

For the boys the three events to pick two from to make their points are: Ribbon ropping -- Tie down -- Bull riding.


For the girls to pick two events from these three events: Barrel races -- pole bending -- flag race.




DEAR MISTER EDITOR:



Ad Piracy


Poster ads for a circus were so eye-catching that a printer made up some copies-without asking anyone's permission. The owner of the circus promptly filed suit, charging infringement of copyright. But in court, the printer argued



be copyrighted. The Constitution says copyright is intended only for the 'useful arts'. That means something on a higher artistic level than just ads, which are plain commercialism.

Nevertheless, the court ruled that ads are indeed protectable by copyright and held the printer hable. The court said the Constitution drew no line between highbrow and lowbrow art.

In earlier years, many courts did draw such a line. But today,


