Jaybirds Take Quick Lead In District 3B

This Week In Jayton



You heard the story about the boy that cried Wolf? Well, really this Saturday night, you will need to turn your clock back an hour to make room for Central Standard Time.

We got off on a tangent last week. The time actually changes the last Sunday in October. Forgetting about a fifth Sunday in the month, the article about changing the time was published a week premature.

We regret all the inconvenience this caused some people. But one thing for sure, we learned that people do read that in the paper.

If you have looked at the legislative redistricting plan, either for the State Senate, or the House of Representatives, you quickly come to one opinion, and that is Texas is run by the politicians, for the politicians.

The only hope of any form of getting representation on behalf of the people, is in the courts.

Under the new House plan, Kent County would be placed in a district, much similar in size to the Burleson Congressional district. This district now represented by Bill Heatley of Paducah.

Rep. Delwin Jones of Lubbock, who was chairman of the original plan that was blocked out by the courts, who paired many of the opponents of his good friend Gus Matzner, in order to get one of them defeated, had the tables turned, and he himself was put in a district with another representative by the new reapportionment.

Both House and Senate plans will be tested in the courts. Chief objection to the House plan is the fact Harris County (Houston) will have individual districts for its House members while other large counties like Dallas and Tarrant will have all its representatives elected at large.

Can anyone figure out a good reason for this, except one to help the political friends, or hurt the political enemies. It is hoped by many Texas courts will take care of this inequity.

It is said by some observers, that this plan was adopted in Texas for a particular reason and that was to keep the blacks out of the Legislature. It is said the lines are so drawn, it will put a few blacks and a lot of whites in each district, and thus keep the blacks in the minority in each district.

The addition of Harold Wayne Judy to the Jaybird backfield, enabled the local lads to paste an easy 44-6 defeat on Sunde here Friday.

Coming in with a one-two punch for the 3-2 Birds Judy and Parker Kidd hit the Sands line alternately, and Judy scored three times for the Birds, while Kidd crossed the double stripe twice. One of Judy's TD's was an aerial from Brad Dibrell pass for a two point conversion, and Alfonso Tre.ino got on the board by playing alert defense as he fell on a blocked punt in the endzone.

All in all it was a good night for the Jaybirds and enabled them to get off to a good start in the district chase.

The statistics point out the one-sidedness of the affair, as the Birds racked up 20 first downs while the visitors could get only 3.

Rushing, the Birds moved the ball for 203 yards, while Sunde moved it 130. Jaybirds completed 4 of 8 passes for 39 yards, while Sunde completed 3 of 8 for a net gain of 8 yards.

Jaybirds were high in turnovers. They lost two fumbles and had no passes intercepted. The visitors had two fumbles but did have a pass picked off.

Over in Abilene the first of the week the McMurry Board of Regents voted to withdraw scholarships from Track and Football. They said they have no plans to quit these sports, but definitely it amounts to that.

Small private schools are finding it difficult to compete in football, as it continually takes more and more money to finance the game. For instance, at Texas Tech they recently spent around a quarter million dollars for the covering on the football field, and also at Tech just the salary of the coaches and Ad men alone runs almost a quarter a million dollars a year. Many of the Athletic scholarships at Tech are paid for by friends.

For instance many of the men at the quarter back club a couple of weeks ago, whom were dressed down by Jim Carlen, and he offered to meet them behind the building after the meeting, were men who had contributed financially to the athletic scholarships.

It is not likely that McMurry could get good quality football players to play without any financial assistance.

Another Abilene team, Hardin-Simmons, who at one time did very well in football, dropped the sport a few years ago, because of financing, or the lack of it.


Interplanting Cotton And Grain For Insect Control

ter blank rows in early June. Cotton variety planted is Western Storm Proof. Maize variety planted is Little Joe, with a variety plot of Excel 733 and Acco R-1019.





Fresh Vegetable Plates

BROCCOLI SAUTE
2 pounds fresh broccoli
1/2 cup water
1/4 cup Vegetable Oil
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
Wash broccoli. Split ends of large stalks lengthwise into halves or quarters, depending on size. Place in large skillet. Sprinkle with water, vegetable oil, garlic, salt and pepper. Cover tightly; cook over very low heat 20 to 30 minutes, or until stalks are tender. Turn broccoli several times during cooking. Makes 4 servings.

ITALIAN POTATO BALLS
1 1/2 pounds potatoes
2 egg yolks
1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
2 tablespoons finely chopped onion
2 tablespoons Vegetable Oil
1/4 cup finely chopped parsley
2 teaspoons salt

1/2 teaspoon black pepper - flour

2 eggs, beaten
Fine dry bread crumbs
Vegetable Oil
Peel potatoes; boil in salted water until done. Mash and combine with egg yolks and cheese in a large bowl. Sauté onion in 2 tablespoons vegetable oil until golden. Add to potato mixture along with parsley, salt and pepper. Stir until smooth; shape into 24 small balls.

Roll potato balls in flour, then in beaten eggs; coat with bread crumbs. Chill until ready to use.
Fry in deep hot (375° F.) Vegetable Oil until golden brown. Makes 6 servings.

BAKED EGG PLANT NAPOLI
1/2 cup chopped onion
2 tablespoons vegetable oil
1 can (10 1/2 ounce) tomato puree
2/3 cup water

1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1 teaspoon oregano leaves,
Dash pepper
1 medium eggplant, peeled and thinly sliced

2 cups grated sharp Cheddar cheese
In a skillet saute chopped onions in vegetable oil. Add tomato puree, waters, salt, oregano and pepper. Bring to a boil and simmer for 15 minutes.

In a greased 2-quart baking dish alternate layers of sliced eggplant, tomato sauce and 1 cup grated cheese, starting with layer of eggplant and ending with layer of tomato sauce.
Bake in moderate oven



The boys are being commended on the fine work they did on the making of the engines.

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


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
