## New Texas Trailer Brake Law Is Passed By Legislature

The bill to revise the trailer-brake law, sponsored in the House by State Rep. Renal B. Rosson, passed with only four dissenting votes in the House of Representatives late Thursday. The Senate had already approved the bill earlier. The bill retains safety features while doing away with unnecessary hardships imposed by the original bill, stated Rep. Rosson. The original bill was passed last session as a part of the national Rules of the Road, in an effort to make highway rules and signals uniform throughout the United States. However, a strict interpretation of the massive bill called for brakes and lights on small trailers which in some cases doubled the cost of the trailers themselves. Rosson has been working to change those passages of the bill which caused the unfair hardships, and the vote in the House Thursday culminated those efforts.

The amended bill exempts farm trailers and fertilizer trailers from being required to have lights if they are operated on the highways only during daytime and with visibility at a distance of 1,000 feet or more. It also exempts boat trailers under 4,500 pounds from having fixed electric lights if they are operated under the same circumstances. Boat trailers under 3,000 pounds are not required to have brakes, turn signals, or lights if they are operated during the daytime, with visibility of 1,000 feet or more. Trailers, semi-trailers and pole trailers under 4,500 pounds are not required to have brakes. If the gross weight of the trailer, semi-trailer or pole trailer exceeds 4,500 but is under 15,000 pounds and is not drawn at a speed in excess of 30 miles per hour, it is not required to have brakes. Over those speeds it must have brakes on one axle. National standards for safe operation still must be met by any rig—which means that a towing vehicle must be capable of stopping itself and leaded trailer within 50 feet if traveling at 20 miles per hour, regardless of brake exemption on the trailer. Farm trailers or semi-trailers are exempt from regular registration if they are not used for hire, but have adequate hitches and farm semi-trailers with a gross weight over 4,000 but under 15,000 pounds are exempt if they

are used solely to transport their own seasonally harvested agricultural products and livestock from the place of production to the place of process, market or storage thereof, or farm supplies from the place of loading to the farm; and owners of machinery used solely for the purpose of drilling water wells or construction machinery (not designated for the transportation on public highway) may operate or move such vehicles temporarily upon highways without the payment of the regular registration fees as prescribed law, provided the owner of such farm trailers and semi-trailers and machinery secure a license plate at a fee of \$5.00.

## Brazos River Basin Gets \$75,000. Federal Grant

Congressman Omar Burleson announces approval of a \$75,000.00 Environmental Protection Agency grant to the Brazos River Authority for Water Quality Management Planning. The purpose of the study is to develop a basin-wide water quality management plan for the Brazos Basin and adjoining coastal areas, comprising about one-sixth of the area of Texas. Kent County is one of 68 in the Basin.

The study is to be financed half by State and local funds and half by this Federal grant, under the Federal Water Pollution Control Act. The desirability of having an effective plan throughout the basin is fully realized by all concerned. The urgency of developing such a plan has been emphasized by Federal regulations requiring that sewage systems built with Federal assistance in the future most

be consistent with basin-wide quality management plans; if such basin-wide plans are not in existence, the proposed sewage treatment facilities will not be eligible for Federal grants to assist in paying construction costs. Congressman Burleson expressed gratification at the approval of the grant, having made personal contacts with the EPA Administrator in behalf of the Brazos River Authority request.

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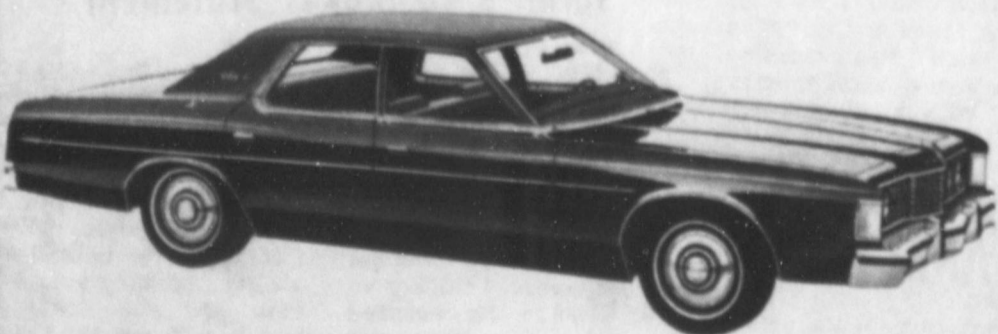

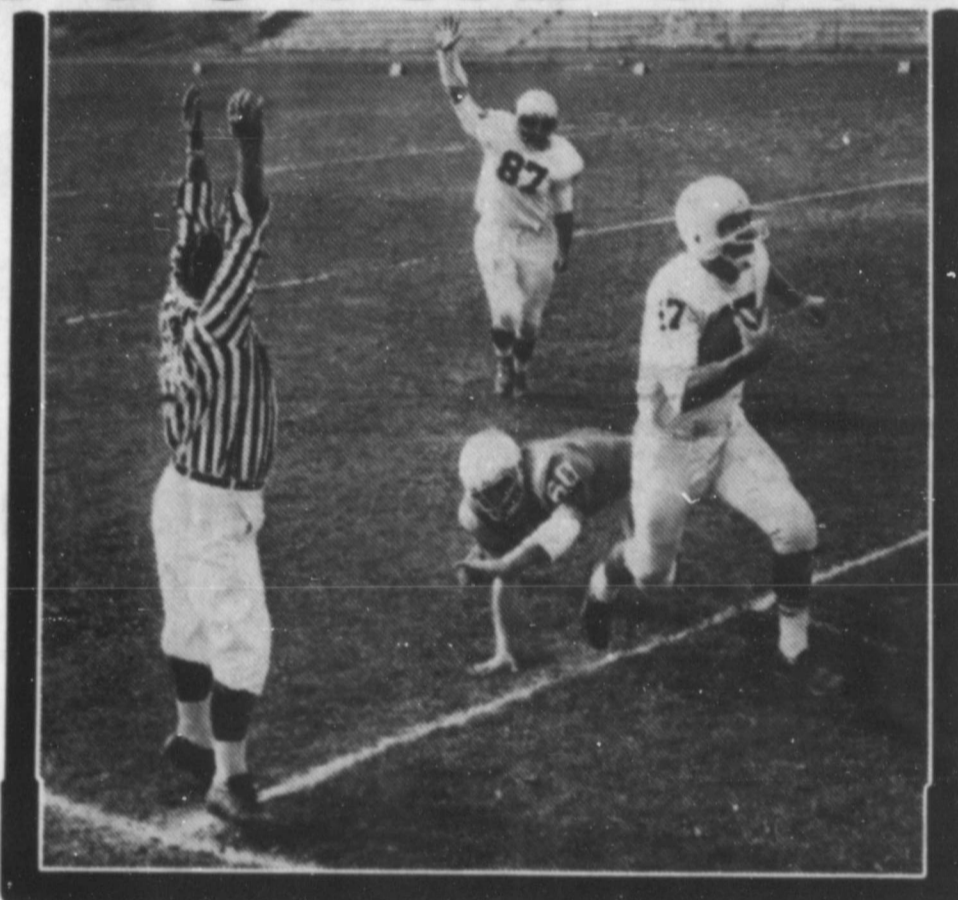

Pat Richards' Recipes



**DUTCH BABIES WITH PINEAPPLE CHUNKS**  
 2 eggs  
 1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 cup milk  
 2 tablespoons melted shortening  
 1 (1 lb. 4 1/2 oz.) can pineapple chunks  
 1/4 cup brown sugar (packed)  
 2 tablespoons butter or margarine

Combine eggs, flour, salt, milk and shortening and beat with rotary beater until smooth. Pour into 4 well-greased 8-inch baking dishes. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) for 15 minutes. Reduce temperature to moderate (350° F.) and bake for 10 to 15 minutes longer, until browned and puffed in center of dishes. While Dutch Babies are baking, prepare pineapple chunks. Drain syrup into saucepan and boil rapidly until reduced to about 1/2 cup. Add sugar, butter, and stir until sugar is dissolved. Add pineapple chunks, and simmer about 10 minutes, until nicely glazed. Serve warm, spooning into hot Dutch Babies. Makes 4 servings.

One large "pancake" may be baked in a 9-inch pie plate instead of in individual dishes. Bake 20 minutes at 400° F., then 10 to 15 minutes at 350°. Fill with pineapple, cut into wedges to serve.

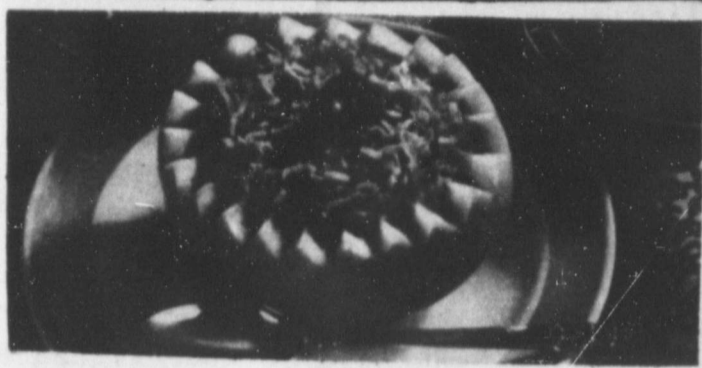
## Guessers Are Upset By Game Upsets

### Something Different

#### Grapefruit Ambrosia

Coconut flecks the top of this gala, hot grapefruit--  
 2 med. grapefruit  
 3 Tbsp. brown sugar  
 4 tsp. rum flavoring  
 4 tsp. butter or margarine

#### for Brunch

1/4 c. flaked coconut  
 Halve grapefruit, making zigzag edge. With knife, cut around each section to loosen from membrane. Sprinkle each half with about 2 teaspoons of the brown sugar and 1 teaspoon rum flavoring. Dot with butter or margarine; sprinkle on coconut. Bake in 400° F. oven for 20 minutes. Garnish with maraschino cherries, if desired. Make 4 servings.

If you are trying to shed those few extra pounds you picked up during the summer months, don't skip breakfast. Cut down on the total number of calories you have each day, but don't cut out breakfast. It has been about 12 hours since dinner and you need protein and carbohydrates at breakfast time to keep blood sugar at proper levels to avoid that mid-morning slump. Eating breakfast will also help keep you from getting hungry in the middle of the morning and indulging in snack foods which may be high in calories but low in important nutrients you need.

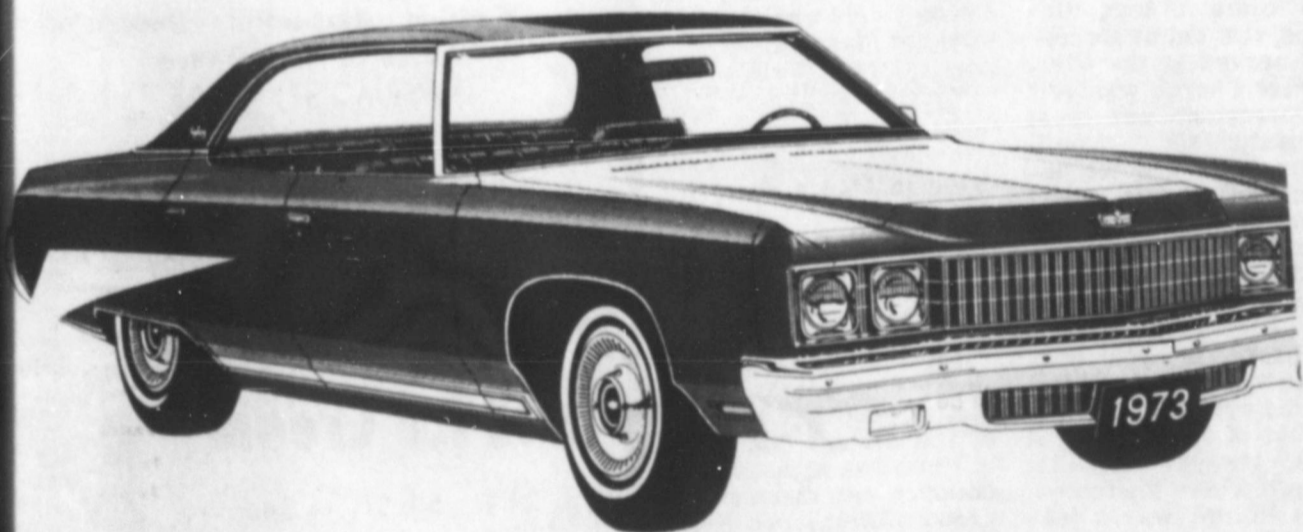

The board voted unanimously Tuesday to join the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in hiring two trappers for the remainder of the current fiscal year at a cost to the county not to exceed \$13,000.

Chairman Warren Dorn told his fellow supervisors the need for county trappers has grown acute since the county withdrew from a federal trapping program in July 1971 because of a shortage of funds.

"Many sheep raisers in the Antelope Valley are losing 250 to 300 lambs each season," Dorn said. "Cattle and poultry producers also are suffering heavy losses and many pets are being destroyed in toothill areas."

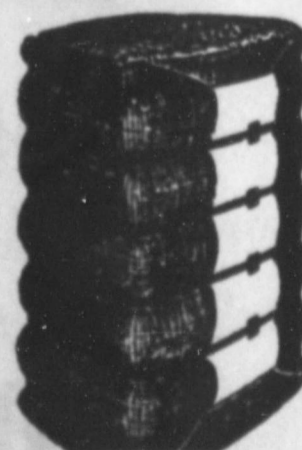
