THE SITUATION IN EUROPE

The Germans have thrown their best troops against the center of the allied armies, where the English are holding the lines, and the fighting has been continuous and terrific. The English have fallen back from time to time, forcing the Germans to fight at a disadvantage. As a result the German casualties have been estimated at from three to six times that of the English.

As the crack regiments of the Germans are thus being sacrificed, a victory won by the German tactics will be at fearful cost. The right wing of the French army is doubling up the German left slowly, and the right wing of the German army is being exposed to a flank and rear attack through Belgium.

The Russians are making progress in the East against the Austrians and Germans. The Kaiser has gone to Prussia to stimulate his army. He claims the capture of 70,000 Russians, Thursday, but this claim has not been verified. The Russians

claim they are carrying out their advance movement according to plans.

The French are giving out more details, but the censor of reports of the movements of the English keeps us in the dark as to what they are doing. We surmise they are preparing to strike the Germans in the rear through Belgium. The losses of all armies may total near the million mark by this time.

The Russians have captured Lemburg, one of the Austrian capitals. The Austrian army cooperating with the Germans in Prussia are cut off from communication with their main army. Losses have been appalling on both sides. The Russians have admitted that two army corps have been destroyed by the Germans, and three generals have been slain.

The Germans have pushed the allies back and their advance forces are within 50 miles of Paris.

The Russians buried 14,000 Austrians after the capture of Limburg.

HASKELL'S PUBLIC SCHOOLS

WILL OPEN MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 14TH. SPLENDID CORPS OF TEACHERS

The work in the public schools of Haskell will begin on the 14th of September. All pupils in and above the fourth grade who were not in Haskell schools last year will be given a written examination before entering. This is due to the fact that pupils bringing report cards from other schools have, in too many instances, been inaccurately graded. Examinations will be conducted in the North Ward building on Thursday and Friday before the opening of school that such pupils may have an opportunity to verify their report cards which may be brought from other schools.

Transfer of Pupils.

Pupils who secure transfers from other districts will be given credit on their tuition in Haskell to the amount of the money allowed each pupil of school age in Texas for next year. This amount will be seven dollars and fifty cents. Parents of such pupils will be expected to pay the regular tuition for all transfers. Hereafter credit will be given for the amount of the state money and pupils who secure transfers will be asked to pay regular tuition.

GREAT CO-OPERATIVE MEETING HAS CLOSED

FIVE HUNDRED AND THREE PROFESSIONS AT HASKELL

LOCKETT ADAIR IS GREAT, AND A "PLUM GOOD UN" SOME WORDS OF PRAISE

HAS HAD 1000 PROFESSIONS IN LAST THREE MEETINGS

THE POWER OF GOD HAS BEEN MANIFEST IN HASKELL. MEN AND WOMEN WEPT FOR JOY OVER THE RETURN OF THE PRODIGAL CHILD

The Lockett Adair co-operative meeting which has been in progress the past three weeks has passed into history, closing Thursday night of this week. And the memory of it, and the good that has resulted and will result from it will live through the ages. Never has there been such an awakening among church members and conviction among sinners in Haskell. Just think of it, over 500 professions and reclamations! The Devil has been routed and those of his cohorts that have not been converted have been winged and wounded to such an extent that they will be able to do very little of his work in Haskell, for this old town has been revolutionized and in the future it will be known as Haskell, the town that respects and honors God and His cause. We can all join in the familiar passage, "Bless the Lord, Oh my Soul! Bless His Holy Name." Old men, old women, young men, young women, boys and girls have joined that happy throng whose aim and efforts will be to serve the heavenly king.

For three weeks Lockett Adair and his trained personal workers have been waging a war on the Devil, and it has been a battle royal for Satan had a very strong hold on Haskell. Mr. Adair is not only a practical and logical expounder of the gospel, but he is a general. And therein lies his greatest success. We have many preachers of equal ability, but we have never seen one with better methods of conducting a meeting. He has plans systematically arranged, and his generalship cannot be criticised. He seems to know what to do, how to do it and when to do it. He does not deal in personalities but gives sin a black eye every time it bobs up, irrespective of persons or conditions.

Then again, he had with him here, four powerful workers, Mr. and Mrs. Flowers, Mr. J. C. Cason and Mr. Kirby. These faithful workers never ceased to work. Mr. Flowers was a power among the men and boys, and Mrs. Flowers was a power among the women and girls. Mr. Cason is one of the unobtrusive and modest kind, but was always ready to approach someone in his kindly way about their soul's salvation, and it was with telling effect that he presented the claims of Jesus Christ. Then there was Mr. Kirby with his voice, singing the power of God into peoples' hearts. Mr. Kirby is a power. He has wonderful control over a choir, seeming to have no trouble getting people to sing. The big choir of 200 voices made music that the angels in heaven would be glad to listen to. We have heard many singers, and believe we know a little about music ourselves, but Mr. Kirby is equal to any of them. He has a voice that never tires. We cannot refrain

from saying, however, that he had singers to help him who enjoyed the privilege to aid in the song service, and much of the great results of the meeting can be attributed to the music.

Another power in bringing about the great success of this meeting was the unity among the members of the different churches. This spirit of unity started in the pastor's association and was greatly accentuated in the organization of the laymen's meeting several months ago, since which time the one purpose and prayer of these men has been the redemption of Haskell.

Sunday and Monday nights were the climaxing times of the meeting. We wish that we had the pen of a Prentiss, that we might be able to describe the scene. We have been attending old fashioned camp meetings, protracted meetings, and other kinds of religious meetings all of our life, but we have never witnessed such scenes as were seen on those two nights. We have heard more shouting, but never saw a more deeply seated feeling as was depicted in the faces of the people as the hardened sinners, some of whom were so grounded in sin as to be seemingly immovable, came forth and gave their hands in expression of a Savior's pardoning love. It was a glorious time, and we think that the angels in heaven, yea, even Christ himself, wept with joy over the return of the prodigals and the happiness of the faithful workers who had been the means of their return. On Sunday night 87 souls were brought into the kingdom, and the people marveled at the gracious outpouring of God's love. But on Monday night they were even more astounded when 89 more souls were redeemed.

Thursday night when the meeting closed, it was announced that 503 had been converted and reclaimed during the meeting. Truly the Lord lives in Haskell. Let Him continue to reign.

Mr. Adair and his workers left this week for Electra, where they again take up their work, and it is hoped that the same kind of deal may be given the devil there as was given him at Haskell.

The Free Press publishes this week the names of those who were converted and reclaimed here that the people may see who they were. We will say that some names may be printed wrong and some may be left out entirely, as it was almost impossible to get the names correctly and some not at all, on account of the confusion when so many were at the altar, and such a crowd of friends surrounding them, eager to give them a glad hand.

Put your shoulder to the wheel and let's make Haskell's influence as a christian city, as a business city and as a progressive city be felt all over the land.

Haskell county crops are the talk of everybody who comes here. It only further demonstrates what this county can do when the dew drops fall.

Haskell county should have an exhibit of her products at the Dallas Fair and the Waco Cotton Palace this year. We can show products that will compare favorably with any in the state.

Like a good man, you can't keep a good country down all the time. West Texas is coming into her own, and the world will again sit up and take notice that this section is the garden spot of Texas.

Now that the big revival is over let's put as much co-operation in the civic upbuilding of our town. No town can amount to much without civic righteousness, neither can it make much progress without a co-operative pull for civic improvements.

Lockett Adair Criticized.

No thinking man or woman can attend such a meeting as we had for the past three weeks without observing the cultural effect on the people. There is no club for men or women that will elevate and polish human beings like the influence the christian religion is now exerting in this community. In the church work, all men and women are on the same level. Here we see pure democracy. Class lines are wiped out. Men and women stand on their merits as christian men and women. The line of wealth and class are no more. For once human pomp and vanity disappeared from the scene. The wicked flee, and the vain cease the vulgar display of their vanity. Vain women and wicked men meet at a common altar, repenting and making public confessions of their evil life. The most stubborn natures have crumbled under the weight of false philosophy, and yielded to the higher christian influences. Miracles have been wrought. We find the different churches laying down differences and working for the Master, making a common cause. Men have gone and gotten men out of bed, taken them to meeting, have seen strong men melted down as a little child. Bro. Adair, with his broad understanding of men and women and their temptations, has been able to explode false conceptions of life, and expose the vortaries thereto in a way that melted the hearts of the most stubborn. He has followed the system of Christ in his preaching. That is, he has hit the evil ways of this people. In the words of Sam Jones, he has looked after the "dirty now and now." He has left his mark on the social fabric of this community. No strata of society has escaped the awakening influence. Haskell will be a better, safer place to live. Men and women will cease to nag and find fault. Vanity is cowed, at least for a time, and society has a higher aim. Under the reproof of the prophets Israel became a great people; under her philosophers pagan Greece became an empire, and when the prophets were stoned, Israel was taken into captivity,

and when Greece banished or caused her philosophers to drink the fatal cup, her empire perished. Let Haskell profit by the lessons of history, and let it become a center of cultured christians.

New York Aug. 26.—The Independent will print in its forthcoming issue the following cabled message from Count Okuma premier of Japan:

"I gladly seize the opportunity to send through the Independent a message to the people of the United States, who have always been helpful and loyal friends of Japan.

"It is my desire to convince your people of the sincerity of my Government and my people in their utterances and assurances connected with the present regrettable situation in Europe and the Far East.

"Every sense of loyalty and honor obliges Japan to co-operate with Great Britain to clear from these waters the enemies who in the past, the present and the future menace her interests her trade, her shipping and her people's lives.

"This Far Eastern situation is not of our seeking. It was ever my desire to maintain peace, as will be amply proved.

"I have read with admiration

the lofty message of President Wilson to his people on the subject of neutrality.

"We of Japan are appreciative of the spirit and motives that inspired the head of your great Nation and we feel confident his message will be meet with a national response.

"As Premier of Japan I have stated and now again to the people of America and of the world that Japan has no ulterior motive no desire to secure more territory no thought of depriving China or no other people of anything they now possess.

"My Government and my people have given their word and their pledge which will be as honorably kept as Japan always keeps promises."

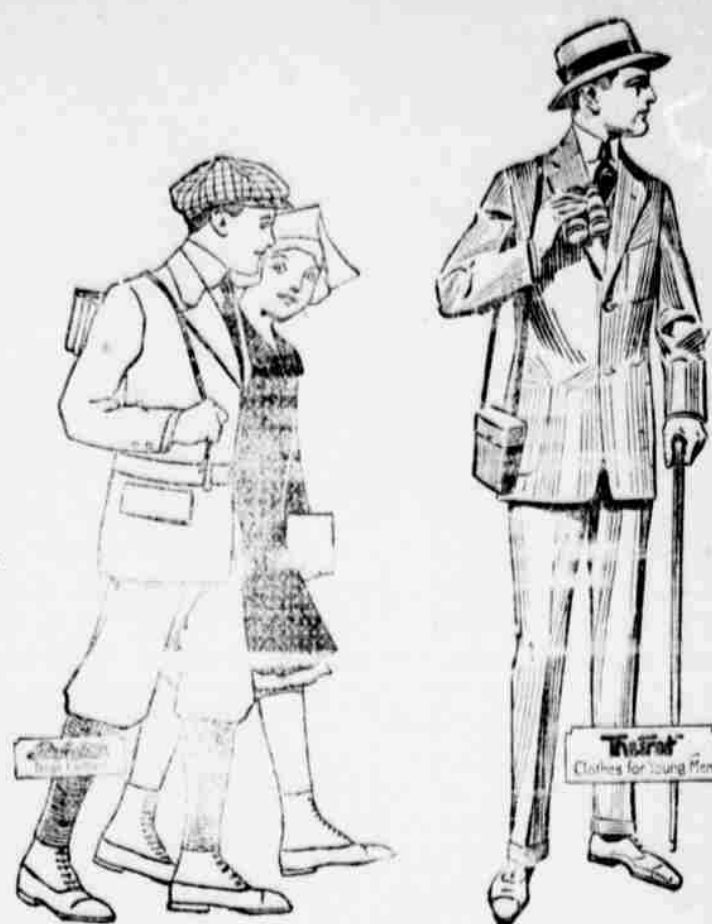

Dr. J. G. Simmons Gone

Last Monday at noon, Dr. John Garrett Simmons passed away at his home in this city, after a long illness. The deceased was born in North Carolina, Aug. 27th 1828, and died Aug. 31st, A. D. 1914. He was educated for the ministry, and early in life joined the Methodist church. He afterwards joined the Universalist church, and died in this faith. For many years he was a successful practicing physician. He moved here with his family in 1891 from Arkansas and has lived here ever since. He was a most remarkable man. He managed his own affairs up to a few months ago. He was a man who placed the greatest value on his word, and expected others to keep their word to him. He was of strong personality, deeply grounded in the doctrines of his religion, and the doctrines of the democracy, as taught by the founders of our government. He spent his active career in the state of Arkansas. He served in the lower house of the legislature of that state in 1879, and in 1887 was elected to senate. He used the best English, which he spoke with precision, choosing his words with care and discrimination. In debate he was logical and invincible. He possessed a wonderful knowledge and his memory never failed him, and he was remarkable for deep convictions on all subjects he studied, and was always outspoken, frank and fearless. In the years he spent here, he won the respect and good will of his neighbors. He leaves surviving him his faithful wife, two grown sons, Grover and Jake Simmons and two daughters, Mrs. W. H. Pearsey, and Mrs. R. E. Martin, all of whom reside here except Mrs. Martin, who resides in Fort Worth.

While regretting his death, and feeling the deepest sympathy for his bereaved family, we realized he has filled his mission here, and lived out his allotted span, believing he has reached the end safely and is enjoying the joyous immortality for which he longed and hoped.

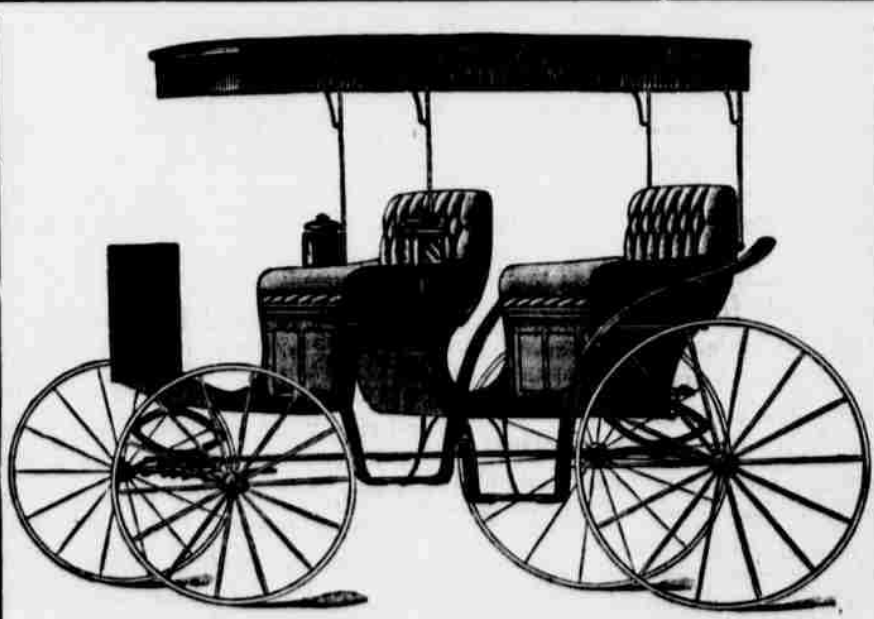

GREAT LIVESTOCK DISPLAY ASSURED

Big Preparations Being Made 1914 State Fair of Texas.

RICHEST OF PREMIUMS.

Management Declares That no Farm Industry in the Southwest Warrants More Encouragement.

Dallas—One of the big features of the 1914 State Fair of Texas, Saturday, October 17, to Sunday, November 1, is to be the livestock display. Never has there been such promise of unusual success. Firm in the belief that there is no other farm industry in the Southwest than the ranch more encouragement than the breeding and raising of livestock, the management of the State Fair has arranged for a distribution of more than \$10,000 in prizes in this division. Splendid showings of beef and dairy cattle, swine, sheep, goats, horses—saddle and combination animals, roadsters, coach and draft—jacks, jennets and mules are auspiciously promising.

Specials are offered this year by the Texas Saddle Horse Breeders' association, the American Saddle Horse Breeders' association and the Percheron Society of America in the horse division. The American Hereford Breeders' association contributes more than \$1000 in cash specials in the beef class. The American Jersey Cattle club contributes more than \$300 for Jerseys. In the swine division specials are contributed by the American Berkshire association, the American Hampshire Swine Record association, the American Tamworth Swine Record association, the National Duroc Jersey Swine Breeders' association, the Standard Poland-China Record association, the Chester White Record association and the Armstrong Packing company of Dallas.

All saddle horses and roadsters will be judged in front of the race track grand stand instead of in the livestock pavilion, as in previous years.

Young men of Texas, under twenty-five years of age, will judge cattle, swine and horses at the 1914 State Fair of Texas, Dallas, for a purse of \$100. The money is equally divided in each class.

DAIRY TEST AT FAIR.

Crusade inaugurated by Fair Management Producing Good Results.

Dallas—No state in the Union is as rich in Jerseys as Texas, and since the State Fair of Texas began the annual competitive dairy test in 1912, the Jersey has demonstrated to the men and women of this state how important she is in converting the products of the farm into health-giving human foods. That this crusade on the part of the Fair management has resulted in more efficient dairying is now recognized by all. Held in a dairy demonstration building, a splendid permanent exhibit of modern completeness, the Jerseys entered in the contest fed a certain amount of food each day have demonstrated their ability to produce butter fat. As exhibitors have been permitted to select their own feed, the demonstration has also resulted in proving the kind of feed that produces the best sort of results.

At the 1914 Fair, which begins Saturday, October 17, twenty-eight animals will take part. Complete records of the test will be posted daily for the inspection of visitors in attendance at the Fair.

The American Jersey Cattle Club gives \$185 for prizes in this contest, which is added to the regular State Fair premiums.

RACING AT STATE FAIR.

Every Great Stable in America Represented in the Entries.

Dallas—This city is to have the most brilliant turf program in history this fall at the 1914 State Fair of Texas which begins Saturday, October 17, and continues sixteen days. The ten harness stake events, closing July 1, for purses and stakes valued at \$24,500, attracted 350 entries and every race filled. It is the greatest record in the annals of the local track, and nearly 100 more entries than recorded for similar events in 1913.

Every great turf center in the United States and Canada is represented. The greatest horses in America will participate in the trotting and harness events. Among the famous stables represented are those of Ed Geers of Memphis, Tenn.; T. W. Murphy of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., the biggest money winner of last year; W. O. Foote of Bonham, Texas. In fact there will be more grand circuit horses in Dallas this fall than ever before in the annals of the local track.

The State Fair management offers this year \$50,000 in purses and stakes. Each day there will be some big stake event in the harness classes, as well as interesting contests for runners.

Racing begins Tuesday, October 20, and closes Friday, October 29, ten days in all.

ARTISTRY IN EXHIBITS.

Symmetry in Arrangement of Exhibits Will Favorably Impress Visitors.

Dallas—Declaring an artistic display of grains and grasses the mirror which reflects the prosperity of a community, Secretary W. H. Stratton of the State Fair of Texas has inaugurated a movement for feature displays of farm, orchard and garden products at the coming meeting which opens Saturday, October 17, and continues sixteen days. In his letters to agricultural exhibitors Secretary Stratton declares agricultural products should be massed together in a perfect, uniform, symmetrical display of symmetry and attractiveness in order to impress visitors with the fertility and agricultural possibilities of the section represented.

Prospects are for a big increased exhibition of the agricultural products from every section of the state, Secretary Stratton reporting the demand for county exhibit booths this early assuring an increase in number. "Our small grain displays promise to be the greatest in quality and in magnitude in the history of the Fair," said Secretary Stratton. "South Texas counties with exhibits of rice, ribbon cane, sugar citrus fruits, etc., will be more largely represented than ever before."

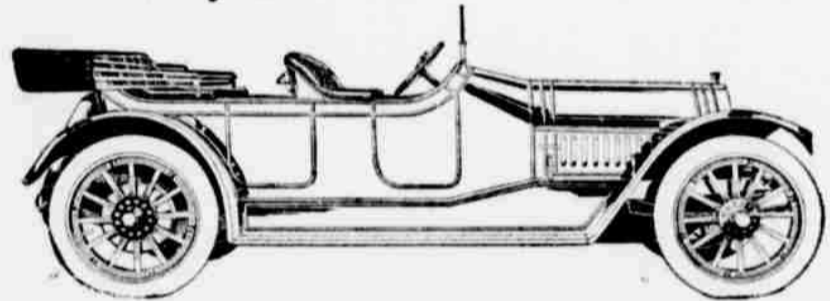

The results are unquestionably the work of a large number of lay members doing earnest personal work with their friends, pleading with them to give their hearts to God.

A laymen's Council of from 25 to 60 laymen from all denominations meeting each Sunday for personal training and work well organized and running for several months before there was any arrangements for a meeting probably contributed in its way.

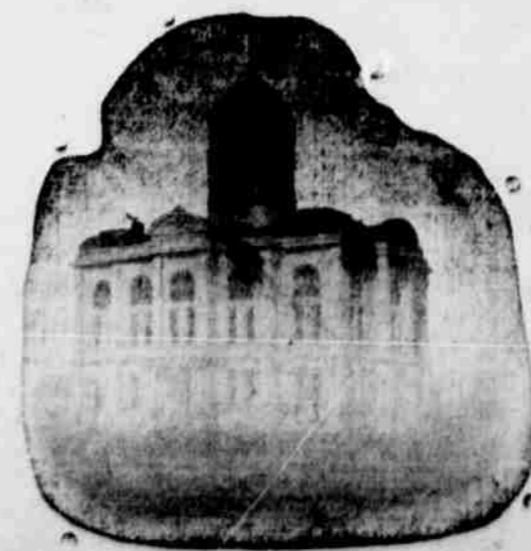

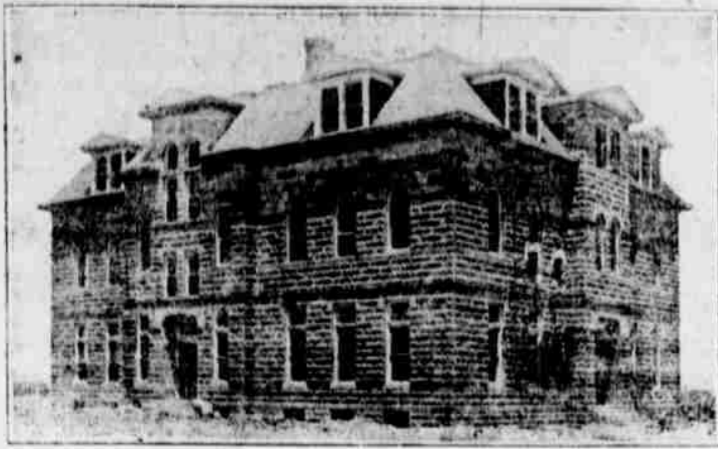

of the various churches conceived the idea of an organization like a band of real brothers and from that beginning the movement became strong and the plans and purposes of this revival developed and when our faithful pastors stood by us and fully endorsed the work we were ready to enter into the real spirit of a real revival and the great number of conversions and the number that have returned to the fold of Christ is the great climax of it all. Brother Adair, Brother and Sister Flowers, and Brother Kirby were as faithful workers as I ever met and the deep consecration and the great personal magnetism was certainly a great factor in the great work. I have seen many workers but none more consecrated and in earnest in the Lords work and winning of souls. The song leadership by Bro Kirby was excellent and many compliments on the work done by his faithful choir. The meetings would frequently last until a late hour, but people seemed not to notice the hour, but the service was the theme.

Now a word about the conversions. There were some of the strongest sinners in the entire country converted, and the most beautiful part of it all was to see these strong men when they were saved, go out after their friends, and see them led to Christ, which was done many times during the meetings; they seemed on fire with the spirit after they had found their Saviour and would not rest until they brought their friends.
