## **Two Teams Are Added To Football District**


This Week In Jayton

The Kent Co. Agricultural tour was held Thursday, Oct. 14th. Approximately 15 people attended this tour that covered a number of different farms and ranches.


The first order of business was the election of a Director to the Duck Creek Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors, Norman Hahn was reelected as Direc-




