

1/2 cup butter

1/3 cup chopped onion 1/4 cup chopped parsley 1/2 cup finely chopped

6 cup soft 1/4-inch bread

1 3/4 t. salt

1/8 t. pepper 13-4 lb, fish, dressed for

stuffing

Welt 1/3 cup of butter. Saute tion, parsley and celery in tter until tender. Add bread ubes, 1/4 teaspoon salt and epper; stir to coat bread es. Brown fish. Stuff fish oosely with bread mixture; ose and hold dressing in lace with skewers. Place in reased shallow baking dish or en-proof platter. Brush fish th remaining butter. Bake 350 degree oven 40-60

minutes or until fish flakes easily. Baste several times with butter or pan drippings.




