Summer Vegetable Dishes

SURPRISE ROLL-UPS

1 can (15 1/2 oz.) Asparagus Spears
1 can refrigerated crescent rolls
2 slices American cheese
4 slices luncheon meat or 1 cup left-over meat
Drain Asparagus well. Unfold eight crescent rolls. Divide all ingredients into eighths layering on crescent roll in this order: cheese, meat and Asparagus. Roll each into bundles and stick with toothpick. Bake 375° for 20 min. Maybe used as finger food or maybe served topped with hot cream of mushroom soup. Makes 8 servings.

CHICKETY MIXED VEGETABLES

1 cup water
1 package dehydrated chicken noodle soup mix
1/2 teaspoon parsley flakes
1 package (10 oz.) Frozen Mixed vegetables.
Bring water to boil in saucepan. Add soup and parsley flakes; stir until dissolved. Add frozen mixed vegetables, bring back to a boil, then cook covered over low heat ten minutes. Makes 4 servings.

CHEDDAR SQUASH BAKE

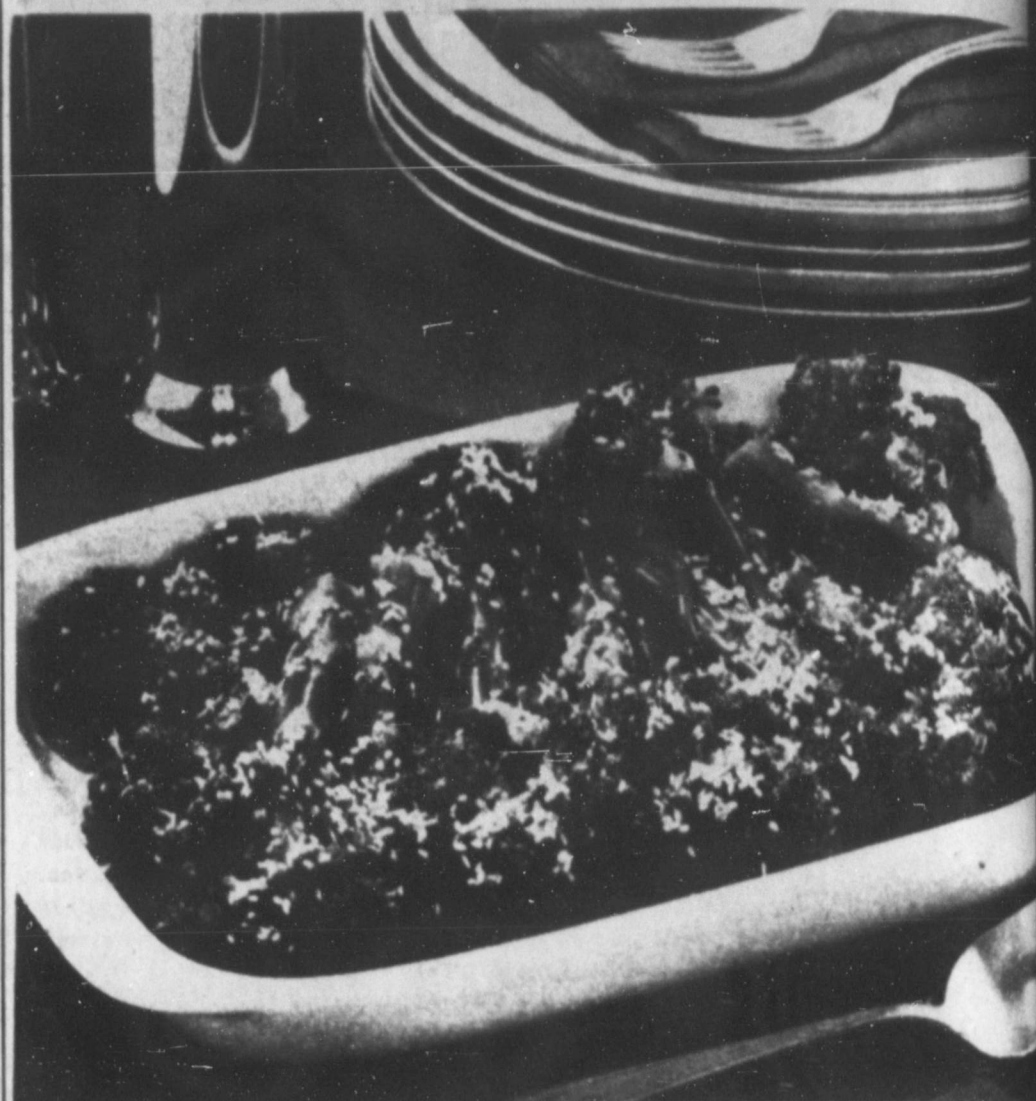
6 cups thinly sliced unpared zucchini
2 slightly beaten egg yolks
1 cup dairy sour cream
2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
2 stiff-beaten egg whites

1 1/2 cups shredded sharp natural cheddar cheese
6 slices crisp-cooked bacon, drained and crumbled
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
1/4 cup fine dry bread crumbs
Simmer squash till tender; drain; sprinkle with salt. Combine egg yolks, sour cream and flour; fold in egg whites. Place half the squash in 12x7 1/2x2 inch baking dish; top with half the egg mixture, half the cheese and all the bacon. Repeat layers of squash, egg mixture and cheese. Melt butter margarine; stir in crumbs; sprinkle over all. Bake at 350° for 20 to 25 minutes. Makes 8-10 servings.

GRILLED VEGETABLES IN FOIL

Cook 1/2 pound fresh green beans, cut in 1-inch pieces in a little boiling water 10 minutes; drain. Place beans and 2 sliced tomatoes on large double-thick square of foil. Combine 4 tablespoons butter or margarine, 1/4 cup chopped onion, 2 teaspoons prepared mustard, 1 teaspoon prepared horseradish, 1 tablespoon brown sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, and a dash pepper. Beat together till fluffy; dot over vegetables. Wrap tightly, sealing edges of foil. Cook 30 to 25 minutes over medium hot coals, or in 400° oven. Makes 4 to 5 servings.

Add eggplant, stirring to coat all pieces. Cover; simmer 12 or 15 minutes, or till eggplant is just tender. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

BROILED TOMATOES
1/3 cup cracker crumbs
2 Tablespoons butter or margarine
1 teaspoon parsley flakes
1/4 teaspoon oregano
Dash of garlic powder
1 can (1 lb.) Whole Tomatoes, drained
1/4 cup shredded Swiss cheese
Saute cracker crumbs in butter. Stir in parsley flakes, oregano, and garlic powder. Cut Tomatoes in half crosswise. Sprinkle each half with crumb mixture and cheese. Broil just long enough to melt cheese. Makes 4 to 6 servings.
