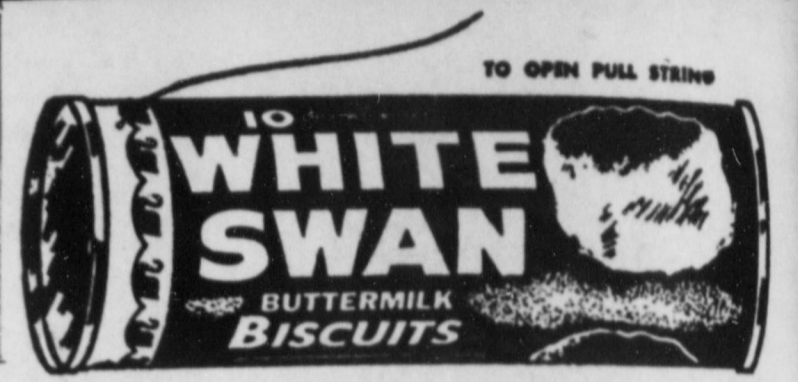
