Disabled Veterans To Get Special Aid With Taxes

The 63rd Legislature enacted certain property exemptions, applicable in all taxing jurisdictions, for disabled veterans and their survivors and the survivors of veterans who died while on active duty. The law also given the Comptroller of Public Account the responsibility for making regulations providing for its implementation. The effective date of this law is Jan. 1, 1976.

Every effort will be made by the personnel in your tax offices to assist you in the administration of this tax. Feel free to contact us on your problems.

Those persons who have a military service related disability will receive from the veterans administration by mail a form stating the percent of disability. This form must be presented to the taxing office and the exemption must be applied for annually in each tax office.

Rep. W. S. Heatly Seeks New Term

W. S. "Bill" Heatly of Paducah has authorized this newspaper to announce that he will seek reelection as Representative of the 101st Legislative District. He will make the race as a Democrat and his candidacy is subject to the Democratic primary to be held the first Saturday in May, 1976.

Mr. Heatly ranks second among 150 members of the House in continuous service. This is a matter of great importance, since committee assignments are based primarily on seniority, which means members with longest records of service have first choices. This assures Mr. Heatly of continuing membership on such key committees as Appropriations and Judicial affairs. He is now a member of the Legislative Budget Board, a position he has held for the entire period of his 20 years service in the House of Representatives.

As vice chairman of the Committee on Judicial affairs, he is in charge of writing appropriations for support of the Texas Court system.

The Legislative Budget Board prepares the bill appropriating funds for operation of all State Agencies for the next two years.

These are important assignments because they deal with the key question of how much money the State will spend for all purposes during the ensuing two years.

Mr. Heatly is well known throughout the State for his knowledge of all phases of State Government. This reputation has been earned through years of hard work and diligent study of the problems of government.

His special interest throughout his service in the Legislature has been in service rendered by State hospitals and correctional and educational institutions. He has been particularly concerned about maintaining schools and an adequate court system in less densely populated sections of Texas. He believes that these services in counties of small population should be on a par with similar services provided for major cities. He is determined that sections of Texas, like the 15 counties of the 101 District shall not become the forgotten areas of our great state.

On the basis of service rendered and a promise to continue policies he has followed in the past, Mr. Heatly solicits support of voters in the 101st District. His election means that no section of Texas will have a greater voice in making decisions that affect the public interest.

He invites suggestions from constituents, he may not be able to accomplish desired results in every instance, but he promises to give his best effort to every request.



Why does a cooling of the air often produce clouds?
 The air always contains a certain amount of moisture. When there are no clouds in the sky, the moisture is invisible, but it's there. Cooling condenses

air and reduces its capacity to retain water.
 In doing so, the invisible water particles in the air become relatively greater in content and finally become visible droplets of moisture. A cloud, then, is the result of cooling of air, which changes invisible moisture into visible form.
 This cooling process also produces fog—the lowest of the clouds. The sun's heating of the earth, which, in turn, heats the air above it, which rises and is cooled

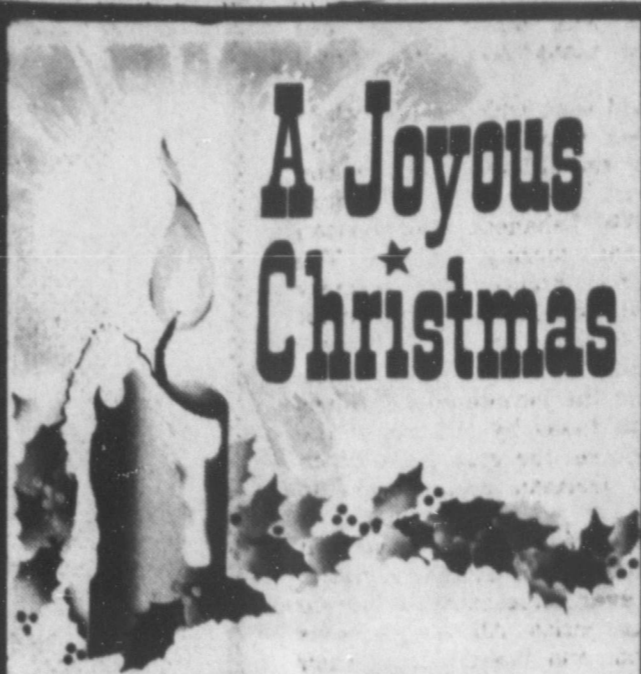

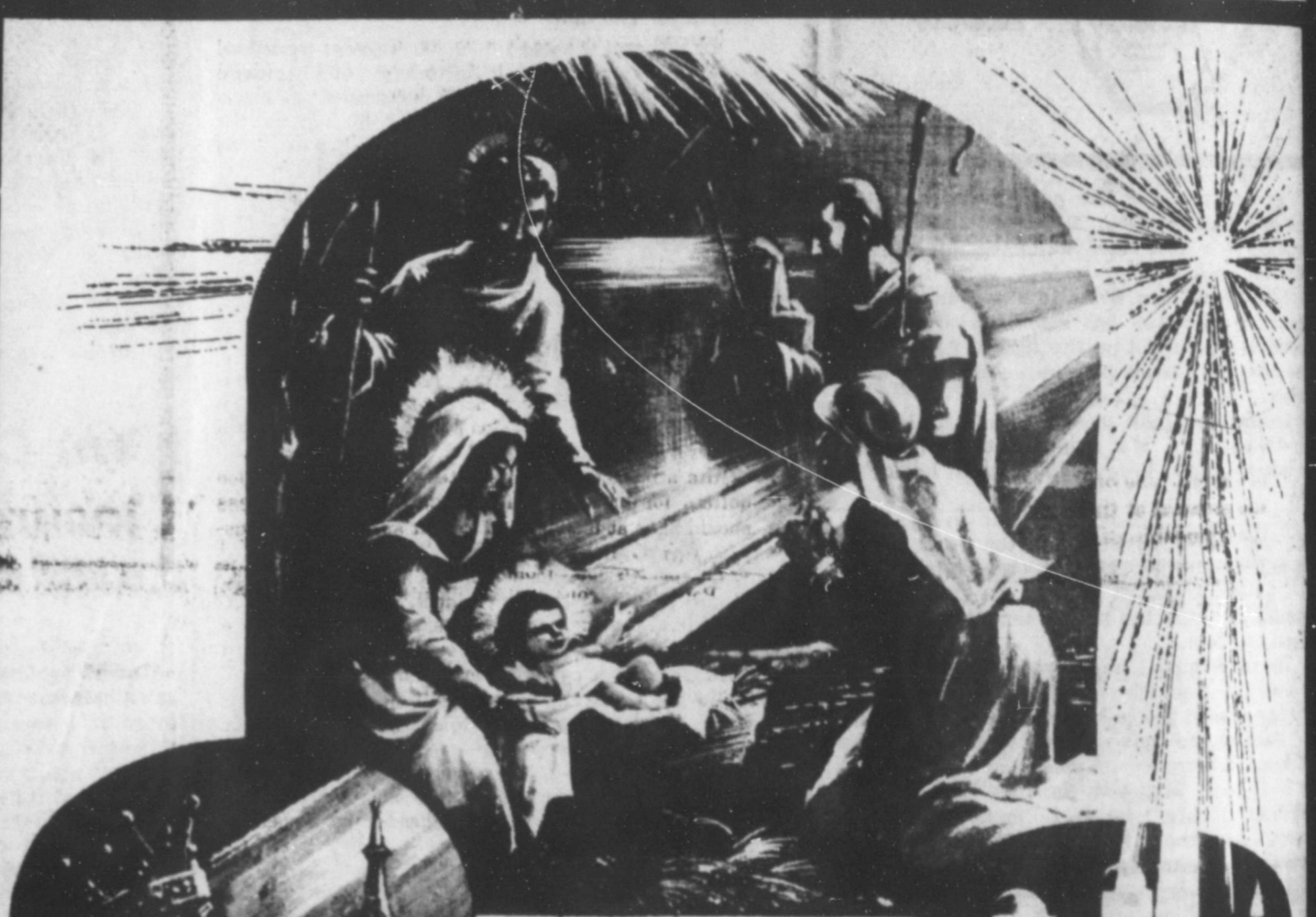
CAR SALES STILL

The Spirit of '76 Belongs to Texas

The spirit of '76 belongs to Texas. Feelings are running high for the bicentennial in Texas, where programs are as diverse as the character of the state.

Cultural trade outs with other nations are among the bicentennial plans now for several Texas Cities.

Arlington citizens will soon welcome into their homes families flown over free from each of the foreign nations served by the airlines at the nearby Dallas-Fort Worth airport. Doors will also swing open in El Paso for native Lebanese and Mexican performers and craftsmen touring America. The city commission of Paris, France was recently surprised with a personal invitation to attend about 40 odd bicentennial events slated for Paris, Texas.

One of the most exciting international exchanges stemming from the bicentennial involves an offer recently made to Texas by officials of the West German state of Hesse, the area from which came the most of the German immigrants to Texas.

The Hessians have agreed to send over, at their own expense, plane loads of artists, dancers, choir and stage groups, even some cooks to stir up the fun at German, Texas cities. All the generous Germans ask is free room and board during their story.—Contributed.

The Inbred Bureaucracy

The bureaucracy in Washington is, as everyone knows, huge and cumbersome and one of the tipoffs of how attractive top government jobs are can be found in the eagerness of so many to stay in the federal swirl.

A recent example is that of Elliot Richardson, just confirmed in his fourth Cabinet job. Able as he is, one's interest is stirred by four different high posts in a short period of time for this man. He must thrive on them!

There was another recent example of President Ford appointing a top bureaucrat's spouse to a top government post. Two in the family!

Federal pay and goodies are so lucrative today, and security and automatic pay hikes so certain, federal agencies can easily hire away from private business nine out of ten employees. That's not the way the founding fathers envisioned government "service" and that's not the way it ought to be.

And until the federal bureaucracy is brought under control, and obsolete agencies and departments eliminated, with their many unnecessary jobs, the budget is not likely to be balanced nor government services improved.

The Spending Lid

The Democratic Congress again exhibits its irresponsibility in refusing to accept the spending lid proposed by President Ford as a prerequisite for continued federal income tax cuts in 1976.

With a budget deficit expected to total sixty billion dollars for the current fiscal year, the 94th Congress should have at least agreed to limit spending, as a justification of tax cuts.

Instead, the first session of this Congress continues to play politics with the President; majority Democrats obviously felt Ford would be hesitant to veto a tax cut bill, that if he did the veto would cost him votes in 1976, and that it could be overridden.

The electorate may not be as gullible as some believe. President Ford has every reason to veto income tax cuts for 1976 if there is no simultaneous limit on federal spending. The nation obviously cannot afford tax cuts; if they are to be enacted to combat the recession, they can only be justified by hand-in-hand spending curbs.

Resolutions

At the beginning of a new year many Americans make resolutions. Some greet the process with cynicism, knowing most of the resolutions will be broken, some before very many days of 1976 have passed.

But resolutions often signify that the maker seeks to improve his habits or behavior; they are a sign the maker is striving to better himself or herself in some way. In that sense they are an indication of an active mind, of good intentions.

New Year's resolutions, then, whether kept or not, are a good idea. They constitute a taking stock, a plan for better things in the future. And that is what the game of life is all about—the hope, and effort, to build a better future.



Bad Precedent

In questioning Supreme Court nominees U.S. Senators are delving more and more into the nominee's views on the controversial issues of the day. This trend was in evidence in the recent Senate Judiciary confirmation hearings on Judge John Stevens.

The consideration to keep in mind concerning Justices is that nominees are constitutionally chosen by the President and confirmed by the Senate, if found professionally qualified, morally acceptable and jurists of integrity. The purpose of Senate confirmation has never been to determine if the nominee's philosophy coincides with that of the majority in Congress.

Democrats in recent years, solidly in control of Congress, have tended to dig deeper and deeper into each prospective Justice's philosophy, social views and opinions on current controversies. This is poor precedent, basically politics, and flouts the intent of the constitution.

Nominees should not be asked to give their views on every narrow controversial question they will face on the bench, they not having studied the specific cases yet to arise. They should not be intimidated by Congress into making commitments they might not wish to keep on the basis of evidence they later must consider.

The whole idea behind judgeship selection and function is honest independence—having men of integrity who seek to enforce the law and the Constitution and do so without regard to politics and other pressures. The Senate Judiciary Committee should not overstep its responsibilities.

Tree Trimming Is World Practice

Although most people don't realize it, decorating the family Christmas tree is the end result of many ethnic influences, and customs which have been handed down from generation to generation. The infinite variety of tree trimming that goes on around the world is seen during the holiday season.

The old fashioned American tree has homemade popcorn and cranberry strings. A Norwegian tree displays paper angels, frosted cookies and national flags. The bearded figure in the corner represents Julesvenn who brings the children's presents. A Polish tree shows great ingenuity with dazzling ornaments fashioned of paper chains, apples, straws, and even egg shells. A nativity scene is usually part of the tree base.

The Swedish tree is gaily festooned with national flags, handmade sway ornaments and dangling red felt hearts. The Estonian tree is a simple, natural one and is not brought into the home until Christmas day when it is decorated with pine cones, cookies and white candles. The Greek tree features handmade dolls, cookies, native nuts, apples and bouzouki. Traditionally, the Lithuanian tree is decorated with intricately made straw decorations.

The Pyramid shaped structure beside the Italian tree is the "ceppo" (the tree of light which became the Christmas tree in other countries).

- 1 qt. hot tea
- 1 qt. cranberry juice
- 1 qt. apple juice
- 1 stick cinnamon
- 1 whole cloves
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup orange juice
- 1 cup lemon juice
- 1 orange, sliced
- 1 lemon, sliced

Combine all ingredients except orange and lemon slices. Bring to a boil. Pour into a bowl and float fruit slices. Serves 16 to 20.

Holiday Cranberry Punch

- 1-pt. bottles cranberry cocktail
- 46 oz. cans pineapple juice

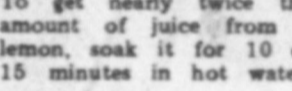

One Accident In Kent County In Month of November

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highways in Kent County during the month of November, 1975, according to Sergeant Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

This crash resulted in no persons killed and no persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first 11 months of 1975 shows a total of seven accidents resulting in no persons killed and four persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for November, 1975, shows a total of 530 accident resulting in 14 persons killed and 258 persons injured, as compared to November 1974, with 497 accidents resulting in 10 persons killed and 229 persons injured. This was 33 more accidents, four more killed, and 29 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The traffic deaths for the month of November, 1975, occurred in the following counties: Two each in Swisher and Wilbarber; and one each in Clay, Crosby, Lubbock, Montague, Palo Pinto, Parker, Wichita, Hutchinson, Oldham, and Wheeler.

Among the many bills signed into law by Governor Dolph Briscoe during the past legislative session was one which will give some deserved preference to Texas produced meat. Several far-sighted Legislators in both the House and Senate are due some grateful thanks for their efforts on behalf of both producers and consumers in Texas.

House Bill 318 was introduced by Representative George L. Preston of Paris to increase the consumption of domestic beef in one attempt to aid the failing livestock industry in the state. It was co-sponsored by Representatives W. S. (Bill) Heatly of Paducah, John Wilson of La Grange, Susan Gurley McBee of Del Rio, and others. It was carried in the Senate by Senators William T. Moore of Bryan and A.M. Aikin of Paris.

The bill prohibits purchases of foreign beef by state and local governments and schools. It was introduced only after all appeals by cattlemen to the Federal government to reduce imports were exhausted.

His argument was this: In 1974 the value of imported beef and veal was over \$896 million. Cattle raisers were losing over \$100 a head. They understood the practical need to maintain agreements which encourage free international flow of raw and processed grain, produce, and livestock products. However, the U.S. is the only country in the world that will allow continued imports of a product of which there is a surplus.

The large export markets for meat are virtually closed now to U.S. exporters to protect their producers. Our government has no reciprocal agreements with some of the major countries sending beef into the U.S. The European Community reduced 1974

imports to 1 per cent of domestic consumption and revises its quotas as conditions change within their producing member countries. America also has a "panic" quota included in import regulations, but Federal officials refused to push it.

Time after time Texas delegations visited with Washington officials to place the case of failing cattle markets in the right perspective, but came home with little more than promises of requests to foreign countries for voluntary restraints.

Thus the bill was shaped, placed in the hopper, debated, passed, and finally signed into law. The outcome is that the demand for meat imports should decrease—at least by the amount used in Texas institutions. As of last May, bids are accepted only on fresh or frozen beef grown and processed in America. Colleges, prisons, hospitals, schools, and similar services will be affected by H.B. 318.

This legislation may seem of minor importance to the auto assembly worker whose job is threatened or to the stockbroker whose clients are holding back on investments. But to the small cow-calf operator in East Texas and the rancher with 2,000 head, it means that someone in government was listening and responded. This kind of support from lawmakers not only boosts the confidence of Texas cattlemen; it means that they will have better markets in the critical period of the next few years.

The Boston Schools

In 1954 the Supreme Court struck down as unconstitutional the separate-but-equal (so-called) school system in many states, not all of them in southern states. The pace of integration then proceeded, slowly at first, until in the sixties there were massive influxes of blacks into hitherto all-white schools. The process worked well in towns and rural areas where the two races were not in equal or near-equal numbers. But it didn't work too well in some metropolitan centers and in the so-called black belt across the South, where black students equalled or surpassed in numbers white students. In these two situations friction sometimes developed and private schools for the white mushroomed rapidly as they left public schools in droves.

The result as of the end of 1975 is that the South is largely integrated (at least to a greater degree than other sections) as far as the public schools are concerned. But two school systems now exist again in the black belt.

In the metropolitan areas of the non-south, the people have often been less willing than southerners to integrate, or to establish new schools. The white parents of Boston are the best example of this resistance. Their resistance has been more prolonged than in any other locality.

Now an increasing number of presidential candidates are saying they oppose busing, that the schools must be turned back over to local communities, etc. And polls show both blacks and whites oppose mandatory busing. Probably that is because learning standards have fallen, and crime and chaos have risen in many (but not all) integrated schools.

The answer to this social problem is yet to be determined. But America has attempted, and is attempting, a great, idealistic educational effort. The results have certainly been dubious in many areas. Private schools now fixtures in their communities are not likely to disappear, nor are the courts likely to cease their integration efforts. But it may be that forced busing will be de-emphasized in many areas—and that might be justified because it doesn't accomplish its purpose.

Sleep Aids

If you have believed television commercials about sleeping aids, you've apparently been had. The Food and Drug Administration says none of the over-the-counter sedatives and sleep aids today can be classed as completely safe or effective.

An FDA advisory covers all three types of drugs—sleep aids, products to reduce nervous tension and stimulant pills. And in-

terestingly, the stimulant found to be the least harmful is—caffeine—found in tea and cola beverages.

That doesn't mean caffeine is good for anyone; it simply means if one needs a stimulant, this drug is safer than most of those in medical preparations. Of course, in today's world, few really need a stimulant. The greater need is to slow life's pace and reduce stimulation.

Our Needy

It is the custom in many parts of the country for newspapers to call attention to the plight of the community's needy at Christmas time. This is a worthwhile undertaking and it is appropriate to make a special effort at Christmas to see that every child, especially, is remembered in some way.

It is true, as some point out, that the needy deserve attention year-

round. But there is also nothing wrong with a special effort, one that perhaps cannot be duplicated every week of the year—at Christmas.

If there are nearby families in distress, if there are children likely to have little to be happy about Christmas morning, those with the means can make their Christmas a satisfying one by doing something about it. Parties, good food and expensive presents are less fulfilling, inwardly.

SKI FACTS AND FANCIES

The next time you watch a skier glide majestically down a mountain, you might think you thought to a gentleman named "Snowshoe" Johnson. He's the one who

introduced the sport to Americans. It was in 1856. When did the first skier take to the slopes? Well, a rock carving of a skier in northern Norway dates from 2,000 B.C. The earliest recorded ski competition took place in Oslo, Norway, though it did not grow into a sport until 1843.

70 COTTON HERITAGE
Cotton exports were made from the American colonies as early as 1747, according to some historians. One of the oldest records is a bill of lading dated July 20, 1751, certifying that one Henry Hansen shipped 18 bales of cotton to London from New York harbor.

But in 1784, eight bags of cotton shipped to England from the United States were seized on the grounds of fraudulent import since it was not believed so much cotton could be produced in America.

In the decade following Eli Whitney's invention of the cotton gin in 1793, U.S. farmers increased cotton production from 2 million pounds to almost 50 million.

By 1860, America's cotton crop reached almost a billion pounds and exports of the fluffy white fiber financed 60% of total U.S. expenditures for imports of manufactured goods, sugar, coffee, railroad iron, and other products.

Within 12 months after the Civil War, cotton exports reached the unprecedented value of over \$200 million. And by 1880, cotton production had exceeded its pre-war high by a billion pounds!

Oil Nations Buying More Farm Goods

Increased wealth of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) has opened up a vast new market for agricultural goods.

Nearly 17% of the increased value of U.S. farm exports in 1974 came from shipments to OPEC, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. These shipments jumped to \$1.6 billion last year—more than double the 1973 level.

Iran was the biggest OPEC customer, taking over a half billion dollars of U.S. farm goods. Venezuela ranked second, with \$300 million.

The only OPEC member to import less U.S. farm goods in 1974 than in 1973 was Indonesia. USDA officials attributed this decline to increased competition from such Asian suppliers as Pakistan, the People's Republic of China, and Thailand.

U.S. farm exports to OPEC are expected to increase by \$500-675 million this year, according to USDA estimates. Most of the increases will go to Iran, Iraq, the Arabian Peninsula, and Algeria.

The following species are available for windbreaks: Arizona Cypress, Austrian Pine, Black Walnut, Chinese Elm, Honeylocust, Orientalarborvitae, Osage Orange, Ponderosa Pine, Red Cedar, and Russian Olive. Cost of the seedlings is \$5.00 per 100, and must be ordered in multiples of 50.

Orders must be received before 11 February. The planter agrees to use seedlings for windbreaks and not for ornamental or landscaping purposes.
