Jayton High Standings 'Impressive'

When the controversial Jayton High School was built, it was called a "million dollar school in a 1500 town."

But like many small town schools, Jayton High School has proven to be the backbone of the community. The school has chalked up impressive wins — both scholastically and athletically.

Coach Jerry English's Jayton Jaybirds waltzed to the district 5-B crown this year with an impressive 11-0 win record and then captured the Class B regional title Friday night in Colorado City by beating Grand Falls, 42-14.

Ultra-Modern Equipment Located halfway between Lubbock and Abilene, the Jayton school is complete with a heated swimming pool, carpet throughout and ultra-modern classroom equipment.

Ninety-eight of Jayton's 649 population is enrolled in the high school, which is located away from the main traffic centers.

Facilities include a patio courtyard, stereo or television in the library for high school students and an outstanding elementary library equipped with 8 mm film strips, microfilm, miniature projectors with captioned films for individual children and earphones in the listening and reading lab.

The school is accredited by the Southern Schools Association, unique for a Class B school.

Fourteen teachers comprise the Jayton High School faculty with a total of 39 subjects offered during a seven class day.

Band begins in elementary school and the Jayton organization has topped sweepstakes honors in state competition four out of the last five years.

The Amazing Jaybirds Finish Perfect 12-0 Season With Regional Championship

The Jayton Jaybirds did a little bit of everything and did it well Friday night to beat down the Grandfalls-Royalty Cowboys, 42-14, for a regional Class B championship.

The Jaybirds overpowered the out-manned Cowboys with a 21-point second period explosion and then coasted home with a pair of fourth-period scores.

Running backs Harold Judy and John Charles Davis provided all the ground power the Jaybirds needed and QB Kim Nichols' passing and playcalling made the whole thing look easy.

The Jaybirds, won the toss, took the kickoff and promptly put together a 59-yard, time-consuming scoring drive. Davis did most of the work as Jayton converted two fourth down en route to the ice breaker.

Davis got the TD on a two-yard burst and Nichols booted the PAT for 7-0 lead with 5:43 left in the period.

The Cowboys came back with a pounding attack of their own, moving to the Jaybird 27 before being hit with their first bad break. QB Rudy Sanchez was hit hard, fumbled and tackle Nickey Williams pounced on it.

The Jaybirds returned the favor two plays later, however, when Davis fumbled. Cowboy halfback Jim Ragland recovered at the Jayton 26.

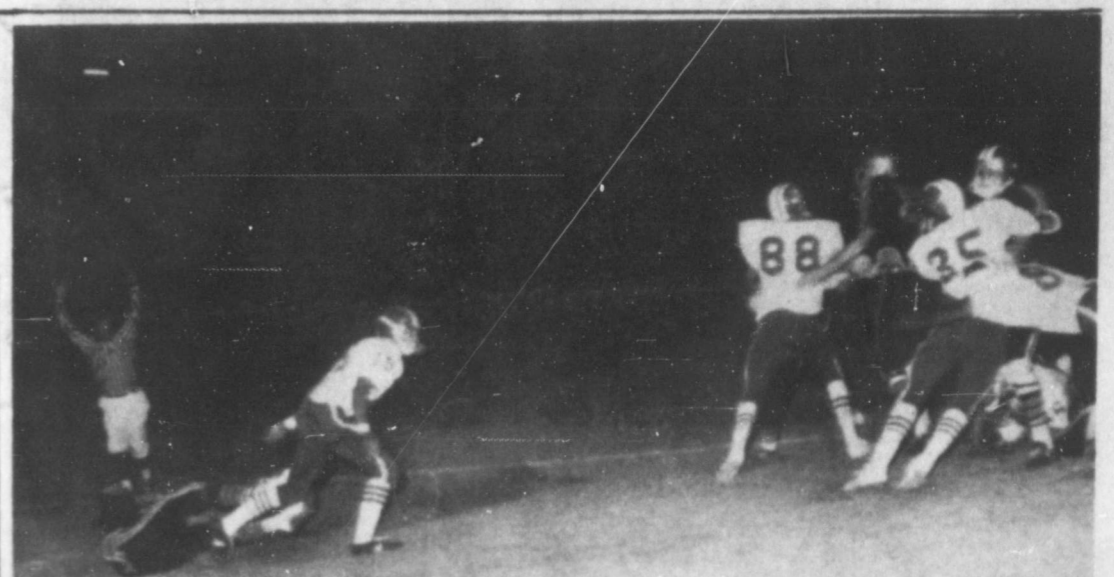
The Cowboys picked up a first down and were at the 13 when disaster struck again. Sanchez and Ragland messed connections on a pitch out and Jayton's Tommy Stanaland flagged it down at the 10.

The Jaybirds couldn't move, but Nichols' 41-yard punt got them out of the hole.

Grandfalls failed on a fourth down gamble at midfield to send the Jaybirds on their trip towards the goal. They got there in eight plays this time with Judy doing the Lion's share. His 20-yard trip to the one set up the score, which he got on the next play. Nichols put up the 14th point with 5:15 left in half.

The Jaybirds' next score came in a hurry. After Ragland's 31-yard boot died at the Jayton 44, Nichols completed three passes in a row for the score. The final shot went to wingback Lyndall Favor for 27 yards. Nichols missed the kick, but Jayton led, 20-0.

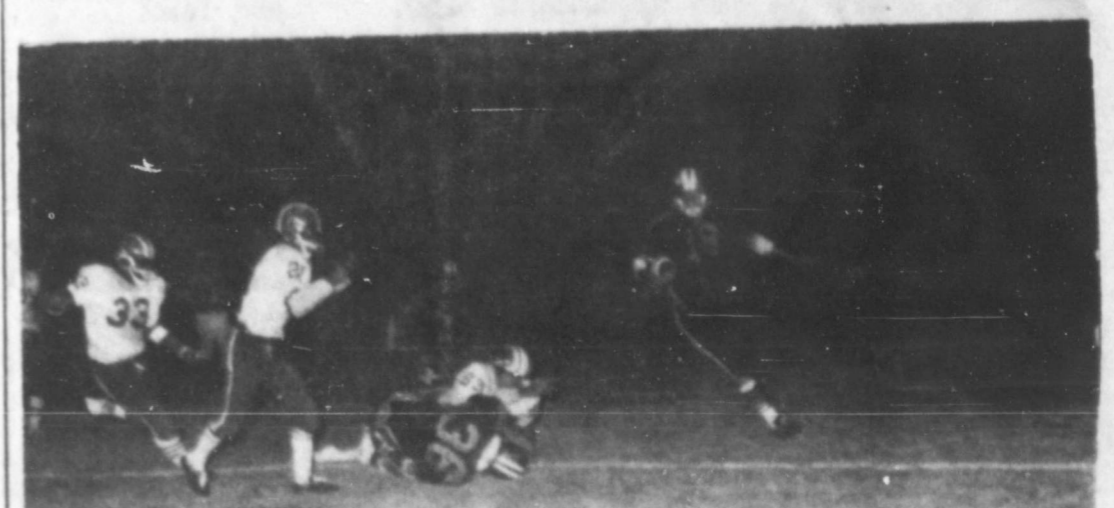

John Charles Davis makes a long run

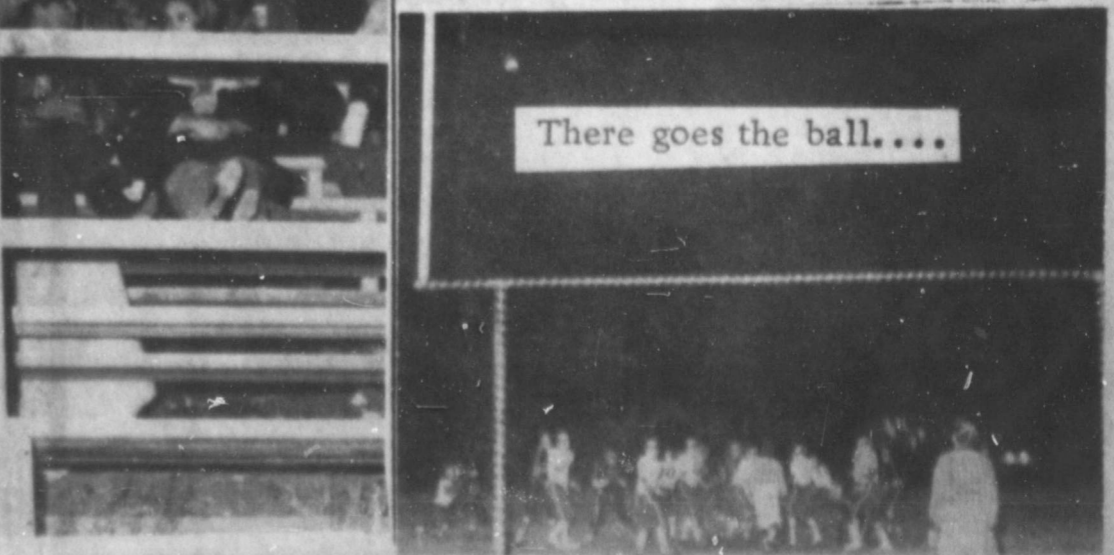

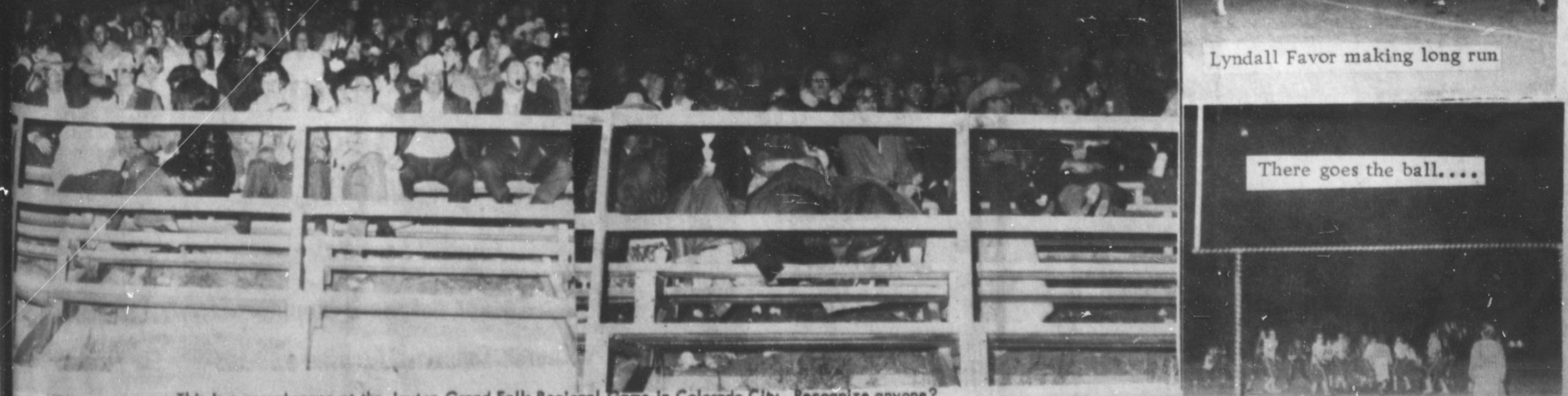

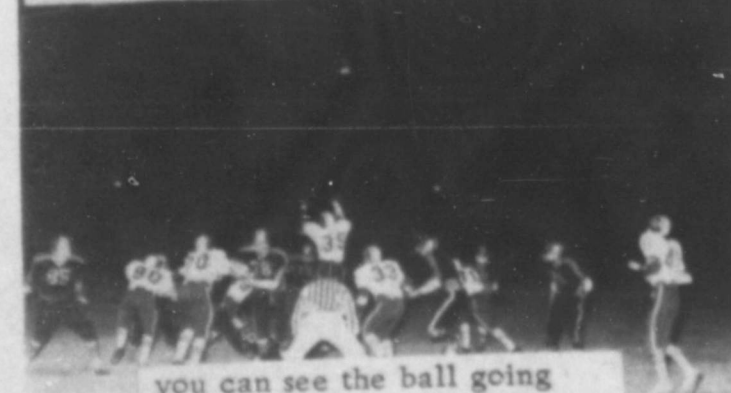

Drum Major Lajuana Hamilton leads the Going Band From Jaybird Land in the halftime Performance.

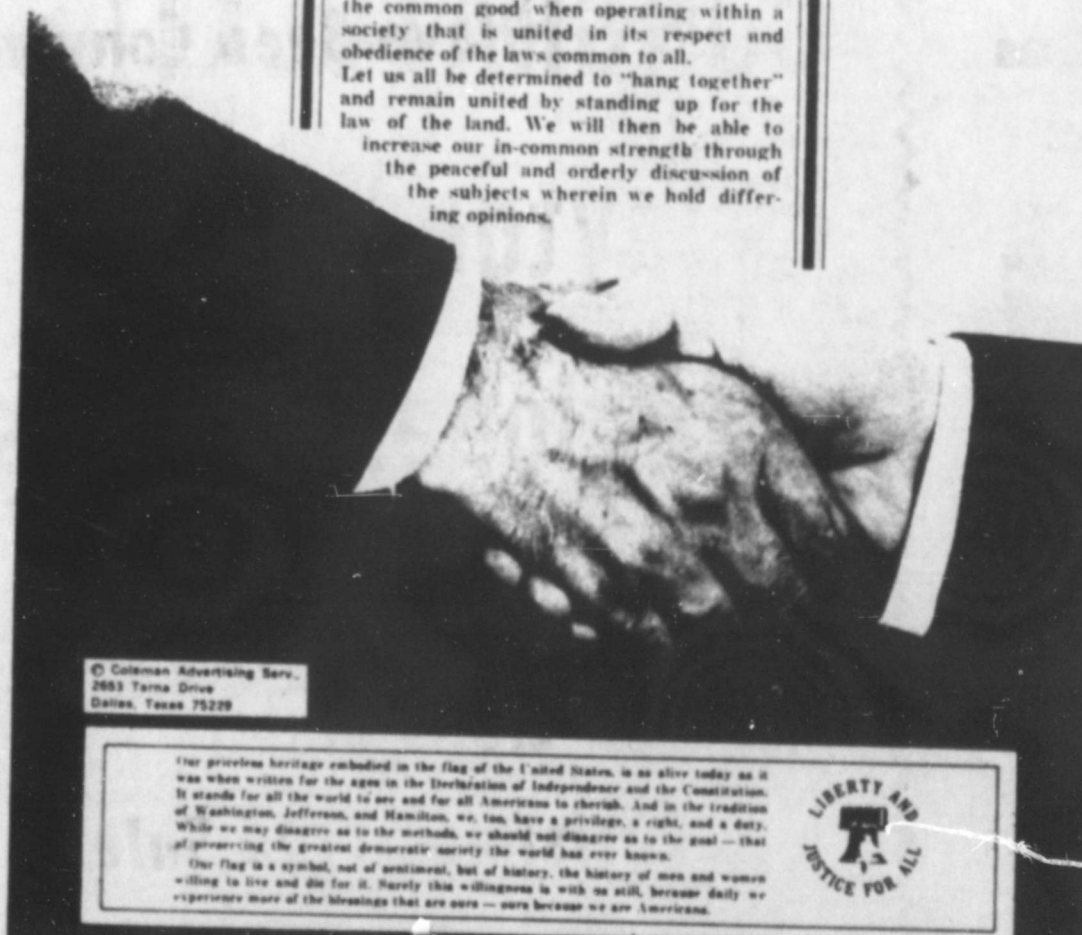

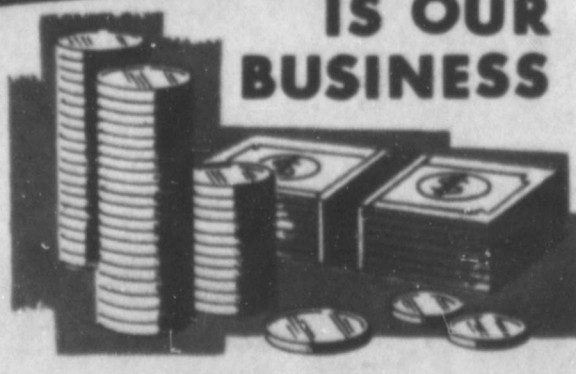

Alfonso Trevino blocked a Ragland punt moments later to give the Jaybirds the ball at the Cowboy four. The Jaybirds fumbled it back on the first play to prevent a score.

They got it anyway seconds later when Judy flagged down a Sanchez aerial at the 22 and took it all the way. Nichols hit again on the PAT kick.

Opal's Favorite Recipes



Christmas Candies

DATE LOAF

- 3 cups sugar
- 1 cup milk
- 1/4 cup white corn syrup
- 1/2 pound pitted dates
- 1 cup chopped nuts

Cook sugar, milk, corn syrup and dates to soft ball stage (235° to 240° F.). Stir as needed to prevent burning. Remove from heat. Cool to 104° F. which is just above lukewarm. Beat until it begins to harden. Add nuts and turn onto a damp cloth. Shape into a roll 2 inches in diameter. Let stand until firm. Cut into slices as needed. This candy may be stored for some time if tightly covered. Yield: 25 to 30 1/4-inch slices.

| 3 cups sugar | 1 cup sugar |
| 3/4 cup water | 1/2 cup water |
| 1 cup corn syrup | 1 teaspoon vanilla |
| 3 egg whites, beaten stiff | 1 cup coarsely chopped nuts |

Cook sugar, water and corn syrup of Mixture One until it forms a fairly hard ball, 250° F., stirring only until sugar dissolves. Remove from heat. Pour slowly with constant beating over egg whites. At this time start Mixture Two, cooking to a very hard ball, 265° F. Pour in first mixture which has been beaten all the while. Continue beating until candy begins to hold its shape. Add vanilla and nuts. Pour into greased pans. Cut into squares when cold.

Candy may be shaped into a loaf or formed into irregular pieces by dropping from tip of spoon on greased paper. Yield: 64 1 1/4-inch squares.

EASY-DO PRALINES

- 1 package butterscotch pudding mix
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 cups pecans

Combine ingredients except pecans and cook slowly until dissolved. Add pecans and boil slowly until candy reaches the soft-ball stage, 235° to 240° F. Remove from heat and beat until mixture thickens. Drop by teaspoonfuls on waxed paper. Yield: 15 4-inch patties.

He has done such a good job of lining up his staff, that there is not much for him to do anymore.

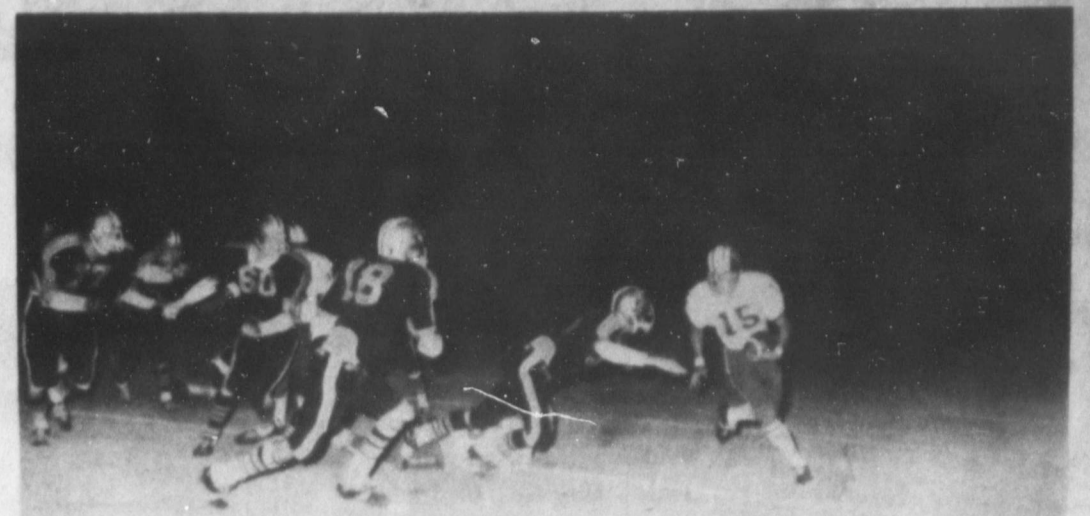

I have never known of a school anywhere with such a fine collection of leaders, and department heads as Jayton now has.

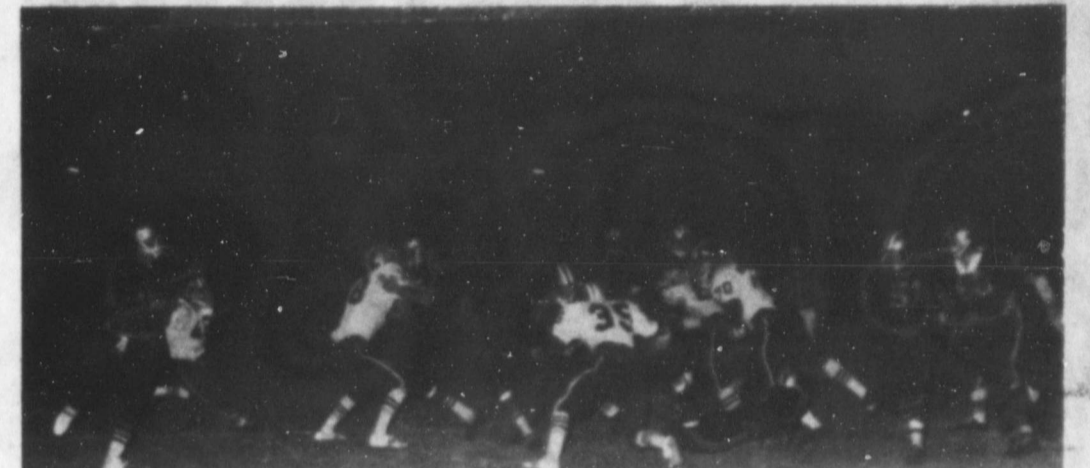
That's the reason Pierce can spend so much time at the drug store, the other folks are doing the work.

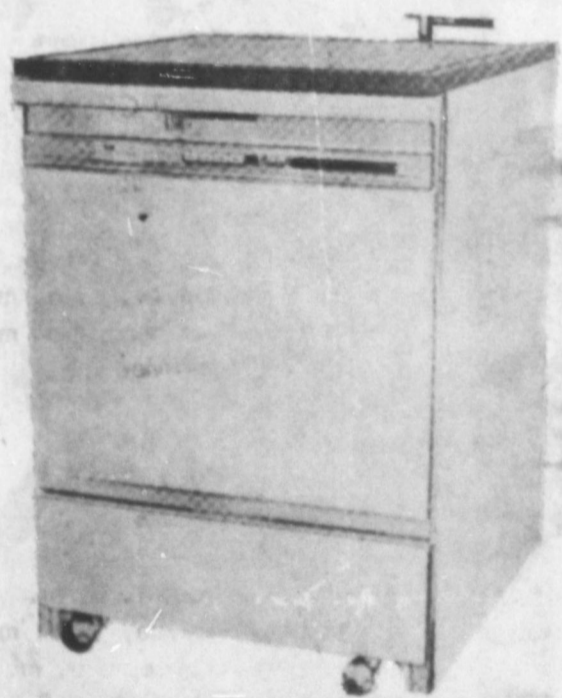

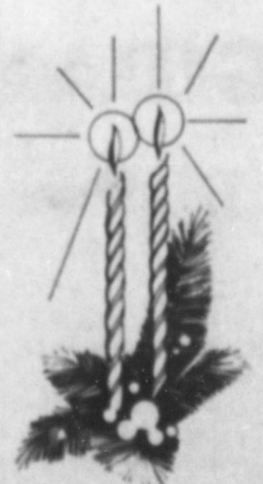
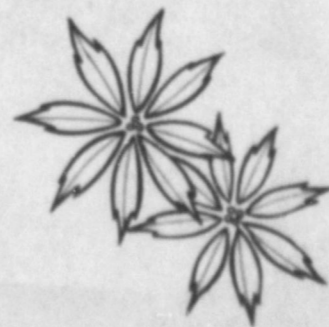
