

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highways in Kent County during the month of October, according to Sergant Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in three persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,300,00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1970 shows a total of nine accidents resulting in one person killed, 13 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$9, 565,00.

Traffic wise, November and December are noted as dangerous months for pedestrians. During November and December of 1969 in Texas, there were 36 pedestrians killed and 885 injured in collisions with motor vehicles. Some of the attributing factors are: early hours of darkness, bad weather, drinking intoxicating beverages, holidays, and lack of drivers' and pedestrians' attention.

- package (8-oz.) cream cheese
- cup confectioner's sugar package (6-oz.) semi-sweet chocolate bits

teaspoon vanilla Beat cream cheese until soft and fluffy. Gradually add sugar; beat well. Melt chocolate and butter together in top of double-boiler. Add to cheese mixture, with vanilla; mix well. - package (5-oz.) Jiffy Pop Popcorn
- 1 cup sugar 1/2 cup light corn syrup
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 tablespoons butter cup marshmallow topping
- ¼ cup chocolate syrup

Pop corn according to package directions; set aside. Combine sugar, corn syrup and water in a saucepan. Heat, stirring constantly until sugar dissolves. Boil gently without stirring until candy thermometer registers 240°. Remove from heat; add vanilla, butter and marshmallow topping. Return to heat and mix until ingredients are thoroughly combined. Pour popcorn into a large shallow pan; pour marshmallow mixture over popoorn; mix well. With greased hands press popoorn firmly around chocolate log, leaving ends uncovered. Chill at least 1 hour. Just before serving decorate with chocolate syrup and cherries. Cut in slices. Serves 10.

can be quite destructive. Mice can contaminate your food and get into blankets and stored clothes to breed and they nultiply quickly.

Right now, while the thermometer outside is sinking and Felix is snoozing by the fire, fieldmice are looking for ways to invade your house in search of warmth and food. They probably won't have much of a problem either, because they can sneak in through some pretty tiny

Mice are difficult to control, for a number of reasons: they can get into houses easily; they can live in small, inaccessible places so that you seldom see them; and they are difficult to poison because they don't eat

How can you rid your home of mice before they have a chance to cause damage to your health and furnishings?

You can forget mousetraps, because they're cruel and ineffective. Research scientists have developed chemicals that assure a safer, surer, painless for these household pests. One such product that has been highly successful is Mouse-Prufe, a unique bait made by d-Con which mice seem to like. It acts upon the rodent's blood supply, lowering the ability of the blood to coagulate and killing the rodent painlessly.

The secret of controlling mice is not only in knowing what to use, but in knowing how to use it, according to d-Con experts. 



FOPLE IN WARM COUNTRIES

2 cups chopped pecans

3 ozs. undiluted frozen

2 pounds dates 4 cups pecan halves

teaspoon vanilla cup flour

cup sugar 2 teaspoons baking powder l teaspoon salt 4 eggs

Sift dry ingredients together three times, sifting over fruit and nut mixture the last time. Add beaten egg yolks. Fold or work in stiffly beaten egg whites to which vanilla has been added. Let stand for 30 minutes and mix again. Line two 1-pound loaf bread pans with waxed paper. Cut to fit pan and extend 1 inch above top of pan. Grease paper. Pack batter tightly into pans, filling each about one-half full. Cover top of the pans with waxed paper and place pan of water in oven. Bake at 250° F. for 2 hours. Remove waxed paper from top of pans during last 15 minutes of baking...

WHITE FRUIT CAKE

1 cup butter or margarine

3 cups sugar

4 cups flour 1 cup milk

3 teaspoons baking powder 8 egg whites, well beaten

1 medium coconut, grated 1/2 pound candied pineapple

pound citron or drained watermelon rind preserves

pound candied cherries 4 cups pecans

1 cup almonds, blanched

Leave cherries and pecans whole. Chop almonds. Cut candied fruit into inch cubes. Grate fresh coconut. Combine fruits and nuts and sprinkle with flour. Cream butter or margarine; add sugar gradually and beat until well blended and light. Sift flour, measure and combine with baking powder. Add flour and milk alternately to the mixture, beginning and ending with flour. Add fruits and nuts. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites.

Grease two 1-pound bread pans. Line with brown paper cut to fit pans and extend 1 inch above pans. Grease paper. Pack batter firmly into pans with hands. Cover top with waxed paper and place pan of water in oven under cake. Bake at 250° F. for about 2 hours. Remove waxed paper from top of cake during last 15 minutes of baking.

CARE AFTER BAKING AND WRAPPING FOR STORAGE

After the cake is removed from the oven, cool thoroughly in the paper in which it was baked. Then wrap securely in a second layer of heavy waxed paper or moisture-vapor-proof packaging materials such as cellophane, aluminum foil, pliofilm or laminated wrapping paper, and store in a tightly covered container in a cool place. Fruit cakes generally are considered best after 1 to 3 months' storage.

FRUIT CAKES IN THE FREEZER

Well-wrapped fruit cakes can be kept in the freezer for 1 year. When ready to use, remove cake from the freezer and thaw. Do not upwrap while

FROZEN FRUIT CAKE

2 cups milk ½ cup sugar

cup flour

4 teaspoon salt 2 cups crumbled macaroons or cookie crumbs

1/2 cup chopped candied cherries 2 eggs, well beaten

teaspoon vanilla cup white raisins

l cup chopped nuts

1 cup cream whipped

Scald the milk; mix flour, sugar and salt and add to milk. Stir until smooth. Cook over low heat for 10 minutes. Add small amount of mixture to the beaten eggs. Add egg mixture to remaining milk mixture. Continue cooking over low heat until thickened, stirring constantly. Add the vanilla, raisins, nuts, crumbs and cherries. Fold in the whipped cream. Pour into a well oiled 9-inch square pan. Cover with aluminum foil. Place in food freezer or freezing compartment of refrigerator until solidly frozen. Slice or cut in squares. Garnish with whipped cream and candied cherries.

pound shelled pecans (4 cups) can sweetened condensed milk 1 4-ounce package dry coconut

Cut up the fruit, and chop pecans coarsely. Combine with milk and coconut, mixing with your hands. Pack into waxed paper-lined pans. Bake 1 hour for loaf size cake at 300° F. for 1 hour 15 minutes if baked in stem cake pan. Bake about 45 minutes in small molds.

Remove cake from the oven, turn out of pan. Peel off the paper and let cake cool on cake rack. Wrap cakes in aluminum foil and store,

'No Pets Allowed'

When the Scotts rented a new partment, they took it for granted that their dog Rover would be as welcome as they were. But soon after they moved in, the landlord called their attention to the "No Pets Allowed" clause in

Unwilling to give up either the dog or the apartment, the Scotts determined to fight. In a court hearing, they offered this argument to the judge:

"Rover happens to be a quiet, well-behaved animal who never bothers a soul and never does any lamage. Of course, if he should



take full responsibility. But in he meantime, enforcing this nopets rule against us would be arsitrary and unfair."

Nevertheless, the court held hey would have to abide by the le or move out. The judge said landlord may reasonably be concerned not only about noise, and not only about damage, but also about the likelihood that other tenants might want to keep

Generally speaking, the law gives a landlord broad discretion with regard to pets on the premses. In fact, even if no restriions are spelled out in the lear he may still be able to take lega.

Thus, another landlord won an eviction order against an elderly woman who harbored no less than 25 cats in her small apartment. Even though pets were not men-tioned in the lease, the court said 25 cats were—simply as a matter of common sense—"23 cats too

On the other hand, a landlord nay lose his enforcement rights "going easy" on a tenant for substantial period. In one case, landlord tried to evict a tenant after permitting him to keep a parrot for almost four years.

In these circumstances, the andlord was held to have waived the rights he had under the lease. The court said that, even though the lease plainly said "No Pets Allowed," the landlord's inaction poke louder than words.


