## Three Accidents In Kent County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Kent County during the month of September, according to Sergeant Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in four persons killed and no persons injured.

The rural traffic summary for this county during the first nine months of 1972 shows a total of six accidents resulting in no persons killed and four persons injured.

Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety shows a total in September, 1972 of 561 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 335 persons injured as compared to the same month in 1971 with 499 accidents resulting in 33 persons killed and 268 persons injured in 1972 at the same period of time.

The Highway Patrol supervisor reminds you that speed is one of the main factors in accidents on the highway. Slow down a little and live a lot. Drive friendly the Texas way!

The 21 deaths for the month of September, 1972 occurred in the following counties: Oldham, Knox, Lamb, Wise, Yoakum and Young, two each; Childress, Deaf Smith, Hartley, Potter, Randall, Wheeler, Palo Pinto, Terry and Wichita, one each.

## Jaybirds Defeat The Roby Lions

The Jayton Jaybirds plastered a 15-0 defeat on the Roby Lions here Friday night, to post three consecutive wins in the district chase.

The first half was a team being able to score, but in the third period Parker Kidd went in from the three then Brad Dibrell ran the two point play to give them an 8 point lead on the score board.

Coming back again in the same period, Tommy Johnson took a Dibrell pass 17 yards for a score, and this time Dibrell kicked the extra point to set the score at 15.

Twice the Jaybirds carried the ball into the end zone, but the plays were neutralized because of infractions of the rules.

The Birds led 18-14 in first downs, and 224 to 87 in yards gained rushing. The Jaybirds completed 6 to 17 passes for 77 yards, while the visitors completed 12 of 25 for 164 yards in the air. The Birds punted 5 times for 43 yards average, which is outstanding, and Roby did well with 4 for 35 yards average.

## Fabric Hints

Simply using a small ruler can help the shopper determine several important characteristics about a knit fabric.

The knit's stability is important. Moderately stretchy and very stretchy knits require more care in construction, including scrupulous stay-stitching where the sewer doesn't want the seams to stretch.

Stability can be determined by gripping the knit fabric and ruler in your left hand, four inches from the raw edge. Next, stretch the fabric toward the right and measure how much it stretches. If the stretch is no more than half an inch, the fabric is stable; up to 1 1/4 inches means it's moderately stretchy; and more than 1 1/4 inches means the fabric is very stretchy. After determining the stability in this way, check the back of the pattern envelope to see if the fabric's stretchiness is suitable for the style chosen. In addition to determining the knit's stability, the shopper can check its recovery ability as well. After stretching the knit, let it go with your right hand. If it springs back to its original shape immediately, it has good recovery ability and won't "grow" during construction. If it doesn't snap back right away, then special care in sewing and handling will be necessary. Also, shrinkage is easily converted from per cent to inches per yard with the ruler. By knowing the shrinkage, the purchaser can decide whether to allow additional yardage for shrinkage in washable knits, the agent concluded.

## Open Dated Foods Cause Confusion

Use of open dates on food items is growing daily, but several studies say consumers find them confusing.

Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, reported on the survey and explained four types of open dating this week.

"Results of several studies by the Economic Research Service indicate that consumers definitely favor open dating, but are confused about what the dates mean."

"This is because currently there are at least four different types of dates in use, and each has its own special meaning."

"Pack" date tells when the food was manufactured or packaged.

"Display" date tells when an item was placed on the supermarket shelf.

"Pull" date is the last day a retail store should offer the food for sale--provided it has been stored and handled properly.

"It's not the last day it can be eaten without loss of quality, however. To allow for reasonable amount of home storage, the pull date should be considerably earlier than the end of shelf life," the specialist added.

"Expiration" date is the last day of food is acceptable for intended use. After expiration, the item is expected to begin showing a significant loss of quality, even though it still may be safe for use.

Mrs. Clyatt termed the two latter types the most useful, noting they are "predictive" of freshness. They don't guarantee freshness, though, she said, stressing importance of temperature and product handling from processor to supermarket to dinner table.

"The main idea behind food dating is delivery of food to consumers as fresh as possible. Open dating should encourage good handling and refrigeration practices."

In addition it should encourage rotation of food stock on a first-in, first-out basis and help supermarkets abide by pull dates. And it will encourage consumers to use food before it is too old, she said.

Turning to recent attempt at legislation on open dating, Mrs. Clyatt said federal legislation is pending in both houses of Congress.

"This would require an open or uncodded pull date on all perishable and semi-perishable food."

"The Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, acting through the Food and Drug Administration, would regulate methods of determining the maximum time allowed--under proper storage conditions--from packaging to the last day of retail sale."

"It is likely manufacturers would be able to set their own time limits, though, under the eye of the government," she predicted.

Although not included in the legislation, it would be helpful if the pull date were explained on the label.

"It would be useful also if the label would explain under what conditions the food should be stored at home and how long it should maintain its quality," she recommended.

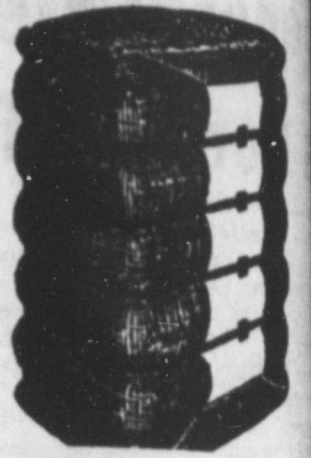

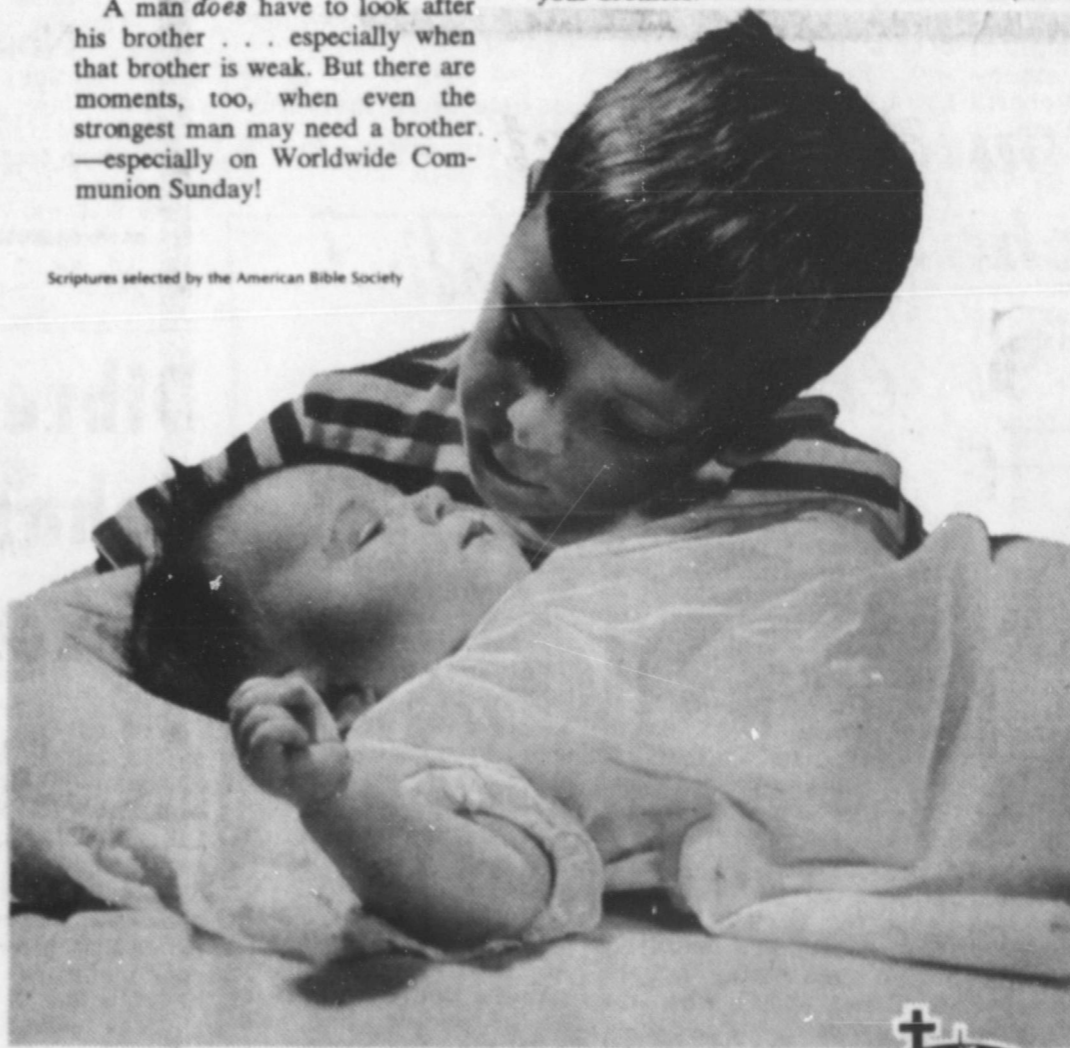

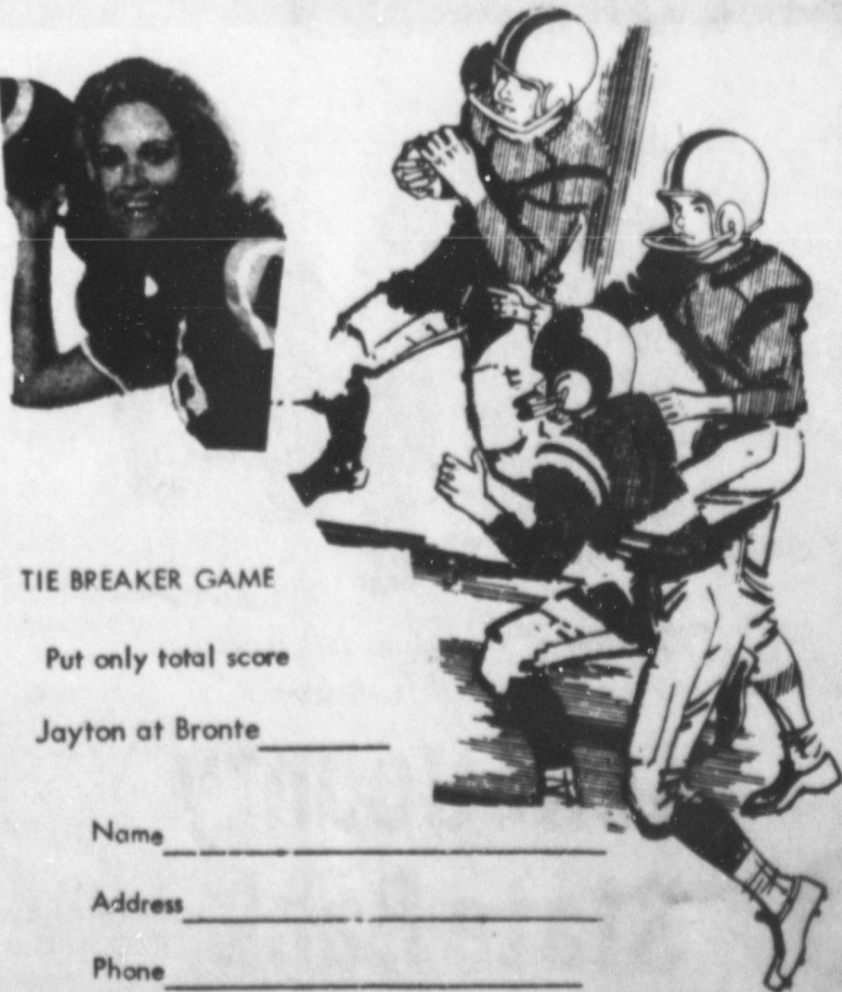

## Make Your Own Cereal

1/4 c. safflower or corn oil, 1/3 c. honey, 2 c. uncooked oats, 1/2 c. wheat germ, 1/4 c. sesame seeds, 1 pkg of shredded coconut, 1/4 c. nuts, 1/2 c. raisins.

Mix above ingredients and spread on a sheet. Bake about 15 minutes at 350 F., or golden. Store in a coffee can, it keeps definitely.

## Prune Muffins

2 c. sifted all-purpose flour, 3 tsp baking powder, 1/2 tsp salt, 3 Tsp. sugar, 1/4 c. soft shortening, 1 egg, 1 c. milk, 1/2 c. prunes, chopped, cooked.

Sift dry ingredients together. Cut in shortening. Beat milk and egg to gether. Add to mixture, stirring enough to mix. Do not beat. Lumps disappear during baking. Add 1/2 c. cooked prunes. Greased muffins tin full. Bake about 25 minutes.

WHOLE-WHEAT OR GRAHAM MUFFINS: Substitute 3/4 c. sifted whole-wheat graham flour for white flour. Increase to 3/4 teaspoon.
