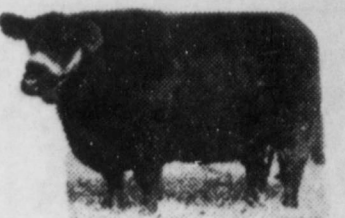

Field of Grain Sorghum



John Mayer, of the Kent Co. ASCS office, is shown inspecting grain sorghum in the W. E. Walker farm west of Jayton.

This is an important crop in Kent County. There is a feed grain base acres of 22879 acres in Kent County. A feed grain program will be in effect for the 1970 crop as authorized by the Agricultural Act of 1965. Cooperating producers may plant up to 80% of the base and earn a price support payment (the difference between the

current loan rate and the rate that was in effect when the program began) on an acreage equal to 50% of the feed grain base. He must agree to divert to conserving use an acreage equal to 20% of the base. An additional 30% of the feed grain base could be diverted for a payment of \$7.42 (Per acre average). Farmers in Kent County earned approximately 175,000 in 1969 under this program. These payments were made through the Local ASCS Office.

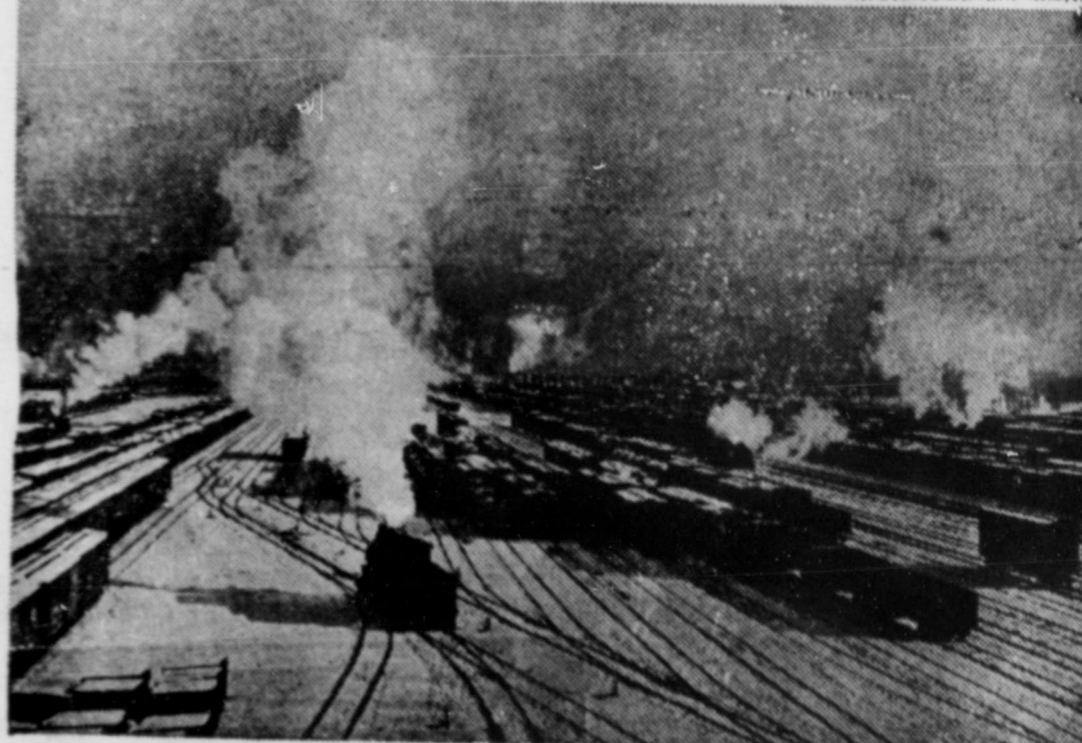

Recipe of the Week

HAM SKEWBODS
Whether you gather round the picnic basket, the outdoor grill or have an informal snack on the back porch, be sure to keep the menu simple and easy on the cook.

- 1 1/2 lb. can ham
1 No. 2 can syrup pack sweet potatoes
1 16-oz. can pineapple chunks
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/4 teaspoon brown sugar firmly packed
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard

Cut ham in chunks. Put a piece of ham, piece of pineapple, and piece of potato on a skewer. Repeat until skew is filled. Melt butter, stir in sugar and mustard. Brush sauce on skewered foods. Cook in broiler or on an outdoor grill, until lightly browned. Turn occasionally while cooking.

"Guilty" Mother

Any man whose wife commits adultery has grounds for getting a divorce. Is he also entitled to custody of their children? Not always. Most courts will look not only at the specific fact of adultery but also at the general family picture. Above all, they will consider what is best for the children.

Thus, in one custody dispute, the evidence showed that the wife had indeed been guilty of adultery. But it also showed that she had always been devoted to the children, took



excellent care of them, and saw to it that they did well in school. Giving her custody of the children, the court commented: "Although she may have been a bad wife, she (has also been) a good mother." Furthermore, special needs of the children may strengthen the mother's side of the case, despite her adultery. For example: One mother won custody because the child was only two years old ("because of the tender age of the child, the law favors the mother"). Another mother won custody because the children were female ("the welfare of little girls ordinarily lies with their mother, and they should not be taken from her for any except the most cogent reasons"). And another mother won custody because the child was ailing ("the child will continue to receive proper care and attention"). Nevertheless, even though adultery is not the only factor in deciding custody, it still weighs heavily indeed in the scales of justice. Again, the reason lies in seeking what is best for the children. As one judge said, in giving custody of a child to a wronged father: "Courts usually award custody to the innocent party not as punishment (to one parent) or reward (to the other), but upon the assumption that the child will be reared in more wholesome moral surroundings."

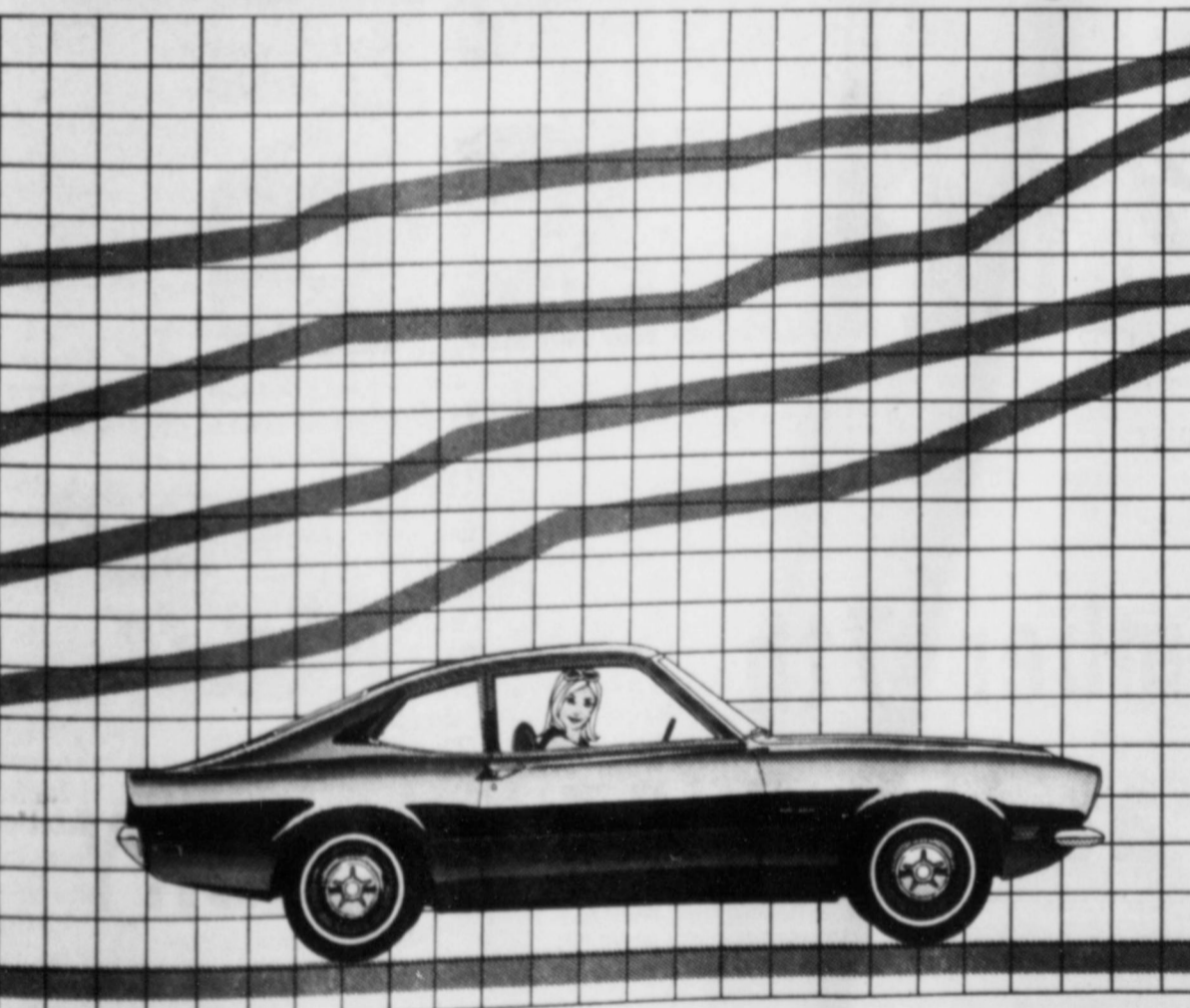

Notes About Care In Our Veterans Hospital

Care in Veterans administration hospitals may be extended to veterans of all wars and to peacetime veterans under certain conditions.

Priority on admission to hospitals goes first to veterans who require treatment for conditions that are not service connected.

A veteran without a service-connected disability may be admitted provided he served in any war or after June 27, 1950, or received the Medal of Honor during peacetime service.

The Veterans Administration pointed out that admission of these patients is contingent upon these considerations: (1) hospitalization must be necessary, (2) the patient must state in writing that he is unable to defray the cost of the necessary hospitalization elsewhere, and (3) an appropriate hospital bed must be available.

Outpatient care for non-service-connected conditions is not permitted by law, but certain prehospital and post-hospital medical services can be performed for patients who are scheduled for admission to a VA hospital or for those who require followup care after hospitalization. The intent of this law is to shorten periods of actual hospitalization while providing the same medical care.

Patients who have received maximum hospital benefit yet require nursing care may be furnished this care in either a VA facility or a private nursing home.

Veterans disabled by age or disease who do not need hospitalization or skilled nursing care may be admitted to VA domiciliarys on an ambulatory, self-care basis.

is under approximately the same rules for hospitalization. Application may be made by the veteran or in behalf of the veteran at any VA office. The office in Lubbock is located at 1621-20 Nineteenth Street. Information may also be obtained by writing the VA Regional Office, 1400 North Valley Mills Drive, Waco, Texas 76710.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that motor vehicle inspections in Texas are running almost 30% behind the inspection rate at this time last year.

"Unless the inspection rate increases, there are going to be some awfully long lines at inspection stations prior to the April 15 deadline," Speir said.

During the year which ended August 31, some 6.3 million vehicles were inspected in Texas. Since September 1, only 538,000 have received the required inspection.

The State Motor Vehicle Inspection Act was amended by the Legislature to provide that inspection stickers issued after September 1, will expire 12 months from the date of issue. However, the law requires that all motor vehicles display a new sticker before April 15, 1970.

Speir noted that the new stickers are being placed on the driver's side of the windshield and contain a number tab showing the month of expiration. The old stickers are on the passenger or right-hand side and have no number tab.
