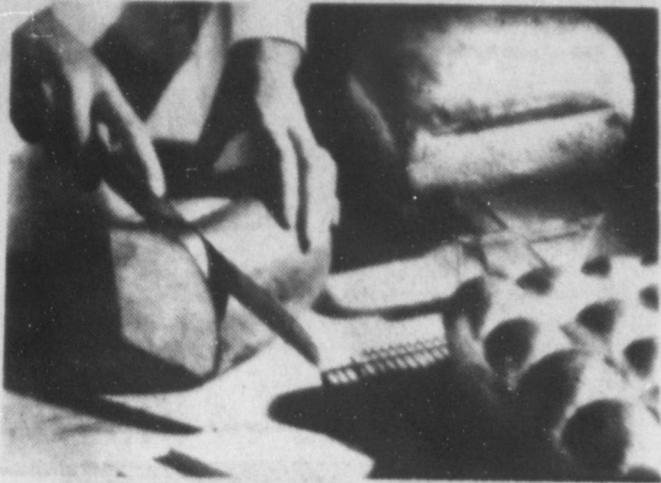

*Favorite Recipes of Opal Richards*



**Homemade Bread**

2 cups hot water  
4 Tbsp. sugar  
2 Tbsp. shortening  
2 tsp. salt  
1 pkg. dry granulated yeast  
7 1/2 cups flour  
1/2 cup warm water

Combine hot water, sugar, shortening and salt. When mixture has cooled, add dry yeast that has been dissolved in warm water. Add flour. Beat in as much of the flour as possible and knead in the balance

until dough is smooth and elastic. Put in a greased bowl, cover with a damp cloth, put in warm place and let rise until doubled in bulk, about 2 hours. Shape into loaves and place in greased bread pans. Brush top with salad oil, put in warm place, let rise until double in bulk, about 1 hour.

Then bake in preheated 350 to 375 degree oven, 45 minutes. Makes 3 medium sized loaves.

**Denver Biscuits**

1 cup sugar  
1 cup shortening  
1 quart warm milk  
1 pkg. dry yeast dissolved in 1 cup warm water  
flour  
1 tsp. soda  
1 tsp. baking powder  
1 tsp. salt

This makes 75 to 80 rolls. Cream together sugar and shortening. Pour milk over this. Add yeast dissolved in water. Mix in enough

flour to make consistency of pancake mix. Let stand one hour. Then add soda, baking powder, salt and enough flour to make a regular dough. Knead until smooth. Put into a large size greased bowl. Cover and refrigerate. This dough will keep 10 days or two weeks. Just shape biscuits as needed. Let rise 20 to 30 minutes and bake at 400 degrees until slightly brown.

**Ranch Biscuits or Do-Nuts**

4 1/2 cups flour  
4 tsp. baking powder  
1/4 tsp. soda  
1 tsp. salt  
2 cups buttermilk

1 pkg. dry yeast  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup warm water  
1/2 cup Cooking Oil

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Add milk, oil and dry ingredients. Knead on floured

board and put in large bowl, cover and put in refrigerator. Roll out and cut. Bake at 400 degrees for 15 mins.

**GLAZE FOR DO-NUTS**

1/4 Cup Milk  
(2 tablespoons cocoa for chocolate coating)  
2 cups powdered sugar  
Sift sugar. Mix ingredients together.

**Baking Bread Takes Time, Worth Effort**

AUSTIN--Newcomers to the art of bread baking should not be put off if their efforts are not prize winners. Getting acquainted to the feel of bread dough takes a little learning.

Texas Department of Agriculture home economists suggest the following tips for baking yeast-rising bread.

When dissolving granular yeast, water should be between 105-115 degrees. To test it, put a few drops in the inside of your wrist. It should feel very warm but not hot.

Kneading will determine the texture of your bread. Fold the dough toward you and push it away with the heel of your hand in a rocking motion. Rotate the dough and repeat the movement until the dough is smooth and blistered.

Dough must be kept in a warm, draft-free place while it is rising. To test for doubled bulk, stick your fingertips half an inch into the dough. Impressions will remain if the dough has doubled. To punch dough down, plunge your fist directly into the center.

Type of flour used depends on personal preference. Whole wheat flour contains all the wheat in its natural proportions and is preferred by some for its nutritional value. Its baking strength, however, is less than that of white flour and the volume of an all whole wheat loaf will not be that of one made with white flour.

All-purpose enriched flour is made from refined wheat to which vitamins and minerals have been added. Prepared by milling and sifting cleaned wheat, this flour consists essentially of the endosperm or inner portion of grain.

TDA home economists point out that yeast dough can be frozen about a week though it is better to bake the bread first and than freeze it. To use frozen dough, thaw and shape it, allowing it to rise double before baking.

**Cotton Crop Estimates Due To Fall**

AUSTIN--Though U. S. cotton estimates rose slightly in September, cotton experts foresee an October decline due to bad weather in cotton-growing areas of the country.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said the Texas High Plains which recently had cool, damp weather will experience some loss.

"The feeling of most people is that High Plains cotton growers have been robbed of three weeks of critical growing time," White said. "There is no way that the October estimate can measure up to what it was a month ago."

U. S. Department of Agriculture September figures estimated the High Plains would produce 1,640,000 bales. The area grows 50-60 percent of Texas cotton.

The nationwide estimate was 13,199.6 million bales. White said cotton prices

The Dickens County Electric Cooperative, Inc. has filed with the Federal Government a Compliance Assurance in which it assures the Rural Electrification Administration that it will comply fully with all requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Agriculture issued thereunder, to the end that no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the conduct of its program and the operation of its facilities. Under this Assurance, this organization is committed not to discriminate against any person on the ground of race, color or national origin in its policies and practices relating to applications for service or any other policies and practices relating to treatment of beneficiaries and participants including rates, conditions and extension of service, use of any of its facilities, attendance at and participation in any meetings of beneficiaries and participants or the exercise of any rights of such beneficiaries and participants in the conduct of the operations of this organization.

Any person who believes himself, or any specific class of individuals, to be subjected by this organization to discrimination prohibited by Title VI of the Act and the Rules and Regulations issued thereunder may, by himself or a representative, file with the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250, or the Rural Electrification Administration, Washington, D. C. 20250, or this organization, or all, a written complaint. Such complaint must be filed not later than 180 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of complainants will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the Rules and Regulations.

### House A Horse In Your Own Backyard

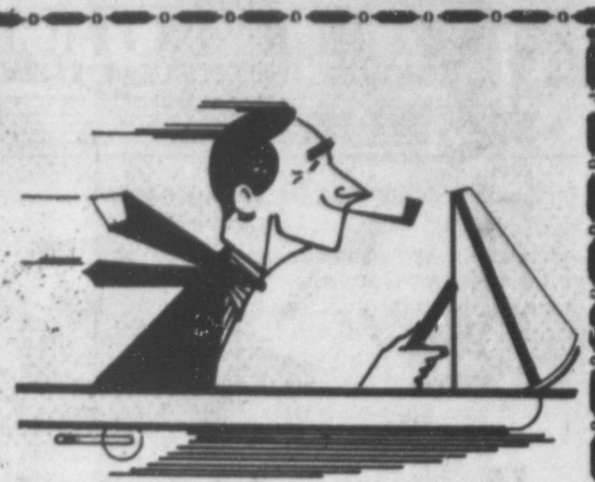

#### Church Feud

Two factions of a church were locked in a bitter struggle over the powers of a controversial minister. Finally they took the issue to court for settlement.

But the judge refused to take sides. Calling attention to the constitutional separation of church and state, the judge said:

"Courts do not inquire into questions exclusively ecclesiastical. If the courts should deal with litigation of that nature, the whole subject of theology would have to be examined. Such a course would establish the courts as the final arbiter in every religious controversy."



This is the law's usual attitude toward religious disputes, declining to intrude into "things that are God's." However, the courts can and do take a hand in "things that are Caesar's."

For example, in one case a pastor had a disagreement with his church about the terms of his employment contract. A court had no hesitation in weighing the opposing arguments and in ruling (on strictly legal grounds) against the church.

Likewise, courts have dealt with such mundane matters as the ownership of church real estate or the administration of trust funds left to a church.

Furthermore, of course, churchmen are just as subject to the criminal law as any other citizen. Thus:

A minister, while denouncing sin in his sermon, described it in unusually vivid language. Outraged members of his congregation complained to the police, and the minister was duly haled into court on a charge of using obscene language in a public place.

Finding him guilty, the court commented:

"He has a right to propagate his religious views, but will not be permitted to commit a breach of the peace under the guise of preaching the gospel."
