



S. Sgt. Joe Gayle Hicks **Now Serving In Viet Nam**

S. Sgt. Joe Jayle Hicks is now in Viet Nam on a tour of duty.

Joe Hicks first went into the United States Army Feb. 1960 and took Basic Training at Ft. Carson, Colo. Then he went to Heavy Armored School at Ft. Hood, Tex. He was sent to Baumholder, Germany where he was stationed for 24 months. He was there during the Berlin Crisis, which was the cause of his tour being

He was discharged in March 1962, Joe was out of the service three years and eightdays. As a result of this eight days he was required to take his basic training again. He was made an acting Sgt. at this time at Ft. Polk, La., where he took basic and also eight weeks of wireman school.

From Ft. Polk Joe was sent to Korea for a 13 month tour in Sept. 1965.

While in Korea Joe attended NCO Academy which he graduated top in his class. Also in Korea his MOS was charged from wireman to supply. Sgt. Joe then spent three years in Karlsruhe, Germany as a supply Sgt. Joe applied for Helicopter Maintenance School while in Germany. This request was granted and he went to Ft. Rucker, Ala. for training on H-13 Helicopters for three months. Joe graduated with honors and was promoted to Staff Sgt. (E-6).



He was then transferred to Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo. for one

During this year Joe was field trained in fixed wing aircraft. As of leaving Ft. Leonard Wood, Joe received several Army Accomendation awards from his NCOIC, Bn. Commander and from Gen. W. T. Bradly Commanding General of Ft. Leonard Wood.

Joe is now serving in Viet Nam with the 116th Assault Helicopter Co. at Chulai. His unit is being transferred to

Academic Changes Made

At a recent meeting of the Jayton School board, some changes were made in curricula requirements. In the future, here are some requirements that must be met to graduate.

"Twenty two credits will be required for graduation, sixteen of which must be in a cademic subjects."

"P. E. is required of all students unless students have a doctor's excuse or enrolled in an academic subject which cannot be rescheduled so long as he meets minimum requirement in P. E. " "Students must be sched-

uled for no fewer than four a cademic subjects. "

"Three credits for students enrolled in vocational courses if there is a schedule conflict!

"Two credits in science. college bound students should take a minimum of three. One credit may be substituted for from a prescribed list of approved courses provided the student has met 7th and 8th grade science standards. "

Mother's father and several left four or five women and quite a group of children. Her grandfather moved all of them to his home and cared for them during the four years of war. In spite of northern denials, there was a spirit of mutual love between the races.

The women were kept busy spinning and weaving to make clothes for the families and when they had the opportunity they would send clothing to their husbands. They had no time to look after the children, who were under the care of negro mannies as they were called. They all got superstitious. Of course, as they grew up they became more enlightened. 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Fat Bus

Harvey never knew what hit afterward in the hospital.

He had been standing on sidewalk near the curb, gazing to the north, when a bus approaching from the south moved in for a stop. The front corner of the bus, which overhung the curb, struck him a glancing blow on the

Under these circumstances, was Harvey entitled to collect damages from the bus company? In a court test, the company said no. The driver had a right, argued the company, to drive as close to the curb as his wheels would

But Harvey won a substantial judgment. The court said the driver should have realized that, since a bus is fatter than its wheels, it can extend over the curb and smite an unsuspecting



In the eyes of the law, a sidewalk is a safety zone in which the pedestrian reigns supreme. As the court put it:

"A pedestrian is entitled to assume there is no danger from traffic as long as he remains on the sidewalk.

Would it matter if the pedestrian had actually seen the bus coming toward him? That should make a difference, claimed the bus company in another injury case, because it would have been so easy for him to take one step backward-to be safe.

But again the court ruled in the pedestrian's favor. The court said he simply had no reason to expect that the bus would intrude where it had no business intruding. Still, there is always the possibility that at the very moment of impact, the pedestrian may have been leaning over the curb

into the street. One woman was struck by ous while she was standing on the sidewalk between a fire hydrant and an electric light pole. Yet, even though both the hydrant and the pole were at the very edge of the curb, neither of these objects was even scratched.

court concluded that the woman herself must have been at fault. The judge said that, at least for a brief instant and a brief distance, she must have leaned out of her safety zone on the sidewalk, into the danger zone on the street.

CRACKLE PEANUT BRITTLE Butter two baking sheets. Combine in a heavy 3-qt. saucevan having a tight-fitting cover

2 cups sugar 1 cup white corn syrup

1 cup water

Stir over low heat until sugar is dissolved. Increase heat to medium and bring mixture to boiling. Cover saucepan and boil mixture gently 5 min. (This will dissolve any crystals that may have formed on sides of saucepan).

Uncover and continue cooking

without stirring, to 235°F (remove from heat while testing). Using pastry brush dipped in water, wash down crystals from sides of saucepan from time to time during cooking. Mix in

2 cups (about 3/4 lb.) unroasted peanuts 2 teaspoons butter

Cook over low heat to 300°F to 304°F, stirring frequently. Remove from heat and add.

2 teaspoons baking soda 1 teaspoon vanilla extract Pour onto the baking sheets,

spreading as thinly as possible. As soon as candy is cooked enough to handle, wet hands in water and stretch candy as desired. Turn candy over and cool completely. When cool and firm, break candy into medium size pieces. Store in tightly covered container. About 2 lbs. Peanut Brittle

JACK-O'-LANTERN TEACAKES 2 1/3 cups baking mix

3 tbsp sugar 3 thsp butter or margarine,

1/2 cup milk Shoestring Licorice Colored candies Heat oven to 450°


