

Dental education workshops were conducted for 901 teachers and other school personnel serving 19,698 children, and awareness programs will be carried to 2 1/2 million children in the next biennium

In the field of environmental health. water supply and wastewater programs were extended. For safe drinking water you paid for laboratory analyses of 257,000 water samples. plus reviews of plans for construction and additions to water and sewage plants. More than 1,400 inspections were made of existing plants. and examinations were given operators of these plants to assure proficiency of the

Surveillance of all radiation sing Program made 601 devices -- such as those used by hysicians and dentists-was made during the year. The General Sanitation Division operated in such fields as youth camps, day care centers, migrant labor camps and jails, as well as other public health arcas. Public health is being extended to Texans through the 68 local health departments, which cover 81 per cent of the population, as well as six public health regions operating throughout 145 counties. Your tax dollars are making all these health services available. The streams and lakes in Texas are monitored regularly. added. During the year 521 bacterio-logical samples were collected from Texas streams and lakes for laboratory evaluations of water quality. In addition, almost 1,200 water samples were collected from oyster growing areas in Texas bays and estuaries. And, 5,100 chemical tests 1,924,000, Dickson said. were performed on Texas Coastal waters. During the past year the Division of Shellfish Sanitation Control surveyed the classified 1 ¹/₂ million acres of shellfish growing waters and made 3,224 inspections of shellfish and crab meat processing plants. Sleet and freezing drizzle over the High Plains halted final stages of cotton harvesting according to Paul R. Dickson, in charge of the USDA's Cotton Classing Of-fice in Lubbock. "Very little cotton is in the fields now," he

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa, and Levelland classed 133,500 samples during the week ending Friday, Dec. 27. This brought the season's total to, 842,000. On this same date last year the total was

TREMENDOUS TRIFLES THE FLY THAT DECIDED A WORLD'S CHAMPIONSHIP


A fly once decided a billards



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There Is Now Help Available For The Alcoholics

Since' Oct. 1, some 30 persons have received help from one of the four Alcoholism Counselors who cover a 14-county area including all of the counties in the SPAG Regional Planning Area except Lubbock County.

Receiving help means that alcohol abusers in the area were counseled and were either referred to Veteran Hospitals, State Hospitals, Community. Mental Health and Mental Retardation Centers, local law enforcement DWI classes, Alcoholics Anonymous or simply enlisted in a series of couseling sessions. Each of the clients receive followup action from the Alcoholism Counselor in his or her respective county.

The alcoholism project is the South Plains Community Action Association, Inc. in Levelland. Coordination of the project is also being done by the Central Plains Community Action Program, Inc. and the Community Action Agency of Crosby, Dickens and Floyd Counties.

What can a counselor do for the alcohol abuser? An alcoholism counselor has a knowledge of the disease of alcoholism and can offer ways or methods to arrest the disease of alcoholism. The counselor also can refer clients.

Some of the things an alcoholism counselor cannot do are the following. The alcoholism counselor cannot




Saving Your Seed

College Station -- Cotton University System specialist. farmers who are planning on saving seed from their 1974

crop should be sure it is high in germination and low in free fatty acid.

"Most farmers check germination closely but may not be aware of the importance of the free fatty acid content," points out Dr. Robert Metzer, cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Free fatty acid is a by-product of seed deterioration so its content should not be more than 1 per cent. Seed exposed to long periods of wet weather prior to harvesting or subjected to poor storage after harvesting will generally have a higher acid content, indicating considerable seed deterioration," notes the Texas A&M



He adds that cottonseed delinting plants commonly use the 1 per cent level of free fatty acid as the breaking point in saving or rejecting seed for planting purposes.

"Seed with a high acld content often shows a high germination test, initially, but these seed will deteriorate rapidly in storage and germination will drop." explains the cotton specialist. "Of course, a low acid content does not insure top quality seed Immature seed may be low in free fatty acid content."
