





We got off the street before the drains clogged, the water backed up and spread. As usual, when any thing goes wrong with anything in this city, it winds up with a traffic jam. And they are much nier to read about than to be



the motorist for damages. He argoed that, since the turkeys were in plain sight, the motorist should have slowed down-just in case. But the judge held the motorist not liable, saying:

"I do not believe the law imposed upon him the duty of slowng down so he could immediately stop, just because one of these turkeys might take a notion to cross the road at an injudicious moment. Highways are not built for animals or fowls to stray in." Of course, the motorist is even

less to blame if the accident was simply not within the range of forespeability. Another man was making a wide turn to enter his driveway one night when a neighbor's dog dushed unseen out of the darkness. The dog suffered fatal injuries, and his owner duly demanded durages on the theory that the cur was on the wrong side of the street when the accident occurred.

But a court denied the claim, because the location of the car was not the real cause of the dog's death. The court said it was unfair to blume the motorist for an accident he could not have either foreseen or avoided.
