#### The Tariff Bill

President Nixon has asked Congress to enact a new trade bill giving him wide authority to raise or lower tariffs and other trade barriers. The President says the need is urgent, desirous that U.S. negotiators have such authority for trade negotiations scheduled this year.

Nixon says the main purpose of the "Trade Reform Act" is to expand trade and prosperity for this country as well as its trading pardners. But there is no hiding the fact that higher tariffs and new or stricter quotas may be needed in some areas to eliminate the U.S. deficit if major concessions are not forthcoming from U.S. trading pardners, specifically Japan and Canada.

Since the 1930's and President Franklin Roosevelt's policy of lower tariffs, the general trend has been reduced barriers and greater international trade; as a Republican, Mr. Nixon is not unaware of history's verdict on the Smoot-Hawley traiff bill of 1930, during another G.O.P. Administration. That tariff-hiking bill helped produce grim economic and political consequences in many countries.

#### The Weicker Boomlet

Some who would cleanse the temple in the Republican Party are now releasing trial balloons in behalf of Senator Lowell Weicker of Connecticut. The idea seems to be that the Watergate scandal will do to the Nixon Administration image what the Vietnam war did to the Lyndon Johnson image, and that a reform candidate will be needed by the Republican Party in 1976.

Senator Weicker, of course, is a member of the committee looking into the Watergate fiasco. Committee investigations on Capitol Hill often make national figures of obscure Senators; this Weicker undoubtedly knows and he has thus far immensely pleased his own party's liberal wing and Democrats, by attacking President Nixon's staff and particularly Bob Halderman.

Chances are against Weicker's making it so big, however; even after the late Estes Kefauver won national acclaim in his investigation of crime in the fifties, he failed to get his party's nomination. Of course, he was handim the South. Weigh capped also, from Connecticut. (Weicker also was born in France, a constitutional obstacle he may not be able to overcome.)

Whether idealists like to admit it or not, potential candidates from big states have an immense advantage in the nomination process. Similarly, as the late Harry Truman blocked Kefauver's nomination, President Nixon could very likely block Weicker's.

#### Amnesty Or Clemency?

Writing in United States Naval Institute Proceedings (April issue), Roy L. Beavers sheds welcome light on the question of amnesty or clemency for draft dodgers who fled this country to evade military service during the Vietnam

Beavers points out that draft dodgers abroad are, in some cases, motivated by a political goal of forcing the President and the country to admit the Vietnam war was wrong and that they, therefore, were right. That explains a press conference a group recently held in Canada, in which they rejected a proposal by Senator Bob Taft of Ohio (and others) that they be allowed to return if they agree to serve the nation in some capacity for three years.

Rightly, President Nixon refused to indulge in self-recrimination of the nation, which is what the Communists seek, and refuses to grant an amnesty which totally absolves draft dodgers and condemns the nation. The truth is that the draft dodgers are wrong regardless of whether the Vietnam war was a mistake or not. They disobeyed the law of the land and fled the country to avoid the legal consequences-punishment. Those who went to jail in behalf of their moral convictions were willing to pary the price for breaking the law of the land and are far more deserving.







Unfortunately, many persons who have the disease are

not really aware of it. Many cases may progress to the point where the patient requires surgery. However, when diagnosed and treated early enough, it is often possible to arrest the condition. About

85 to 90 percent of patients can be treated medically, without the need of surgery. Therefore, anyone who develops a rectal fistula, abscess, diarrhea or bleeding, or believes he may have hemorrhoids, should see a specialist. We have found that such symptoms may be a warning that ulcerative colitis is present or will develop a year or

Medications that have been developed in recent years are effective and more convenient for patients than older methods of treatment. Chief among these are the steroids, partic-

ularly hydrocortisone, which can be administered orally, by injection, or rectally administered as an enema or 1 prefer hydrocortisone

medications that are not taken by mouth. A new preparation which has become available to physicians is called Cortifoam, an aerosol foam. It is particularly good for early cases and those in which the left side of the colon is affected. The foam is easy and convenient for the patient to use; it is also safer because it does not appear to have the side-effects of some of the drugs taken by mouth. In addition to medication, proper diet is essential.

The patient may experience unexpected flare-ups of the disease, and sometimes periods of remission which may last a number of years. A patient's cooperation is essential. He must, in effect, help his physician in order to help himself.

The important thing to remember is that ulcerative colitis can be treated and that it should be treated, as
