## No County Accidents In December

For the second month in a row, the Texas Highway Patrol investigated no accidents on rural highways in Kent County during the month of December, 1975, according to Sergeant Frank Jirick, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and no persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first 12 months of 1975 shows a total of seven accidents resulting in no persons killed and four persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for December, 1975, shows a total of 534 accidents resulting in 22 persons killed and 325 persons injured, as compared to December, 1974, with 598 accidents resulting in 11 persons killed and 340 persons injured. This was 64 less accidents, 11 more killed, and 15 less injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The traffic deaths for the month of December, 1975, occurred in the following counties: Four in Parker; three in Hardeman; two in Lubbock; and one each in Bailey, Dickens, Hockley, Jack, Montague, Palo Pinto, Wise, Young, Gray, Ochiltree, Parmer, Potter, and Wheeler.

At the monthly meeting of the Jayton school board last Thursday night, among other things, the board, with all members present, voted to give superintendent R.N. Pierce a new three year contract.

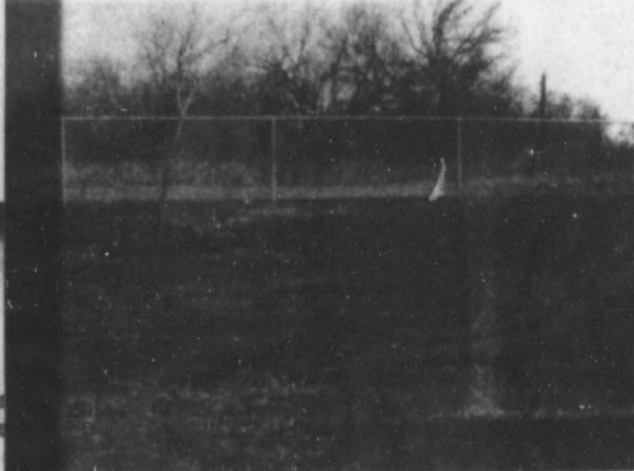
Also they: Approved the plans of the architect for the new P.E. gym area, and set March 11th as the day open bids on the new project.

## Burning Off Grass Not Good



**RECENTLY BURNED LAWN IN KENT COUNTY**  
Burning off the old dead grass on your lawn is not good for the grass and may even be dangerous to shrubs, fences, and buildings, according to Joe McAdams, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Jayton.

Dead grass and humus act as a blanket in the winter and insulates the living plant from cold. It also absorbs water and prevents rapid runoff of rain.

A good alternative to burning is to wait until about March and mow the grass very close to the ground, then rake up the clippings and duff from the previous year. This old grass can be used in flower beds and gardens to enrich the soil.

For more information on the care of lawns, call or come by the Soil Conservation Service office in the basement of the courthouse in Jayton. This service is free to all without regard to race, color, religion, sex or national origin.

**Chili Rellenos Eggs**

1 can (10 oz.) whole green chilies  
 1/2 lb. Jack Cheese  
 4 eggs  
 1/2 cup milk  
 1/2 cup flour  
 1/2 tsp. baking powder  
 1 cup shredded sharp Cheddar cheese

Remove seeds from green chilies; cut strips of cheese and tuck inside. Place in 8-inch square casserole side by side. In blender mix eggs, milk, flour and baking powder until smooth. Pour over chilies. Sprinkle Cheddar cheese over top. Bake uncovered 20 to 30 minutes at 375 degrees. serve plain or with Rancho Sauce. (This is very delicious without the sauce.)

**RANCHO SAUCE**  
 1/2 cup chopped onion  
 1 clove garlic, pressed  
 1/4 to 1/2 tsp. leaf oregano  
 2 Tblsp. oil  
 1/2 tsp. salt  
 1/2 cup tomato paste  
 1 can (1lb.) tomatoes

Saute onion, garlic and oregano in oil several minutes; add remaining ingredients and simmer on lowest heat 15 minutes. Serve with Chili Rellenos Eggs.

**Tortilla Pie**

1 1/2 lb. ground meat  
 2 buttons, garlic, chopped fine  
 1 can cream of mushroom soup  
 1 1/2 cans canned milk  
 2 cans chopped green Chili  
 1 lb. longhorn, cheese, grated  
 1 med. size onion, chopped fine  
 1 dozen tortillas

Brown meat with garlic and salt until not red. Put soup, milk, green Chili and cheese in double boiler on low heat. In greased casserole break up 6 tortillas, layer of meat, onions, and sauce. Repeat ending with sauce on.

Bake at 350 degrees 30-45 minutes. serves 8 generously.

Well, well, the amazing Dallas Cowboys, who just about had everyone convinced they were really super men and could pull off miracles, are in actuality just young men like everyone else.

After pulling off almost a miracle to get into the playoffs, and then rolling the Los Angeles Rams like they did, it seemed like they could do just about everything. But the Pittsburgh Steelers had other ideas.

Again, as they have so many times down through the years, the Cowboys faced just a few minutes to play, and a situation for a miracle in Sunday's Super Bowl X, but this time they failed, and became just an ordinary "also played" football team.

How about the some 500 Steeler fans that were taken for a ride? They spent about \$500 each for a football tour, which included transportation, hotel accommodations and tickets to the game. But when the fans got to Miami, no one ever heard of them, and they had to see the game from their hotel rooms. One such fan interviewed, was almost speechless, and said, among other things "I'm ready to kill!"

And the hustling Red Raiders from Texas Tech, who had been playing a very good brand of ball this year, and were undefeated in the conference were made to eat the dust Saturday night in the coliseum--and sure enough it was the Aggies that beat them.

You know the way the Aggies have been playing in Lubbock in recent years, you would think they owned the coliseum.

Statewide, this may be a hot year. State Comptroller is making noises like he is running for Governor, and has publicly stated he would like to go higher in state government, and "would not be against" running for governor.

Veteran State Representative Bill Heatly has stated he will be seeking a new term.

If anyone plans to contest him this year, the word has not gotten out around the district.

Veteran Congressman Omar Burleson who represents this county in the national Congress says he will seek another term. Also Ucnrg. George Mahon, the only Congressman the 19th District has ever had in over 40 years, says he will seek a new term.

It promises to be a good interesting year, not counting the National elections, when we will elect a president and vice president.

If you are an older timer, you will remember when you were in school, you had to really pass the work if you were promoted to another grade. The idea of this is fine--you should learn the work before you move on to another grade.

But there are falacies to this idea. One, you hold a child back in the same grade for two or three years, and you are going to have a big old kid in the same class with a bunch of kids much smaller--and the results are that the big kid will drop out of school.

This idea is fine, but there are problems with it too, like having kids up in a top grade, and they don't know anything. In many places they have kids in the top grade, or those who have graduated--who actually know very little or nothing. To me it seems to be quite a bad thing to give a high school diploma to some boy or girl that can't even read, and who knows very little about any of the basics they are supposed to get, even away down in the elementary grades.

Now comes up the superintendent of one of the schools in a Hawaiian school named Charles Clark, and he says the high school diploma, to him, means only that the students has attended the necessary classes and grades. He says the college entrance exam is to determine how much the student knows, and whether or not he is eligible to enter college.

There should be a middle ground here somewhere.

The Girard Club will meet Feb. 4th. Jayton Club will meet Feb. 5th. The next council meeting will be Feb. 11, 1976.

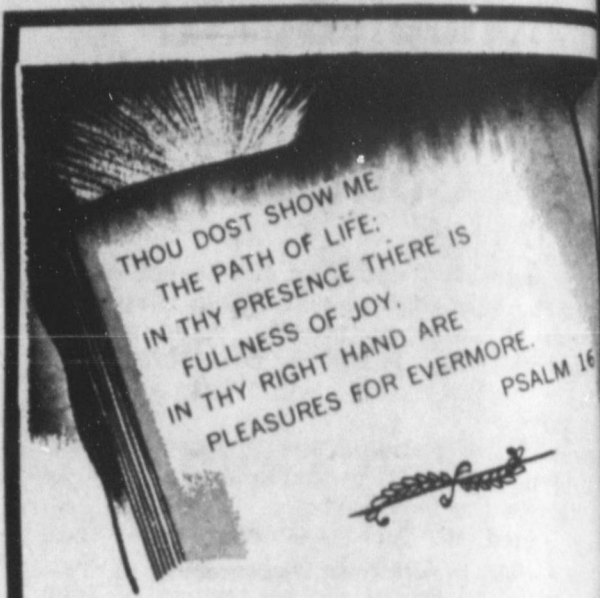
