The first week in May of 1949 a handful of peace officers gathered at the Horace Wood Ranch in Kent County, between Clairemont and Spur, to enjoy what is now referred to as the Rattle Snake Rodeo. After 26 years the Caprock Peace Officers' Association has grown to the point it engulfs all of West Texas.

Clairemont, once the county seat of Kent County, located on Highway 70 and 380 just 16 miles to the southwest of Jayton, offers an ideal location for this event each year. Ample facilities are available and the Commissioners court of Kent Co. has gone to considerable work and expense to assure this 26th annual affair the best yet, a spokesman said this week.

President of the association from the beginning, Cecil Fox, a retired game warden from Spur will be on hand again this year to greet all the peace officers as they come in.

Fox, a well known authority on rattle snakes reports he has captured over 100 snakes to present ideal targets for the sharp shooters. Fox will give demonstrations on milking the live rattlers.

The shooters are divided into ten groups, to match the various branches of law enforcement officers against each other, with one group reserved for visitors.

Winners of the target shooting will compete in the rattle snake rodeo, shooting at the live rattlers, and judged.

A hit in the head scores 10 points. A hit in the body scores 5 points. Prizes will be awarded to the winners of each division with a grand prize to be the best overall score, a pair of Justin Boots, donated by the boot manufacturer.

The program begins this year with the registration at 9 a. m.

Under the direction of Fred Arrington, registration will be \$3.00 and this includes dues to the association, and a delicious barbeque lunch and all the trimmings catered by Jackson service of Post.

Main address will be by Bob Gallagher, former highway patrolman, former Kent County Sheriff, and former Kent Co. Judge, now head of the Council of Governments of Abilene.

Master of Ceremonies will be Bob Walker, Sheriff of King County.

Shooting judge will be Tom Templeton of Lubbock.

The rattle snake shoot is scheduled to begin at 2 p. m. followed by the presentation of awards at about 3 by the president Cecil Fox.

Drawings will be held throughout the day for the valuable gifts.

Directors of the Caprock officers are made up of Sheriff's and deputies from counties along the rim of the caprock.

## Book Review

By Sallie Hilton  
**BURR** by Gore Vidal  
 Aaron Burr (1756-1836) a hero of the American Revolution, served as vice president under Thomas Jefferson, took the life of Alexander Hamilton in a duel, and was tried for treason when Jefferson accused him of plotting to make an empire of his own in the western territory.

This novel is in the form of a memoir, told in part by Burr at the end of his long life and partly by a young journalist in whom Burr confides.

Though the memoir, itself and the young journalist are fictional, the facts are actual.

Burr is a character of great fascination, a dark shadow over the early nation, who lived out his long life partly as a suspected traitor, and partly as one of the most heroic and colorful of the founding fathers—a character as complex and ambiguous as America itself.

BURR is the rarest of books—a readable historical novel, which at the same time recreates with accuracy and the originality of a major historical imagination the most significant years of the history of America.

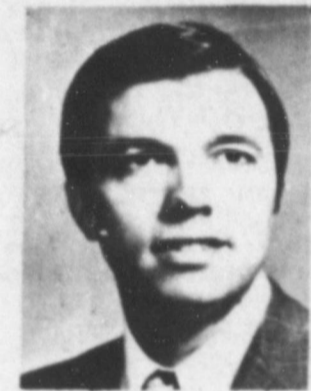

## Patrol Checks One Accident

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one fatal accident on Kent County highways during the month of March, according to Sgt. Frank Chick highway patrol supervisor for this area. There were no injuries or fatalities from this accident.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first 3 months of the year shows a total of 29 accidents, with 12 persons killed and 12 persons injured. The rural traffic summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock region shows a total of 395 accidents, resulting in 23 persons killed and 172 injured. At this time in 1973 there were 468 accidents resulting in 19 deaths and 263 injuries. This was 73 less accidents, 4 more killed, and 91 less injured in 1974 than at the same time last year.

The 23 traffic deaths for March occurred in the following counties: 5 in Lubbock, 4 in Hale, 2 each in Parker and Wichita, and one each in Deaf Smith, Foard, Gray, Hutchinson, Randall, Wheeler, Bailey, Palo Pinto, Terry and Young Counties.

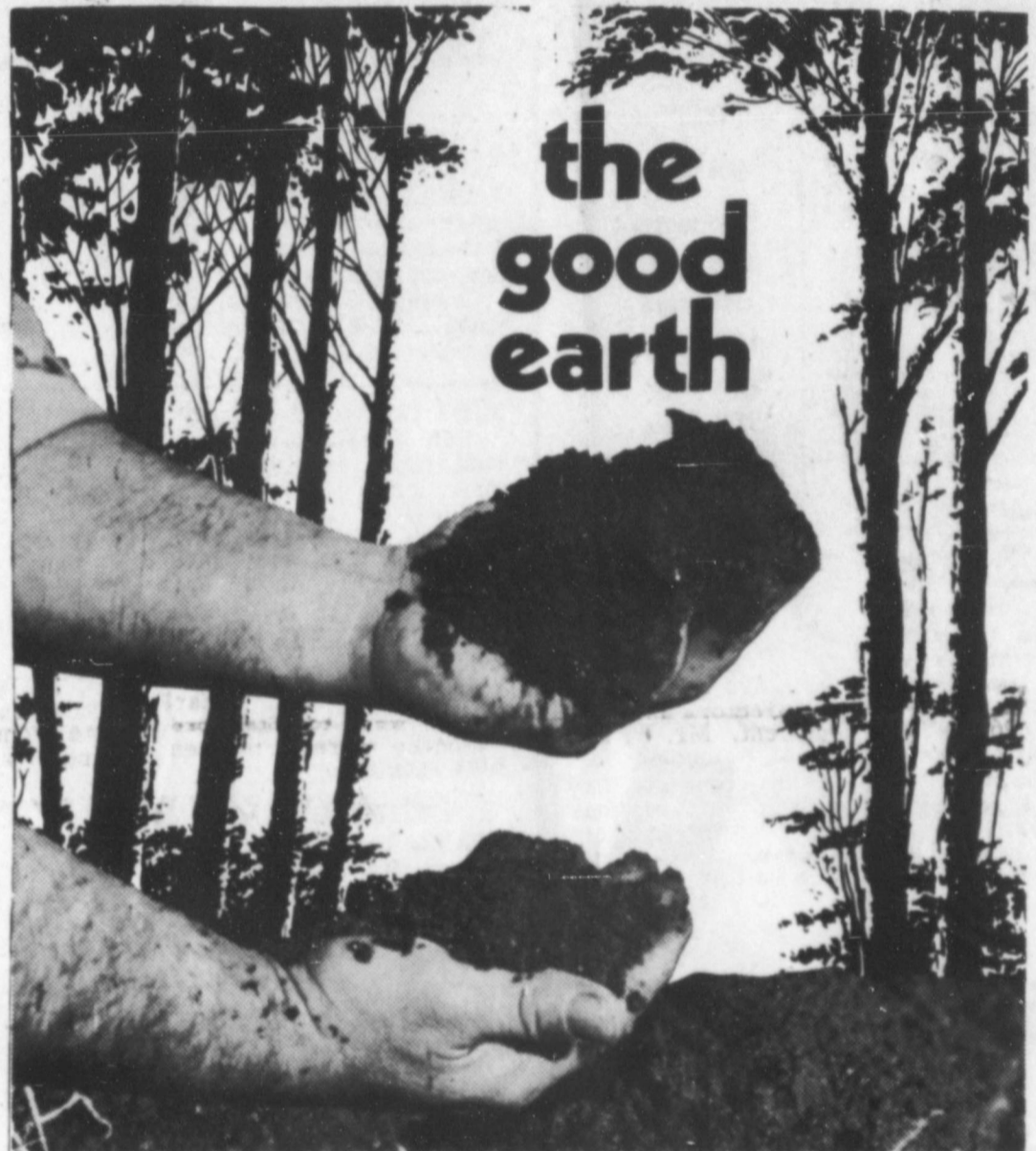

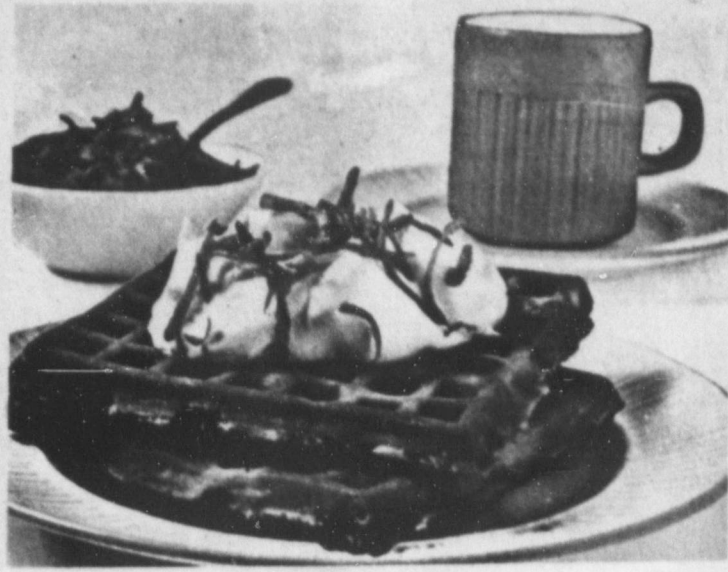

**Chocolate Dot Waffles**

Sift together 2 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour, 1 1/2 tablespoons sugar, 4 teaspoons baking powder, and 3/4 teaspoon salt. In mixing bowl combine 2 1/4 cups milk, 2 beaten eggs, and 1/2 cup salad oil. Add liquid mixture to sifted dry ingredients just before baking waffles, beating only till dry ingredients are moistened. (This waf-

tle batter will be thin.) Pour some batter onto preheated waffle baker. Using one 6-ounce package semisweet chocolate pieces (1 cup), sprinkled each unbaked waffle with a few chocolate pieces. Bake waffles. For each serving top 2 waffles with a dollop of whipped cream-sprinkle with shredded orange peel. Makes 4 servings.

**Basic Waffles**

Sift together 1 3/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Combine 2 beaten egg yolks, 1 3/4 cups milk, and 1/2 cup salad oil or

melted shortening; stir into dry ingredients. Fold in 2 stiffly beaten egg whites, leaving a few fluffs. Bake in pre-heated waffle baker. Serves 4 to 6.

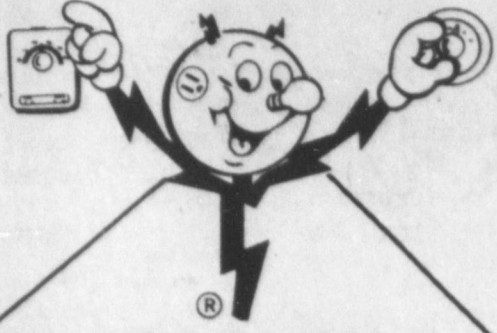
