Parent To Get Education Grant

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congressman Omar Burleson announced today a \$10,771.25 grant of Education grant to the State of Texas for 77 children in Kent County, age 5 and under, all of whom are in low income families.

Secondary Education Act which provides special programs for educationally disadvantaged children. These funds will provide services for children residing in low income areas who have need for special educational assistance in order that their level of educational attainment may be raised to that appropriate for children of their age.

The Future Homemakers of America organization is sponsored by Homemaking Education, the Texas Education Agency with Mrs. Elizabeth F. Smith as director and Mrs. Betty Romans serving as State Advisor.

The area FHA meeting was held April 13 and 14 in Odessa. Tresa Smith, Jan Luna, Paula Mayer, and Minette Geeslin were the members who attended. Lauda Geeslin, one of our chapter parents, went as a sponsor.

Torreyana Oil Co. has completed a Noodle Creek oil discovery at No. 1 Henry Grice, re-entry wildcat 2 1/4 miles southwest of Jayton in Kent County.

Perforations from 3,887 - 3,890 feet entailed to pump 135 barrels of oil plus 29 barrels of water in 24 hours. The section was stimulated with 500 gallons of acid.

Location is 1,880 feet from south and 608 feet from west lines of Section 70, Block 98, H&TC survey. It is 2 1/2 miles east of the West Jayton (Strawn) field.

Other highlights of the convention include a talk by Tony Martin, Belton, World's Yo Champion as well as singing and inspirational speaker, Frederick McClure, State FFA President, San Augustine will present an original Flag Ceremony at the Friday morning session. The business of the Texas Association will be conducted at the House of Delegates session on Saturday evening.

241 Person Eat In The Jayton Lunch Room Each Day

In the month of April the Jayton school lunchroom served a total of 3455 meals, which averaged 216 student meals a day. For adults, 405 meals were served, at an average of 25.

Total lunchroom expenses were \$4,728.69, with revenue of \$5,379.49. Expenses included food purchases 3,234.51, labor 1,121.18, other expenses 120.17, and special milk program 222.53. The receipts included sale of adult lunches 211.30, student lunches 1,063.63, state reimbursement 1,131.56 and a transfer from local maintenance of \$3,000.00.

Elementary school had 130, with kindergarten showing 13, first grade 12, second grade 24, third 13, fourth 19, fifth 19 and sixth 30. High and junior high had an enrollment of 143. This showed 21 in the seventh grade, eighth 27, ninth 29, tenth 22, eleventh 28, and the 12th grade 17.

West Texas Postmaster Predicts Serious Problems For The Postal Service

Here in the West Texas area, the postal service is usually very good, and the people have little to fuss about. Local service is good, the clerks are friendly, and we just about always get immediate delivery on in-town mail.

UPI check of in-town mail, only 16 percent of it was delivered across town within 24 hours. This is really room to gripe.

Also the area service is usually good. Mail from one sectional center to a nearby center is almost always made overnight, like between the Abilene and the Lubbock Centers. But when you get outside the local area the service is not so good. Mail to Houston, Corpus Christi, or Oklahoma City sometimes may go overnight, and at other times may take three or four days. Just why this is, this writer has no idea. Probably postal officials would like to know too.

When the Congress created the Postal Service, rather than the Post Office Department, and got it out from under the Congress, one of the main purposes was to get it out of politics. Yet one West Texas postmaster, recently told this publisher that the politics now are even worse than they were in the past. The new organization took the postal appointments out of the hands of the Congressmen, but the postmaster says, it has created an even worse political situation. He says the sectional postmasters, like the ones at Lubbock and Abilene, now have more authority than the Dallas regional office used to have and it gives the Sectional Center Postmaster all kinds of political powers, and he says they are using them, too.

Also, the postal reorganization was supposed to make the postal service like a business, and get the delivery of the mail on a more business like basis, but our unnamed postmaster says the efficiency of the delivery of the mail now, is even worse than it was. He says local offices, and the mail rooms in the centers have had their help cut down to the bone, and this is the thing that is slowing down the delivery of the mail. But, he says the postal offices are full with high salaried "brass" who do very little but go by periodically and pick up their checks. "There are too many Chiefs and not enough Indians" he says.

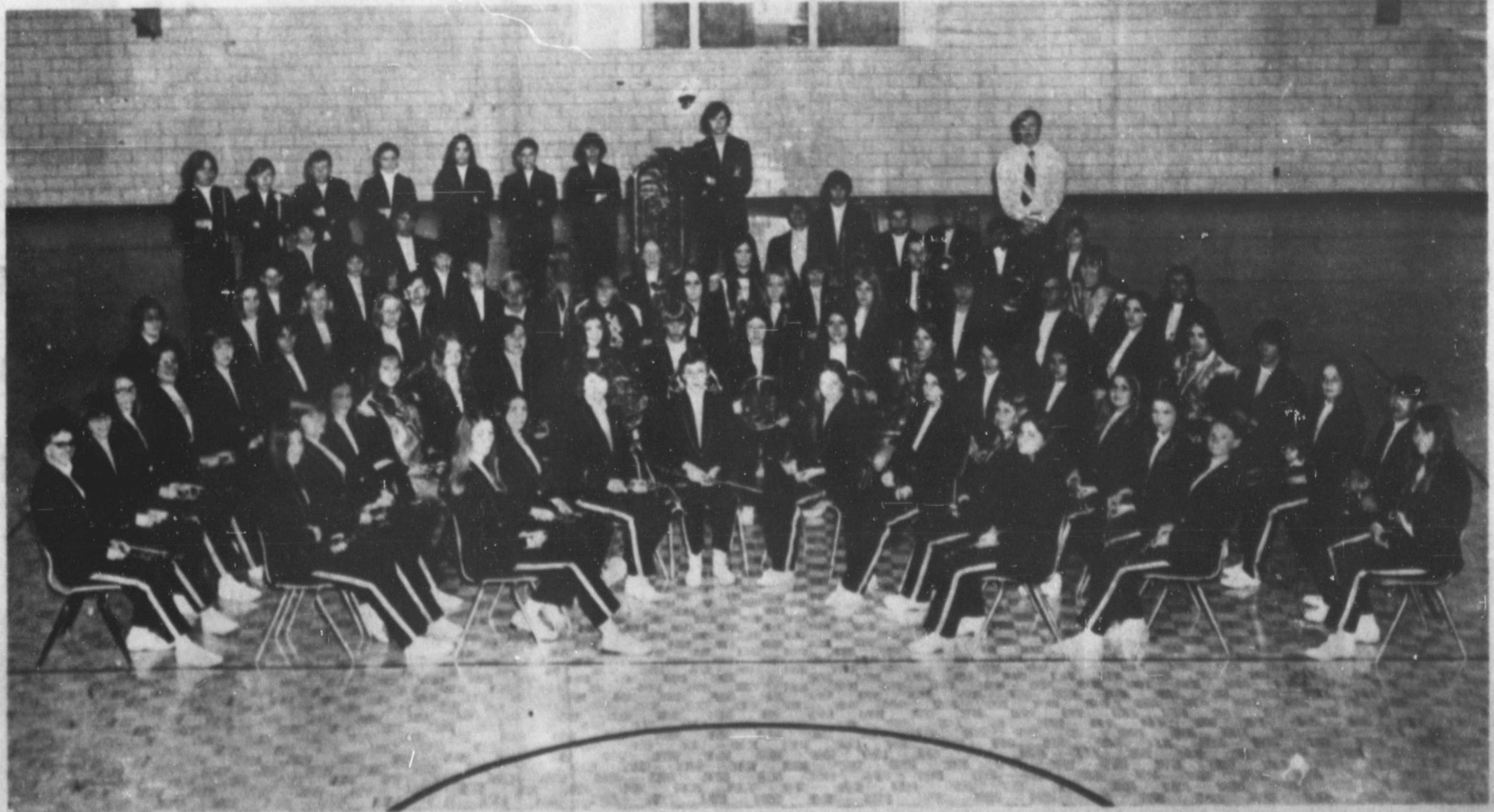

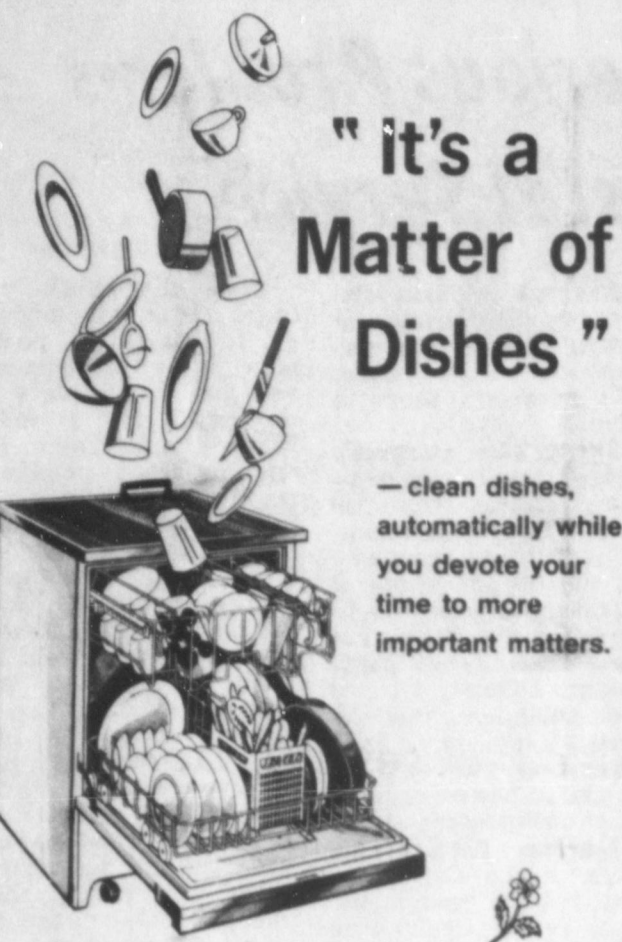

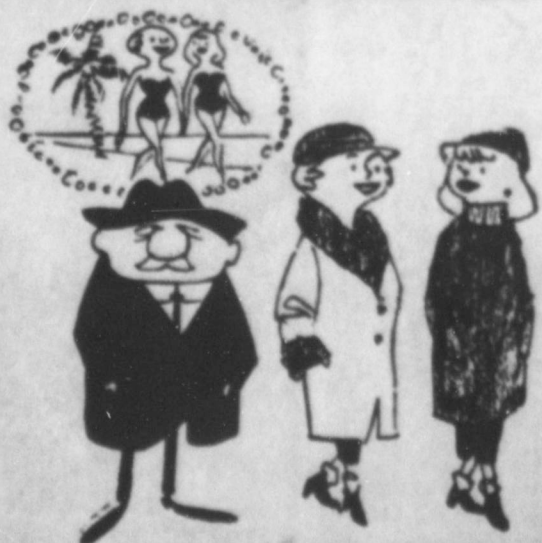

Fruited Cottage Cheese Ring

envelope unflavored gelatin
 1/4 cup water
 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 Dash pepper
 1 cup whipping cream
 2 cups cream-style cottage cheese
 3 cups mixed fresh fruit

Soften gelatin in water.

In saucepan, combine the softened gelatin, the lemon juice, salt, and pepper; heat till gelatin dissolves. Cool to room temperature. Whip cream; combine with cottage cheese and gelatin mixture. Pour into 5-cup ring mold. Chill till set. Unmold onto serving plate; fill center with fresh fruit. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

WATCH FOR POISON IVY

Numerous cases of oak bud poisoning are being confirmed in many parts of Texas, and livestock owners should be on the alert for this problem, says County Extension Agent M. A. Geeslin.

The Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at College Station has confirmed epidemics of the disease in cattle, and warned that cases are expected to continue for the next month, he added.

The problem also is known in some areas as sand shin oak poisoning. The county agent emphasized that oak buds or leaves contain tannins which damage the kidneys and other organs, producing frequent passage of urine that is red in some cases.

Additionally, the affected animals may be constipated at first, followed by diarrhea. They develop a rough coat of

hair, lose weight and may die in from one to 10 days. Swelling may appear in lower parts of the body and a brownish nasal exudate is often seen.

When new growth appears in the spring, the oak buds are both palatable and toxic. Oak bud poisoning can be diagnosed if the cattle have the symptoms outlined and if owners submit a blood sample from sick animals to the Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory. Local veterinarians should be called, however, to differentiate between oak bud poisoning and other similar diseases.

A good supplementary feed will help reduce losses, and another preventive measure is to move cattle out of pastures where shin oak is growing, says Geeslin.

H. D. Council Has Meeting

In the absence of the secretary, Mrs. Jim Wyatt, Mrs. Turner reported the last meeting of council.

KENT ACCIDENTS CHECKED IN APRIL

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Kent County during the month of April, according to Sergeant Frank Jircek, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of

1973 shows a total of two accidents resulting in no persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety, Region #5, for April, 1973 shows a total of 544 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 283 persons injured as compared to April, 1972, with 445 accidents resulting in 44 persons killed and 232 persons injured. This was 99 more accidents, 20 less fatalities and 51 more injuries in 1973 at the same period of time.

The veteran officer reminds you that the accident rate has increased about 20% in the 60 counties of Region #5. We have more than seven million licensed drivers on Texas Highways. Summer vacation time is approaching and more people will be using the roads.

The 24 traffic deaths for the month of April, 1973 occurred in the following counties: Crosby, Hockley, Lubbock, Lynn and Sherman, two each, and Clay, Floyd, Garza, Gray, Hartley, Oldham, Palo Pinto, Parker, Potter, Randall, Terry, Wichita, Wise and Wheeler, one each.

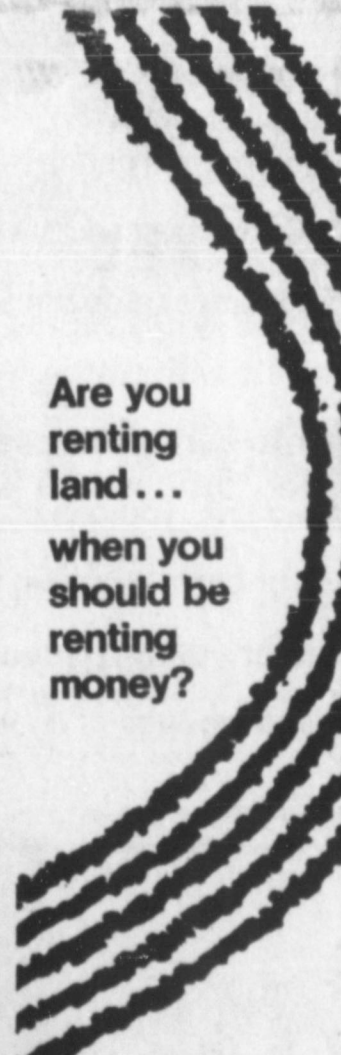

tutional Convention is to everyone in the state, I think it's of utmost importance that the legislature organize itself to be ready to take the considerations of the Constitutional Revision Commission and proceed intelligently and expeditiously.

LET'S DO IT the simple way, say some folks about the current question on the property tax question. They want to abolish property taxes and raise the sales tax to cover the budget. Tell you why that isn't as simple as it sounds -- labor, liberals, and big city representation are opposed to that idea --their point is the unfairness to the poor if the sales tax is increased.

DRUG ABUSE AND CAPITAL PUNISHMENT came up this week and we voted for them, even though neither was satisfactory. Voting "aye" though is the method for us to get the legislation across the hall for the Senate to consider, so that the bill can finally go to a conference committee and there hopefully it will be accepted by the House. As it stands now though, the capital punishment bill will deter crime only if Justice is mixed with Swiftneess. It will also be dependent on our having a strong penal code and streamlining our courts.

PROFILE: Representative Kay Bailey from Houston. She's one of the five women in the House and the first Republican woman in the House. She graduated from the University of Texas Law School in 1967 and served as the first woman news reporter for television in Houston--she was political correspondent for KPRC. Her "pet project" this session was HB 480, which set up a mass transit Authority for the Houston area. The MTA will eventually get some kind of mass transit coordinated and implemented for Houston.

HERE'S HOW IT IS the last 30 days of the session. With time running out, everyone is working intensely to complete his legislative program. Crusty veterans are watching so that some bad bills don't slip though due to decreased vigilance; and everybody is being reminded by one another that that old virtue Patience is a much-needed addition to almost every transaction.

SHORT 'N SWEET:* The House Education Committee passed a bill this week making it possible for persons over 65 to attend college with no tuition charge. College officials must agree and have the space. *I like the idea of those old Town Hall meetings and so suggested to the Constitutional Revision Commission that the new constitution should contain requirements for a dozen or more meetings a year where state legislators could go to different parts of the state and sit as a listening post. *400 industrialists at the 5th Annual Governor's Conference on

Industrial Expansion heard a panel discussion on Training for Industry. Both national and international industry are looking for a place to land in the Southwest, and it's got to be a place with a strong labor market and an industry start-up program. Texas doesn't have it and we need to get it.

SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENTS have been telling me they think the public school financing bill (HB 946 sponsored by Kublak) is the best step forward we've had since 1949. HB 946 is complicated but basically what it would do is offer all school children the opportunity for an equitable education. And it provides for choice of courses leading to professional employment or college training after high school.
