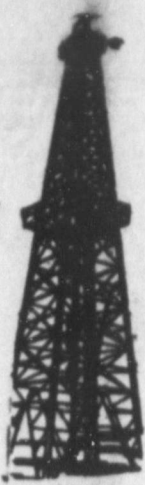

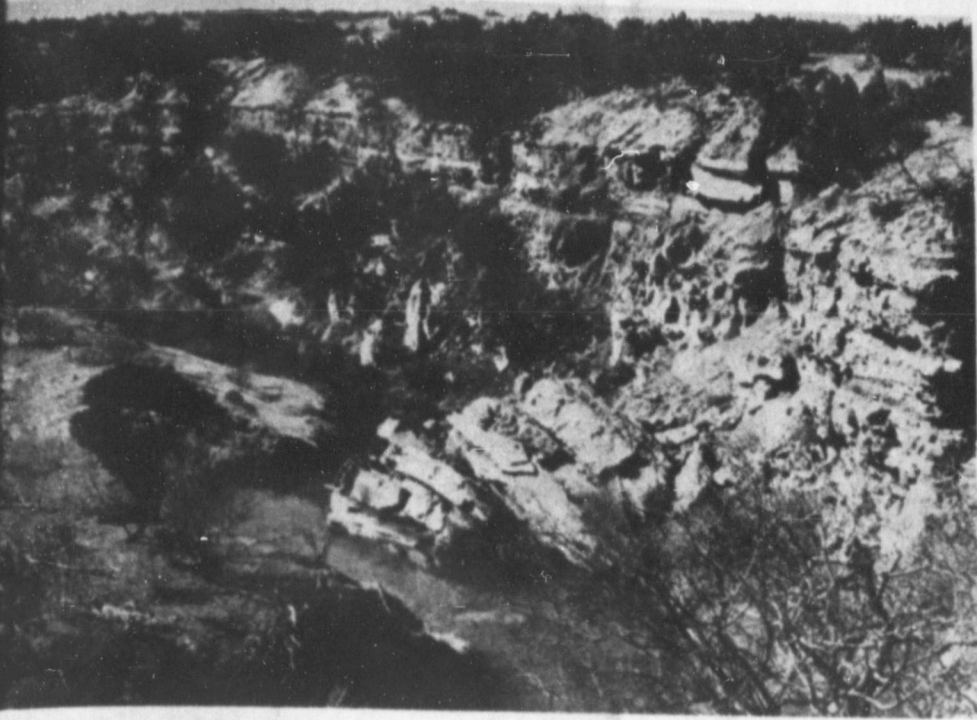

48 Lives In Jeopardy By Holiday Traffic

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today estimated that traffic accidents over the long July 4th holiday weekend will claim 48 lives in the Lone Star State. In addition, Speir said it appears that between 6 p. m. Friday, July 2 and midnight Monday, July 5--the official holiday weekend--these same collisions could result in hundreds, perhaps a thousand or more injuries, and a monetary loss running into the millions of dollars.

Roger Pierce Gets Distinguished Student Ranking

COLLEGE STATION -- Roger Wilson Pierce of Jayton has earned "Distinguished Student" ranking at Texas A&M University. The undergraduate honor is awarded students who have excelled academically. Recipients must earn at least a 3.25 grade point ratio (out of a possible 4.0) during the grade period. In addition to a 3.25 or higher GPR, a student qualifying for "Distinguished Student" honors must have been enrolled in a minimum of 12 hours and have no grade lower than a "C". Cassius Clay is too a conscientious objector, and the fact his religion is Moslem, has no bearing on the matter, the U. S. Supreme Court has ruled. In its 8-0 ruling, the Court overruled a lower court decision, assessing a prison sentence to Clay, for refusing military service. The government had contended that Clay's objection was not religious, but political. The Supreme Court, in effect in its ruling, took the position that Moslem's have the same status under law as Baptists, Methodists, Catholics or any other religious group. The Court has made several important rulings in this session. It ruled on a number of capitol punishment cases, stating that it is unlawful to disqualify a potential juror, on the grounds he is opposed to assessing the death penalty. A Congressman Discusses Problem Of Dope Addiction Among Armed Service Personnel

Those who have a son, husband or other loved one in Vietnam are doubly concerned reports on the use of dope. The dope problem among servicemen is indeed sad but the percentage of those on narcotics is not as great as might be expected from reports. The fact remains that one is too many. In a way it can be rationalized but, of course, not condoned. When fighting was at its height and boys were busy, there was little use of drugs. When things let down, boredom arose. You would have to be there to understand but there is need for understanding. "In Flanders Field the poppies grow, between the crosses, row on row...." Written during World War I by John McCrea, an English poet-soldier, who died in the

conflict, these lines have a bitter meaning today. Poppies, in that "God and Country" generation, were the symbol of an honorable death. They remain the respected badge of the fund drive for disabled veterans but a newer and more sinister connotation now infuses the flower, as young Americans return from Vietnam addicted to heroin of which the poppy is the source. A few days ago the president called for a "new all-out offensive against drug abuse" which he described as "America's public enemy number one." In a special message to Congress, the President asked for \$155 million in new funds to help finance the anti-drug offensive. He said it is a "World-wide offensive" dealing with sources of supply abroad, and particularly as it involves Americans stationed overseas. For too long the matter of discharging several thousand

servicemen each month from Vietnam, some of whom are drug addicted, was largely ignored. The military and the Veterans Administration too long failed to recognize and prepare to come to grips with the situation. They are barely beginning to do so at the present time. Action has now been instituted which attempts to identify the soldier who is an addict and try to provide treatment and rehabilitation. Of the 25,000 men a month now returning from Vietnam, an estimated 10 percent have a history of heroin use. Under the plan now being inaugurated, each soldier is given a test for detection of drug use before being cleared to return home. If he is free of drug detection, he proceeds without delay. If not, he is quarantined for a few days for further tests. Servicemen heretofore discharged with a narcotic habit may not be qualified for veterans

benefits but this is expected to be corrected. In the first place, only five of all the veterans hospitals are really equipped and qualified to give treatment. Much more is needed and it is pretty safe to speculate that more will be provided. The problem is qualified people to give much needed rehabilitation in this highly specialized field of treatment. At the moment, there are proposed cuts in Veterans Administration medical funding but this is likely to be reversed since the dimensions of the problem are just now really surfacing. For many in the service, who must serve additional time in Vietnam and in other areas of the world, more efforts are being made to control the source of drugs but, like in this country, it is impossible to completely dry up the supply. Greater and more expert detection is needed. It is not See Page 3, please

Survey Indicates Texas Teachers Think Narcotics Laws Should Be More Severe

A two-to-one majority of teachers, students, and boys on probation believe laws in drug abuse should be more strict according to a statewide survey made by Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education (TANE). The questions "Do you believe laws on drug abuse should be more strict?" was answered, "Yes" by 85% of teachers, 65% of high school students, and 54% of boys on probation. Total response was 67% for more strict laws. The survey was taken in both rural and metropolitan

areas of the state, from Farwell, near the New Mexico line, to Houston. In large city schools, the administration was asked to determine a representative cross section of teachers and students. "Are you personally acquainted with a drug abuser?" was answered "Yes" by 18% of teachers, 53% of high school students, and 50% of boys on probation. "Do you know someone who could get illegal drugs for you today if you wished to make a purchase?" was answered "Yes" by 12% of teachers, 52%

of students, and 39% of boys on probation. "Do you know someone who would sell illegal drugs directly to you if you wished to make a purchase?" was answered "Yes" by 10% of the teachers, 40% of students, and 39% of boys on probation. "In your opinion, what are the two main factors leading to drug abuse in teenagers?" was answered "Peer Group Pressure," and "Curiosity," in that order, by teachers. Students, however, rated "Curiosity" first. Boys on probation rated "Escape" first, and "Sex

Substitute" second. "In your opinion, what are the most important preventative measures that can be taken to combat drug abuse?" was answered "Education" and "Elimination of Supply of Illegal Drugs," by teachers and students. Boys on probation rated "Education" slightly ahead of "Law Enforcement," "Stronger Laws," and "Legalization of Marijuana." The questions "Is it possible to learn about the effects of a drug without personally experimenting with it?" was answered "Yes" by 98% of teachers, 90% of students, and 81% of boys on probation. "Have you come to decision about whether or not marijuana should be legalized?" was answered "Yes" by 80% of teachers, 78% of students, and 44% of boys on probation. (They were not asked what their decision was.) Areas involved in the survey were Farwell, Cotulla, Sulphur Springs, Richardson, Garland, Childress, Grapevine, McAllen, Fort Worth, and Houston. (The Survey was also taken in Dallas, but results were not returned in time for tabulation.)

TANE is a non-profit, educational organization, dedicated to preventing alcohol and drug problems, in existence since 1935, it is supported financially by Texas churches, individual contributions, businesses, industry, and proceeds of sale of educational aids. Programs include public school assembly programs, in-service teacher training workshops, drug education seminars for schools and churches, publishing books, production

of audio visual aids, a 150-man speakers bureau, legislative information service, research, and an annual drug education workshop co-sponsored with Baylor University. The next workshop is scheduled for August 1-7 at Waco.

rect amount of postage and the correct address. As one court explained:

"It is a presumption founded on the probability that (postal employees) will do their duty." Furthermore, you may get the benefit of the presumption even if the letter was not placed directly into a mailbox. One court applied the presumption to a letter handed to a mailman (while on duty). Another court applied it to a letter dropped into the mail chute of an office building.



However, there are limits. The presumption was denied when a man simply left some mail in an open lobby, in the expectation that the mailman would eventually pick it up.

Furthermore, like most presumptions, this one is subject to being defeated if there is sufficient evidence against it.

In one case, an embattled debtor claimed to have mailed an important legal notice to the office of his creditors. But in a court hearing, both partners in the firm took the witness stand and solemnly swore that the notice had never been received.

Then their bookkeeper took the stand and swore the same thing.

This testimony was enough to convince the court that the letter had indeed failed to reach its destination. It was more likely, said the court, either that the debtor had neglected to put it in

the mail or that the postman had—for once—neglected his duty.

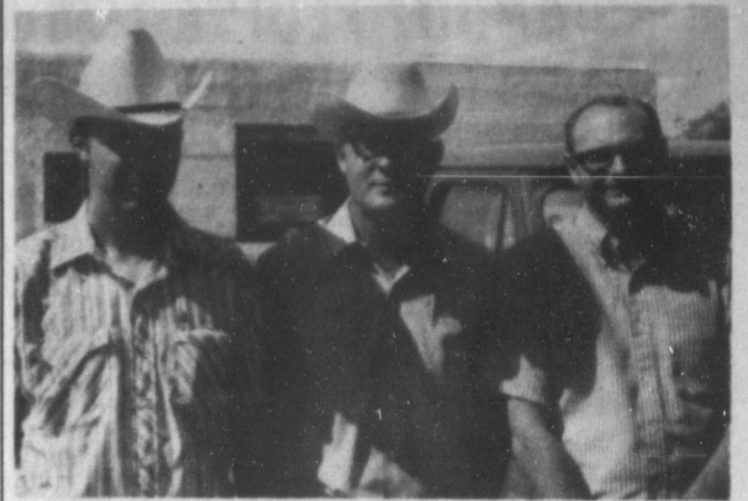

SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE

The 1,500th upstream flood prevention dam to be built in Texas was contracted for construction this week, reports State Conservationist Clyde W. Graham of the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

The dam is Site No. 13 in the Hickory Creek watershed near Denton. The Hickory Creek project will provide flood prevention and recreation for the City of Denton while protection cropland, roads, bridges and other property in the watershed. The dam will be the sixth in a series of 16 to be built in the watershed.

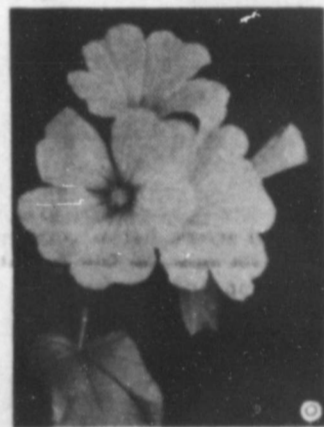
The project, including conservation land treatment in the watershed, is expected to keep 58,000 tons of sediment out of Garza-Little Elm Reservoir each year when completed. Garza-Little Elm

serves as a water supply for Denton, Dallas and other cities in North Texas.

The Hickory Creek project includes two lakes planned above the City of Denton which will supplement the city's long range recreation and flood control program. The city is buying land around the proposed lakes which will be converted into a 327-acre regional park. The city is working with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in developing the park.

"We're not only saving money through the watershed project", he pointed out "but we'll also have a beautiful regional park with two watershed lakes. On top of that, the project will reduce flooding, erosion, and sediment damage which will benefit our city as well as the entire Trinity basin."

ANNUAL MALLOW



Ease of growth and hardiness distinguish lavatera or annual mallow.

Imagine a neat, 2 1/2 foot high, bushy plant laden with single, pale pink blooms, rather like miniature hollyhocks. This is lavatera or annual mallow, native to the Mediterranean region.

Lavatera is so easy to grow and so hardy that it should be much more widely planted.

Seeds can be sown even before the last light frosts are over, because the seedlings, if they have sprouted, are very hardy.

Late in the season when frosts have killed many other annuals, lavatera also is hardy. The leaves turn bronze and the plants are attractive even without flowers.

exclusively a problem in South Vietnam. It exists every place but the cheaper drugs and a ready supply are peculiar to Southeast Asia. The lack of cooperation with the governments involved is a serious problem. It should and is being pressed upon these governments to lend their official efforts to reduce the cheap supply. The trouble is that the horse has been too long out of the barn.

The greatest sympathy and understanding, as well as rehabilitation and treatment, must be provided for returning servicemen who have become victims of the narcotic habit.

Green Thumb Tips

Have you ordered your flower and vegetable seeds? If not, hurry—the season is advancing and planting time will be here before you know it.

Frozen lawns in winter and soggy lawns in spring are poor places to walk. Grass is injured whether you realize it or not and the "path" you imprint will need repair later.

Every beet seed is really a cluster of seeds, perhaps 7 or 8 of them. That's the reason beet seedlings sprout in clusters, even if you've followed directions and sown the seed thinly.

Siberian wall flower and sweet william are among the flowers normally producing blooms the second year that will do this the first if seeds are sown as soon as soil can be worked.

Lima beans have a harder time sprouting in heavy soil than do the smaller seeds of bush beans. Plant limas in soil that is loose and crumbly and sprinkle a little lime along the row, working it into the soil before planting seeds.

One great advantage of either vermiculite or perlite for use in a planting medium in which to start seeds indoors is their ability to hold water.

This, unfortunately, also poses a problem, for the person who has never used either before tends to overwater and drown the seedlings.

The color of the planting medium changes with the moisture in it. It is lighter, and the weight of the container is less, when dry. Don't add water unless you are sure it's needed.

Do you know that miniature roses can be grown from seeds? It takes 3 weeks for seeds to sprout and the roses will flower 3 months from time of planting.

These little roses can be grown indoors as well as in the garden but must have at least a month of cold each year in order to bloom in the house.

Don't feel you must stop growing the vegetables in the cabbage family just because pests seem attracted by them.

Buy a package of rotenone — non-poisonous to warm-blooded animals, of which man is one — and dust it on the plants once a week, hitting the undersides of the leaves as well as the upper.

This controls most of the pests and insures edibility. Keep rotenone away from fish ponds.

CORN SALAD

1 can Le Sueur White Corn (shoe peg)
Add (to taste):
green onion
bell pepper
celery
pimento
salad dressing
lemon-pepper seasoning

BLUEBERRY CRUMB CAKE

1 can blueberry pie filling
*1 box (1 layer size) white or yellow cake mix
1 stick oleo
1 cup chopped pecans
Spread blueberries in bottom of round casserole. Sprinkle cake mix over Pat oleo over cakemix. Then sprinkle pecans over mixture. Bake 3-minutes at 350°.

*Use 2 layer cake mix if you use 2 cans of berries. Increase oleo another stick, and bake in large oblong pan.

ORANGE PUDDING

1 box orange jello (family size)
2 cups hot water
1 cup cold water
1 sm. can Mandarin oranges
1 #2 can crushed pineapple
1 sm. can frozen orange juice

Mix and put on top of Jello after jello is jelled:
1 pkg. dream whip (whipped as directed)
1 box lemon pudding (family size--prepared as directed)

Mix these together and spread on jello.

EASYHELLO DOLLY COOKIES

1 stick butter
1 cup gram cracker crumbs

1 small can coconut
1 small pkg. chocolate chips

1 cup chopped nuts
1 can Eagle Brand Milk
Melt stick of butter and put in long pan. Then in layers add the other ingredients. Pour Eagle Brand milk over it and bake 350° for 30 min.

BLUEBERRY PIE

1 can Cream of Chicken Soup

MODERN CINDERELLA



This interesting flower is the new double Gloriosa daisy, easily grown from seeds. It will bloom this summer if you sow them as soon as the soil dries.

Every youngster knows black-eyed-susan, summer wild flower of open fields. But even some dyed-in-the-wool gardeners don't realize what plant breeders have produced from this humble wildling.

These high-toned relatives are called Gloriosa daisies and their 5-inch-wide blooms dwarf those of black-eyed susan. Some have golden yellow flowers with a dark brown center "eye". A new variety, Irish Eyes, has a green "eye". Other varieties are "zoned" with mahogany red toward the center of each flower, golden yellow towards the outer edge of each petal. This variety is named Pinwheel.

The newest Gloriosa daisy is even further removed from its origins for it has either semi-double or fully double flowers, also golden yellow. When they are entirely open a dark brown, velvety center may show.

All Gloriosa daisy flowers, single or double, are borne on the same sturdy plants and stiff stems that mark the wild black-eyed-susan. Flowers open all summer long and continue even into fall. If you sow seeds as soon as soil dries you can have blooms in your garden this year.

There has been much debate about whether Gloriosa daisies are annual, biennial or perennial. Plants winter over from fall-sown seeds to bloom the following year. In some climates they then die. In other areas they come up from the roots year after year. You'll have to find, by trial and error, how they perform where you live.

But don't miss growing them. They're really spectacular.

with people favoring the death penalty, and in effect destroys the right of a fair and impartial trial, which the jury system is supposed to guarantee, I agree.

The Court also handed down a ruling in a case brought by one of the Eastern States, to the effect that tax money could not be spent for teaching non-religious courses in parochial schools. The judges said classes taught in church schools cannot be taught without the "church" influence.

It may be significant, that at this time the Texas Legislature has passed a law to spend millions of dollars each year, to pay up to \$600 per student per year of State Tax money, for tuition fees in church colleges and universities within the State. Here's hoping someone files a suit to test this law. The U. S. Supreme Court is sure to annul it, if they get the case.

The Court also has two other important matters to decide, and they have called off or rather postponed a vacation to handle these matters. One is the so-called secret papers about the Viet Nam way, which the New York Times and other papers are trying to print. Associated with this, will be the trial of the Boston Educator who had the papers entrusted to him, but made them available to the newspapers.

President Nixon on Tuesday made the papers in question available to the U. S. House of Representatives and the Senate. I will hazard a guess the Supreme Court will give the papers a slap on the wrists, along with Ellsworth, and then declare the papers have lost their secrecy, by virtue of their age.

The researchers found that cigarette smoke which is allowed to accumulate in a poorly ventilated room significantly increases the heart rate, blood pressure, and poisonous gas in the blood. The effects are similar to those on the smoker himself, but on a reduced level.

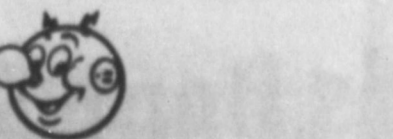

ALLERGIES EXPLAINED

The child who refuses to eat his breakfast cereal or eggs because, he says, he is allergic to them, may not be "conning" his parents after all. Approximately one third of children in the U.S., and half the adult population, suffer from an allergic disease at some time during their lifetime.

"Allergy" as a word is less than 60 years old. However, the conditions this word describes are as old as mankind. An allergy is a person's abnormal reaction to certain substances to which he has become sensitized or unusually susceptible.

Parents sometimes have the mistaken idea that children outgrow allergies. However, physicians know that the allergies need to be identified and treated early in life.

Respiratory allergies, for example, often continue with increasing severity into adulthood. The child who always seems to have a running nose or other coldlike symptoms, or who sneezes when around certain trees, grass, or ragweed pollen at various times of the year, is probably suffering allergic symptoms, and should be given early treatment to avoid the possibility of developing asthma.

The visit to the physician will include his taking a medical history of the patient, and an inquiry into his current activities, in an attempt to discover what allergens are involved. A complete physical examination

with routine laboratory tests follow. Allergy tests help to determine more definitely the substances to which he reacts. As a result of the interview and physical examination, the physician may decide to give the patient desensitizing injections to build up immunity.



He may also recommend a change in diet. For relief of sneezing, itching, and stuffed, runny nose, he may suggest the use of a nasal spray such as NTZ or other drugs containing antihistamines and a decongestant. For children, mild nose drops such as Neo-Synephrine are often prescribed in appropriate strengths for different age groups. Medical treatment for an allergic patient depends on the severity of the condition, as determined by the physician.

The patient can expect good results for the future, if he follows his physician's directions for treatment, and for avoiding the offending allergens, whenever possible, once they are identified.
