Farmers Must Realize Their Need For Grass

Is your grass starving to death? This may sound like an unusual question, but grass like animals depends upon food for survival. But grass, unlike animals, is capable of manufacturing its own food for growth, reproduction and survival.

The rancher must realize that grass manufactures its own food and use this knowledge in the development of his grass management plan. His ability to use this knowledge of the plants ability to manufacture food means the life or death of his better grasses.

Many people believe that plants get their food from the soil. If we analyze the soil we find no fats, no protein, no starches or sugars, in fact no food. What we do find is nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium and many other minerals needed by the plant to manufacture food.

When moisture is available, temperature right, the plant takes up these raw minerals through the root system and transports them up to the leaves. In the leaves these minerals, with energy furnished by the sun, combine with air to manufacture food. Actually the raw minerals from the soil make up 5% and the air 95% of the raw minerals needed in the food manufacturing process. The leaves then are the "food factories" of the plant.

This manufactured food is then used by the plant to produce leaf and stem growth, to expand and replenish the root system, and manufacture seed. Some food is stored for times of stress and the "greening up" in the spring.

What does this mean to the rancher, stock-farmer, or foreman in the Duck Creek Soil and Water Conservation District. He must realize that every grass plant that his cattle are grazing depends upon its leaves for all its food for survival. If he allows his cattle to graze all the leaves off his plants, he has removed its ability to manufacture food.

He must manage his livestock to the point of not allowing them to remove an excess of leaves from the plants and at the same time keep the food factory working.

Ranchers have found that 50% by weight of a plants leaves can be removed each growing season without harming the plant. The remaining 50% is sufficient to carry on the food making process and allow the plant to produce at its full potential. If the plant is grazed shorter than the 50% it weakens a bit if continued over use it practiced the plant will die.

Experience and periodic ground investigation are the best methods of determining the correct stocking rate for your rangeland. As each year is different, these investigations could be made throughout the year and not only at the end of the year. As it is evident that livestock adjustments are necessary to maintain proper use, the rancher can make them and keep his "food factory" in top working condition. By maintaining proper grazing use of his grass, a rancher will always have a healthy range that will breeze through the short dry periods and respond rapidly to the rainfall following a drought.

Burleson Will Seek A New Term In The House

Congressman Omar Burleson has informed this newspaper he is making plans to run for another term in the House of Representatives.

When the Legislature re-districted the districts for Congress, this county was placed in Burleson's district. The federal court ruled it out, and placed this county in the district of Republican Bob Price, but then the Supreme Court cancelled this order until the case can be tried, putting the plan back like it was.

This leaves the people confused. Presently this county is represented by George Mahon, and he will be our Congressman all this year. The new district, whatever it turns out to be, will not go into effect



until the end of this year. But Burleson says he is continuing with his election plans, supposing this county will be in his district.

Two Get Degrees From Fall Semester

A total of 888 students in the six colleges at Texas Tech University received bachelor's degrees at the conclusion of the fall semester.

The College of Business Administration graduated 273 students; Arts and Sciences, 205; Education, 130; Agricultural Sciences, 109; Engineering, 94; and Home Economics, 77.

Looking From Here

THROUGHOUT OUR HISTORY the waters which wash our shores have been friendly. They have given us geographical protection making it practically impossible for another nation to attack us. In our history they have given us time to build up our strength when danger seriously threatened. The tempo of modern technology has changed all this, as it has changed so many other things. It has stripped this Country of our friendly protecting oceans.

The bearer of bad news is always punished. In ancient times one who bore adverse reports to the ruler, even though the truth, might be put to death. Today he simply becomes an "alarmist" but if there is one subject about which the American people must have a conscious concern it is our military position compared to that of the Soviet Union.

"Peace In Our Time" became a slogan after declared by Neville Chamberlain. What followed was six years of bloody conflict, which came near wrecking western civilization. We must hope that lessons of appeasement and unpreparedness have not receded into the dimness of shadows of past history.

If history teaches us anything, it surely must be that weakness invites attack; that it takes only one aggressor to plunge the world into war against the wishes of peace loving countries.

Some of our weaknesses and vulnerability have been pointed out in this space from time to time. Another one has recently been proved. A defecting Cuban pilot flew a Russian MIG Fighter plane to a Florida Air Base in 1969 and more lately a Russian-built transport flew from Havana to New Orleans carrying some uninvited delegates to a sugar conference. The question is how were these unannounced flights made without triggering an air alert.

The chairman of the armed services committee of the House of Representatives gives the answer. There is virtually no air defense system along our southern border and the Gulf Coast.

A defense department statement attempts some reassurances. It says that the Soviet Union could not launch a major manned bomber attack without the United States knowing about it. Besides, it is reasoned, strategic manned bombers are not worth worrying about in this age of far more formidable nuclear missiles.

True, perhaps. But it is hardly "alarmist" to recall that most of the American people and their leaders were convinced in 1941 that the Japanese either would not or could not carry out an attack on Pearl Harbor.

The glaring gap in our defenses to our southern approaches has gone virtually unnoticed during the long period of sustained hostility towards the United States by Castro's communist Cuba. During the same time there has been established a Soviet Union presence in the Caribbean. There are visible efforts by both the Russians and Chinese communists to gain a foothold in Latin American Governments.

Under the influence of those both in and out of government who think the manned plane is obsolete and unnecessary, the B-1 bomber has not been put into production. Those who believe that it is safe to let down our defenses gamble with the very future of our Nation.

The Russian bear may not be yet 10 feet tall and fully matured but he is exercising and growing rapidly. The future of our Country is too dear to take chances on only living for the moment.

The City Council of the City of Jayton is taking into consideration the installation of a Sanitary Sewer System within the City Limits of the City of Jayton.

At the present time there are funds available through the Farmers Home Administration that will pay 50% or more of the costs of the system. This 50% will be in the form of a grant. The cost per month for this system for you will be approximately \$3.00 or \$4.00 per month. It is the belief of the members of the Jayton City Council that if we do not take advantage of this Farmers Home Administration money now, that when time comes and the State Health Department requires a sanitary sewer system to comply with State Law, these funds will not be available, and the costs to construct the system will be very much greater.

The other cost of the system, not covered by grants, will be a loan from the Farmers Home Administration, to be paid out of revenue, instead of an increase in taxes.

Since this will be a revenue bond, all eligible voters within the City of Jayton will be qualified to vote. You do not have to be a property owner to vote in such an election.

A questionnaire will be mailed to you with your water bill in the near future. Please make your wishes known on this questionnaire as to whether or not you want a sewer system, and mail it with your payment of the water bill, or bring it to the City Office.

We would request that all water users and anyone interested to answer this questionnaire, because it will be you who will be paying for the system.

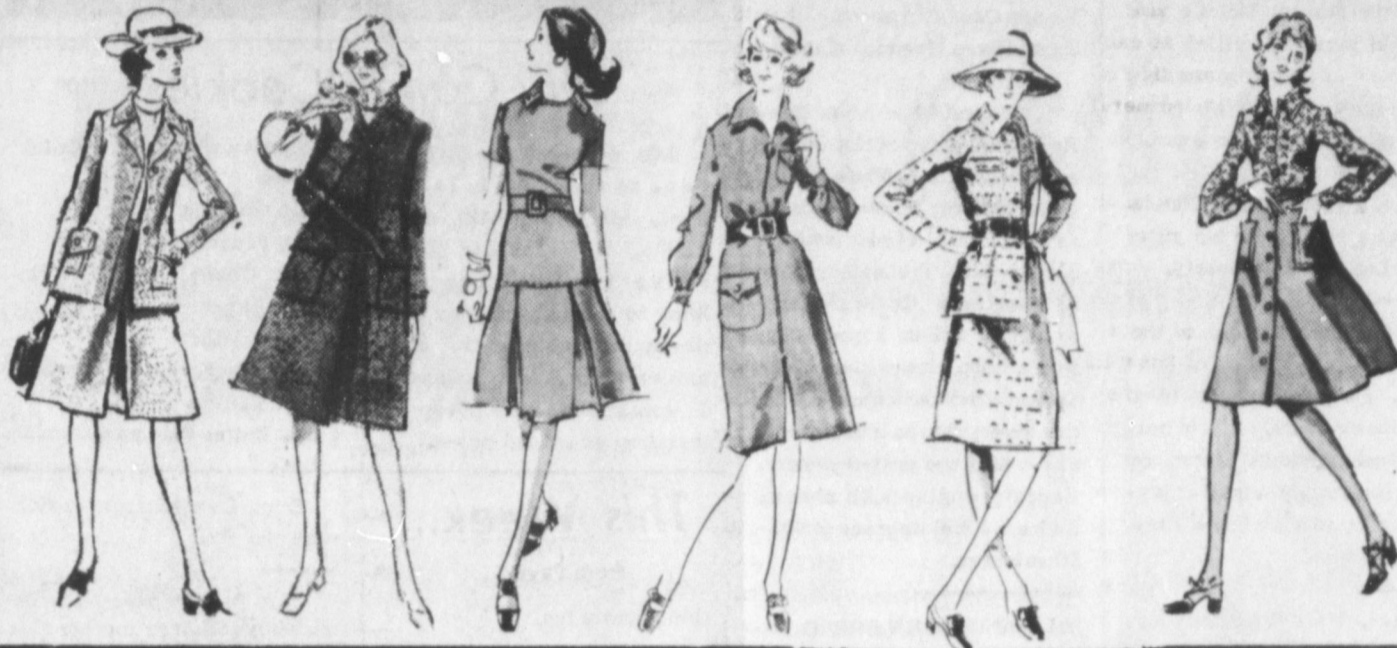

CHICKEN ENCHILADA PIE
1 3lb. chicken
1 can Condensed Cream of Mushroom Soup
1 can Condensed Cream of Chicken Soup
1 4oz. can Chopped Green Chillies
1 tsp. Chili Powder
4 tsp. Minced Onion
1/8 tsp. Garlic Powder
1/4 tsp. Black Pepper
1/4 tsp. Tabasco Sauce
1 cup Chicken Broth
4 cups Corn Chips
8 oz. Sharp Cheddar Cheese, grated

Cook and bone chicken. Reserve one cup of the chicken broth. Combine soups, green chillies, spices, tabasco sauce and chicken broth. Blend well. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cover the bottom of a 2 1/2 or 3 quart casserole with 2 cups corn chips. Spread half the chicken over this layer; then half the sauce; then half the grated cheese. Repeat, ending with cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes.

JALAPENO CORN BREAD
1 1/2 c. corn meal
1 t. salt
2/3 c. cooking oil
1 c. sour cream
1 can cream style corn
3 t. baking powder
2 eggs, slightly beaten
2 minced jalapeno peppers
1 c. grated cheese
Mix all ingredients except grated cheese. Pour half of mixture into pan; spread grated cheese over batter and then pour remaining mixture on layer of cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. 8-10 servings.

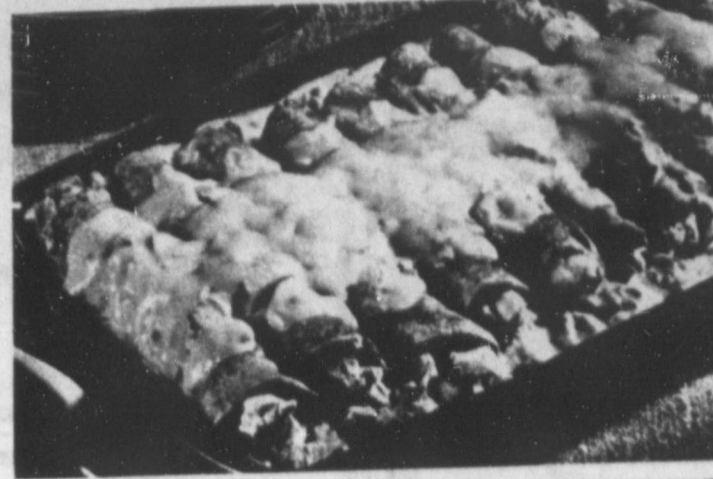
