The Dickens County Electric Cooperative, Inc. has filed with the Federal Government a Compliance Assurance in which it assures the Rural Electrification Administration that it will comply fully with all requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Agriculture issued thereunder to the end that no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the conduct of its program and the operation of its facilities. Under this Assurance, this organization is committeed not to discriminate against any person on the ground or race, color or national origin in its policies and practices relating to applications for service or any other policies and practices relating to treatment of beneficiaries and participants including rates, conditions and extension of service, use of any of its facilities, attendance at and

participation in any meetings of beneficiaries and participants of the exercise of any rights of such beneficiaries and participants in the conduct of the operations of this organization.

Any person who believes himself, or any specific class of individuals, to be subjected by this organization to discrimination prohibited by Title VI of the Act and the kules and Regulations issued thereunder may, by himself or a representative, file with the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250, or the Rural Electrification Administration, Washington, D. C. 20250, or this organization, or all, a written complaint. Such complaint must be filed not later than 90 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of complainants will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purpose of the Rules and Regulations.



This was such an obvious overcharge the Idaho Bar Association rescinded its fixed fee rule for probate cases and now allows lawyers to charge an hourly fee (Fixed fee systems are under court attack and, hopefully, may soon be banned.)

One University of Idaho Law School professor has estimated the cost of settling a \$50,000 estate under the new system at, perhaps, \$250. When costs in Idaho system are compared with costs in other states, the contrast is eyeopening.

To settle a \$100,000 estate, the Idaho cost is likely to be less than \$1,000. But in Michigan, for example, the cost would be \$4800 under that state's fixed-fee system, plus an additional \$2,000 if the attorney were also the executor!

Snow or No. It's Always "White Christmas"

The traditional image of an outdoor Christmas scene brings to mind, for most of us, the brilliance of sun-light on snow-covered fields and hills. But this is an idea that originated in the northern parts of Europe and America-and of course it doesn't really apply to the climate in many parts of our country.

In southern California, or instance, roses are dooming at Christmas-indeed, we all know this if only because of the famous New Year's "Rose Bowl" football game. And in Flor-ida, at Christmas time, there's apt to be a hot sun peaming down on sand.

Christmas Dinners in

The Good Old Days How many people today could manage such a menu as this one? Here it is, right out of the diary of a Dixie plantation owner:

"We had for dinner oyster soup, besides boiled mutton, ham, boned turkey, wild ducks, partridges, plum pudding, sauterne, burgun-dy, sherry, and Madeira." And what gourmet cook would care to cope with this one? It was served to hearty-eating miners in the Rockies in 1858. After oys-ters and pork, which were ters and pork, which were conventional "openers," the menu went on to elk, ante-lope, buffalo "smothered" and grizzly bear a la mode. In addition, there was Black Mountain squirrel, prairie dog, and mountain rats — followed with swans, cranes, and quail — the whole lot accompanied by wines.

for gift-giving.



Until the 18th Century they were made primarlly from tallow or beeswax. The latter was preferred, as an emblem of Mary's purity, for wax is the product of virgin bees. Many persons believed that Many persons believed that bees came from heaven, and it was not unusual for religious institutions to keep swarms of them. According to an early writer, the wax represented Christ's body; the wick, His soul; and the flame His divine nature.

The religious symbolism of the candle grew through the centuries after early Christians, huddled in the damp chill catacombs of Rome, used lighted candles as a source of comfort.

Naturally, the people

a'lula are very proud of heir Aramaic language and take pains to keep it alive and flourishing. Many fam-ilies speak only Aramaic to their children until the youngsters are five years old and must go to school, where they learn Arabic, the national language.

Outside Syria, Aramaic is spoken at Urmia, in Turkey by the Chaldean Catholics of Bartelle in northern Iraq ... and by the villagers of Malabar in southwestern India. And Aramaic is still used in the liturgy of certain churches which began in the Middle East, such as the Marionites and Syrian Orthodox groups.
