7. Make needed adjustments in land use by converting poorly suited cropland to more beneficial uses -- grass, trees, wildlife habitat, and

8. Improve and expand recreation facilities; promote historical and scenic attrac-

9. Encourage existing industries to expand and new ones to locate in the area and thus create jobs; encourage industries to process and use





#### Peanut Butter Cookies

3/4 cupunsifted flour, stir to

aerate before measuring 1/2 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 cupor 1/4 lb, stick butter

or margarine 1/2 cup creamy or chunky peanut butter

1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar 1/2 cup granulated sugar

1 large egg

1 teaspoon vanilla 1/2 cup salted Spanish pea-

nuts, red skins on 1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate

pieces On wax paper thoroughly stir together the floor and bak-

ing soda. In a medium mixing bowl cream butter and peanut butter; beat in (one ingredient at a time) the brown sugar, granulated sugar, egg and vanilla. Add flour mixture; with a spoon mix well. Stir in peanuts and chocolate pieces.

Drop by heaping teaspoonfuls, about 2 inches apart, on to an ungreased cookie sheet. Press down with floured fork, (markings will not show after baking.)

Bake in a preheated 3500 oven until lightly browned --10 minutes. Let cookies stand on pan about one; minute. Then with a wide metal spatula remove to wire racks to cool. Store in a tightly cov-

Makes 4 dozen cookies.

GINGER SNAPS

2 cups sifted flour

1 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon ginger

1/2 cup light molasses 1/2 cupfirmly packed dark brown sugar

1 large egg

inch thickness.

On wax paper sift together flour, soda, salt and ginger. In a medium saucepan heat the molasses and sugar, stirring until sugar dissolves (do not boil) cool; add egg and beat well. Gradually stir in sifted dry ingredients until blended. Chill dough for 3 hours. Work with 1/2 of the dough at a time, keeping refrigerated. On a floured pastry cloth, with a floured stockinetcovered floured rolling pin, roll out dough to 1/4

Cut out with a round 3-inch cookie cutter. Place 3 inches

apart on greased cookie sheets.

Bake in a preheated 350° oven 12 to 15 minutes. With a wide metal spatula remove to wire racks to cool. Store in a tightly covered tin box. Makes about 13 cookies.

SUGAR COOKIES (Basic) Sift together and set aside 2 cups sifted flour

1 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt

Cream until shortening is soft-2/3 cup butter or marga-
