Don't Buy Family Food Out Of A Grab Bag

When buying margarine, don't just close your eyes and grab one.

Today's homemaker can choose regular, whipped, soft or diet margarine, How do these types of margarines differ? Which is the best buy?

"The answer to those questions depends on your family budget and how you plan to use the margarine, " said Mrs. Bobby Stanaland Extension county home demonstration

The law requires that all margarine must contain 80 per cent fat unless the product is intended as a diet substitute. And a diet substitute must be labeled "imitation" or "diet". Package labels must also state the type of fat or fats used to make the margarine.

"Soft, whipped and diet margarine all cost more than regular margarine", Mrs. Bobby Stanaland noted, "You pay additional money for the whipping, extra ingredients and any other additional processes needed to make the margarine read y-to-spread, fluffy or low-calorie".

The agent explained that another difference between whipped and regular types of margarine is the volume per weight. For example, one pound of regular margarine contains two cups of margarine. A pound of whipped margarine contains three cups because milk and air have been added.

This difference poses a problem when baking since the cook can't substitute one-half cup of whipped margarine for one-half cup of regular margarine or butter. If the substitution was made, the baked product wouldn't contain enough fat and would contain too much liquid.

"Whipped margarine, a lthough more costly, is convenient whenever you desire a soft, fluffy spread", Mrs. Bobby Stanaland added. "However, choose the regular type of margarine if you want a better buy for your money of it you want to use margarine for baking.



Farmers Plowing Less But Enjoying It More

less and enjoying it more, thanks to a new construction measure being pushed by the Soil Conservation Service.

As a result, there may be less dust in the air you breathe this winter and spring. Or less sediment in your city's water

More moisture conservation, higher profits, more free time, and less soil loss are some of the benefits to farmers.

"All this is possible because of a new farming system called minimum tillage, Clyde W. Graham, state conservationist for SCS, explained, "With minimum tillage, crops are planted without prior land preparation. Weeds are controlled with herbicides. Since the land is not plowed, leaves and stalks

The surface cover is highly effective in preventing erosion, It breaks up the erosive effect of falling raindrops . letting them fall harmlessly onto the surface. The residue also protects the soil from windstorms.

Graham pointed out that wind-blown dust is our state's largest source of air pollution. He also stressed that erosionproduced sediment is our big gest water poliuntant, muddy ing streams and filling natural channels and lakes. Reducing water and air pollution from erosion has vast environmental benefits, he said.

"And think what scattered seed and residues left on the surface do for wildlife, "Graham said, "In some farming areas, wildlife are almost entirely dependent upon crop residues for food and cover need ed for survival during the winer month, Pheasant, doves quail, geese, songbirds, deer, turkey, antelope and other wildlife benefit from such practices.

"In fact, widespread use of minimum tillage in Texas would be a perist boost of our state's wildline."

Graham pointed out that farming operations destroy surface residues. If farmers can substitue herbicides for cultivation in controlling competition, they can reap the many benefits possbile from maintaining crop residues protect young seedlings. The cover also produces better soil tilth and it increases insoak.

He said, however, that many farmers still plow their land over and over again, more out of habit and custom than from actual : eed,

Farmers have reported eliminating as many as 12 tractor trips across a field in one year with minimum til-



lage, " Graham revealed. "However, about six is probably closer to an average. With average farming operations costing at least \$1.50 per scre, cutting out six to 10 trips can mean big savings." On the other hand, the state conservationist said cost of herbicides used from weed con trolcan be expected to offset part of the savings.

"The big reason for using minimum tillage is that it allows a farmer to do a superrior job of conserving his soil

and moisture, "Graham said. "The fact that most farmers report higher profits is also significant. But the advantage from a soil and water conservation standpoint justify use of the system."

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Graham said the Soil Conse-vation Service has published a new booklet "Minimum Tillage in Texas" which describes minimum tillage farming systems. To get a free copy, contact the nearest SCS office or write P.O. Box 648, Temple, Texas 76501.


