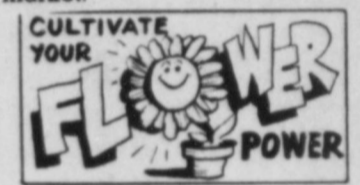

House plants that can do double duty indoors and out include such foliage plants as potted ferns, philodendron, many types of ivy, and such popular flowering plants as azaleas, geraniums, begonias and fuschias.



Your plants will be better off in porous clay pots than in other containers, because the red clay pots automatically safeguard the plants against overwatering, the commonest cause of most house plant failures. The tiny pores in the clay pots permit excess moisture and harmful salts to leech out so roots don't become waterlogged. Also, the porosity supplies necessary cooling and air-conditioning to roots.

It's wise to select your plants from nearly professional growers who can advise you on what plants will do best in this area.

And if you want a reputation for a green thumb that will make others green with envy, ask what kinds of light and temperatures individual plants like best. In general, flowering plants like the sun and foliage (green) plants prefer shade.

In 1915, over 10,000 persons died in the U. S. of the disease, pellagra, the classical niacin deficiency disease. During the early 1900's, pellagra was a leading cause of insanity and death in the U. S.

The symptoms of pellagra, which means "rough skin", are varied. It has been described as the "disease of the four D's" -- dermatitis, dementia, diarrhea and death. It affects the skin, nervous system, gastrointestinal tract, and may eventually cause death. The mouth is sore and red and the tongue is red and swollen and often has many ulcers. Early symptoms also characteristic of several other conditions, include insomnia, forgetfulness, irritability and even paranoia. In late stages it is characterized by well-defined psychosis.

Pellagra is the niacin deficiency disease. Without niacin, one of the B Vitamins, carbohydrates, fats, and proteins could not be used by the body. It is essential for functioning of the stomach and intestines; for growth; for health of skin, mouth, and tongue; and for functioning of the nervous system.

Foods especially high in niacin are liver, lean meat, poultry, yeast, fish, peanuts, beef heart, and whole wheat

or enriched cereals and breads.

HUNTERS STEW

- 1/2 lb salt pork, cubed
- 1/2 lb salami, sliced and cut in 1/2" strips
- 3 lbs. sirloin tips, cubed
- 2 green onions, sliced
- 2 whole cloves
- 4 sprigs parsley or 1/2 tsp. flakes
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 3 beef bouillon cubes
- 3 cups hot water
- 1 cup cooking wine
- 2-10 oz. pkg. frozen Brussels sprouts
- 1/4 cup flour
- 3/4 cup water

Brown pork and salami in Dutch oven, remove from pan. Brown beef in hot drippings. Return pork and salami to pan. Stir in carrots, onions, parsley, seasonings, bouillon cubes, hot water and wine. Cover and simmer for 45 minutes or until meat and vegetables are tender. Add Brussels sprouts. Cover and cook for 10-12 minutes. Blend flour and 3/4 cup water; stir into stew. Stir over medium heat, until slightly thickened. Yield: 6-8 servings.

sound. If you have a bike rack on the car, be sure it's securely fastened. Keep a tarpaulin or heavy plastic cover-all handy for sudden storms and general protection.

6. If you pull a trailer, have its lighting system checked.

7. Carry any extra gas in an approved safety can.

8. Carry an adequate jack, emergency flares or reflectors, a first aid kit and an umbrella.

9. Pack your luggage tightly enough to keep it from shifting if you have to stop suddenly.

10. Make sure you can see the road, not just your luggage, in your rear-view mirror, as well as in side-view mirror.

11. Carry a plastic jar of filtered water (better yet, two).

12. Drive defensively.

OPAL'S SURPRISE SALAD

Boil together 1/2 of a No. 2 cup of crushed pineapple and 1 cup of sugar. Add this while hot to 1 package of raspberry gelatin which has been dissolved in 1 cup cold water. Let cool. Add 1 cup grated cheese (block cheese is best as it dissolves more easily) and 1 cup chopped pecans. Place in refrigerator. When almost congealed fold in 1 cup whipped cream (measure before whipping) (may use 2 cups Whipped Topping cream.) It is ready to serve when congealed. May be set in a mold or in individual cups.

Dr. Williams pointed out that 75% of the recovery of a retarded patient depends on what happens outside the hospital and the help he gets from family and friends. The Vernon Center, reported Dr. Williams, provides comprehensive in-patient and out-patient care for a small district of 14 counties. Its services include general psychiatric treatment, alcoholic and drug addiction ward, and vocational training for the retarded. Out-

patient care provided follow-up and preventive care.

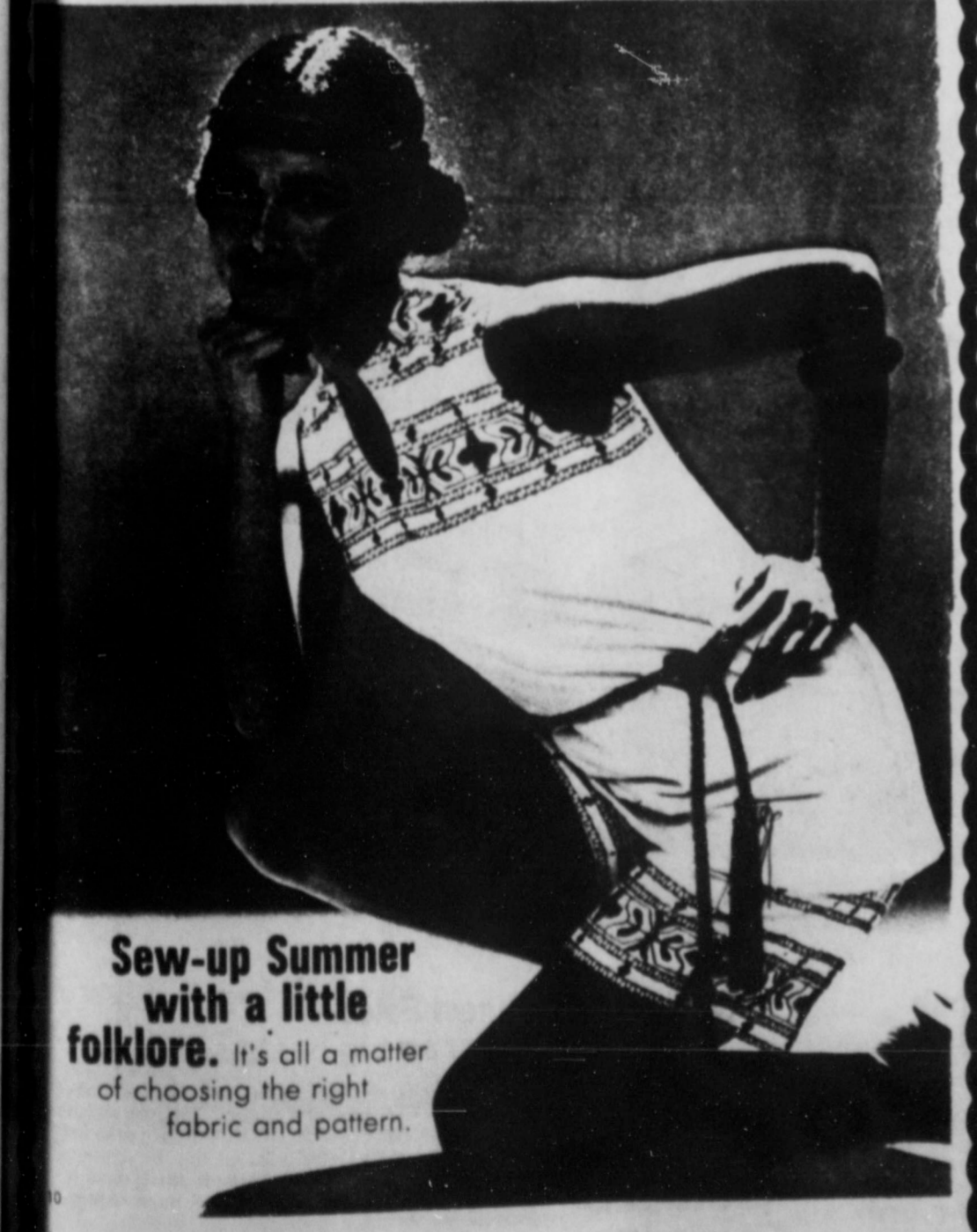
Mrs. Howard Cobb, THDA State Treasurer, reminded those present that "kindness is contagious like a disease, so be a carrier".

Animal In The Road

Driving through a suburban neighborhood, a motorist noticed a dog in the road ahead, gazing intently at something in the distance. Assuming that the dog would get out of his way, the motorist kept right on going. Unfortunately, the dog failed to move until the last moment, too late to escape sudden death under the car's wheels. Could the motorist be held legally liable for killing the dog? A court ruled that he could indeed. Pointing out that the motorist had enough time and enough space to swerve, with no danger

to himself, the court said he had no right so heedlessly to snuff out the dog's life.



As a rule, a motorist must show a decent concern for dogs and other animals in our streets and highways. This does not mean, however, that he must take precautions that would inhibit normal driving practice. Consider this case:

In short order, the farmer sued the motorist for damages. He argued that, since the turkeys were in plain sight, the motorist should have slowed down—just in case. But the judge held the motorist not liable, saying: "I do not believe the law imposed upon him the duty of slowing down so he could immediately stop, just because one of these turkeys might take a notion to cross the road at an inauspicious moment. Highways are not built for animals or fowls to stray in." Of course, the motorist is even less to blame if the accident was simply not within the range of foreseeability. Another man was making a wide turn to enter his driveway one night when a neighbor's dog dashed unseen out of the darkness. The dog suffered fatal injuries, and his owner duly demanded damages on the theory that the car was on the wrong side of the street when the accident occurred.

But a court denied the claim, because the location of the car was not the real cause of the dog's death. The court said it was unfair to blame the motorist for an accident he could not have either foreseen or avoided.
